#### PUBLIC STATEMENTS – WRITTEN/ORAL

Michelle Vergara, field representative for Congressman Tony Cardenas, provided information and updates on their activities.

Michelle Guijarro talked about a violation letter she received regarding a temporary fence she placed in front of her house and asked if she could get a hearing regarding this issue.

City Manager Kimball introduced John Robinson who gave information regarding his company (agenda Item No. 5).

Donna Washington said that, along with handling permits, FilmLA does community relations, offers notification and monitoring services, and they handle all needs regarding productions.

#### **CITY COUNCIL - LIAISON UPDATES**

Councilmember Pacheco gave an update regarding the Southern California Association of Governments conference that he and City Manager Kimball attended, and said that he is looking forward to the partnership with FilmLA.

Councilmember Gonzales talked about the Census Ad Hoc committee and said they were invited to be on a panel at California State University, Northridge.

Vice Mayor Ballin spoke about O'Melveny School and the "I Count Census 2020" poster, gave an update on the Green City Ad Hoc, reported that the Independent Cities Finance Authority meeting was hosted in San Fernando this month, and is looking forward to attending the Contract Cities Conference.

Mayor Fajardo hopes that we can look into ways of utilizing less plastic, said he hosted the Council of Governments meeting at the San Fernando Library, and reported that the Commercial Cannabis Program Ad Hoc met and will hopefully have an update by July.

City Manager Kimball presented the staff report and introduced Kenji Martinez, Saalex Sales Associate.

Motion by Councilmember Gonzales, seconded by Vice Mayor Ballin, to:

- a. Approve a five-year Professional Services Agreement with Saalex Solutions, Inc. (Contract No. 1915) to provide full service Information Technology Management Services for an amount not-to-exceed \$115,200 per year with a 2.5% annual escalator and up to 10% per year for additional work requested by the City; and
- b. Authorize the City Manager to prepare and execute the Agreement.

10) OPEN STREETS EVENT STATUS UPDATE

Director of Recreation and Community Services Julian Venegas presented the staff report. He and City Manager Kimball replied to questions from Councilmembers.

Councilmembers provided input regarding involving the Mall Association and perhaps combine with the Dia de Los Muertos event in 2020 and utilize the same advertising partners.

By consensus, Councilmembers concurred to move forward (based on feedback) and receive and file the report.

11) OVERVIEW AND DISCUSSION REGARDING PENDING SENATE BILL 50 (WIENER) AFFECTING HOUSING DEVELOPMENT INCENTIVES IN THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA

Assistant City Attorney Padilla presented the staff report and replied to various questions from Councilmembers.

Discussion ensued amongst Councilmembers and each provided feedback, agreeing the importance to be proactive and keeping track of the bill, and determine what to do if it's passed, and at the very least, draft a letter of opposition.

Mayor Fajardo, Councilmembers, and Assistant City Attorney Padilla reviewed the Procedural Manual and provided input regarding various sections including meeting attendance, absences, duration of meetings, ad hoc committees, public hearings, and testimony. Police Chief Vairo gave an update regarding the successful Tip a Cop and Special Olympics events.

City Clerk Chávez reported that the Education Commission will be holding its 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Scholarship Awards Ceremony at Las Palmas Park on May 21<sup>st</sup> and provided an update regarding the new Los Angeles County voting system beginning in 2020.

Director of Recreation and Community Services Venegas stated that the Parks, Wellness, and Recreation Commission will meet to discuss park improvements and he announced that the Senior Expo Event will be held at Las Palmas Park on May 17<sup>th</sup>.

Director of Community Development Hou reported that he will not be here for the second meeting in May; instead will be at the International Council of Shopping Centers conference recruiting new businesses and retailers to San Fernando.

City Manager Kimball reported that Councilmembers will receive a copy of the proposed budget next week and said that study sessions will begin on May 20<sup>th</sup>. He also gave an update regarding the recruitment process for the positions of Directors of Finance and Public Works.

Councilmember Pacheco said he is looking forward to the next meeting with exciting agenda items, and thanked staff for their work on SB50.

City Manager Kimball presented the staff report and introduced, Pep Valdes, Parking Company America representative.

Mr. Valdes gave a PowerPoint presentation regarding their services and he provided recommendations.

No formal action was taken; staff to look at options and bring back recommendations for review and approval by the City Council.

6) CONSIDERATION TO APPROVE A PROFESSIONAL SERVICES CONTRACT WITH WEST COAST ARBORISTS, INC. FOR CITY-WIDE TREE MAINTENANCE SERVICES

City Manager Kimball presented the agenda report and introduced West Coast Arborists, Inc. Vice President Victor Gonzalez who responded to questions from Councilmembers.

Motion by Mayor Fajardo, seconded by Councilmember Gonzales to:

7) CONSIDERATION TO ADOPT A RESOLUTION SETTING THE PROPERTY TAX RATE REQUIRED TO MEET THE CITY'S OBLIGATION TO THE CALIFORNIA PUBLIC EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM FOR FISCAL YEAR 2019-2020

City Manager Kimball presented the staff report and responded to various questions from Councilmembers.

Motion by Mayor Fajardo, seconded to by Councilmember Gonzales to adopt Resolution No. 7946 establishing the amount necessary to be raised by taxation for the City's annual payment to the California Public Employees' Retirement System; fixing the property tax rate for Fiscal Year 2019-2020 at \$0.212129 per \$100 of assessed valuation; and levying that tax rate upon all taxable property in the City. By consensus, the motion carried.



#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

### **BACKGROUND:**

- 1. On November 6, 2018, San Fernando voters approved extending the City's existing half-percent Transactions and Use Tax Measure (Measure "A") indefinitely.
- 2. On November 19, 2018, the City Council discussed the proposed composition, duties, and bylaws of a Measure "A" Community Advisory Committee (the Committee). Subsequently, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 7895 establishing a Measure "A" Community Advisory Committee and authorized the City Manager to advertise and solicit applications from interested parties to serve on the Committee.
- 3. On September 16, 2019, City Council discussed the constitution of the Committee as adopted on November 19, 2018 and directed staff to re-constitute it as a Town Hall style forum to increase community participation.

### **ANALYSIS:**

Pursuant to direction received from the City Council, the proposed Guidelines (Attachment "A") include:

<u>Organization</u>: The Measure A Transparency Forum (Transparency Forum or Forum) shall be open to any and all interested members of the community. Community members that participate in the bi-annual Town Hall style Transparency Forums may provide feedback to City Council and staff that will form the basis of any recommendations to City Council as it relates to the Forum's objectives as described in Article 2 of the Guidelines.

<u>Objectives</u>: The proposed objectives for the Forum include: (1) reviewing the Annual Report of collection, management, and expenditure of Measure "A" revenues, and (2) providing general recommended budget priorities for use of Measure "A" funds as part of the annual budget process. General recommended budget priorities include, but are not limited to, paying down debt, establishing reserves, investing in capital improvements, replacing equipment, adding staff, etc.

<u>Meetings</u>: The City may hold Town Hall style Transparency Forums twice each year: (1) in the month of September to review the Annual Measure "A" Report and (2) in February to discuss recommended budget priorities for Measure "A" revenues. Transparency Forums will be held on the same day as a Regular or Special meeting of the City Council. At the Presiding Officer's discretion, the Transparency Forum will be called to order either prior to the start of the City Council meeting or upon adjournment of the City Council meeting.

Town Hall style forums are more informal and offer more opportunity for community engagement than a traditional City Council meeting. Transparency Forums will have the following components:

- a. City staff will present agenda material to the audience;
- b. Subsequent to presentation of agenda material, there will be an opportunity for all attendees to pose questions and provide feedback; and
- c. City Council and staff will respond to questions and feedback from attendees.

The date, time and location of the Forums shall be noticed in an adjudicated newspaper of general circulation and posted on the City's website at least seven days prior to the scheduled Forum. Agenda materials for the meeting will be posted to the City's website no less than 72 hours prior to the noticed Forum.

### **BUDGET IMPACT:**

The Finance Department currently dedicates staff resources to preparing the annual City Budget and the Measure "A" Annual Report currently required by Ordinance as part of the Department's annual work program. Establishing the proposed Forum will have minimal impact on staff's time(?)

#### **RESOLUTION NO. 7954**

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO, CALIFORNIA, MANDATING THE CONDUCT OF AN ANNUAL TRANSPARENCY FORUM TO RECEIVE PUBLIC INPUT ON THE USE OF TRANSACTIONS AND USE TAX REVENUES; ESTABLISHING GUIDELINES FOR THE CONDUCT OF THE SAME AND REPEALING RESOLUTION 7895

**WHEREAS,** on June 4, 2013, San Fernando voters approved a half-cent temporary local Transaction and Use Tax that sunsets on October 1, 2020; and

**WHEREAS,** Chapter 82, Article V, Section 82-132 of the City Code requires an Annual Report on the collection, management, and expenditure of the Measure "A" funds prior to October 1<sup>st</sup> each year; and

**WHEREAS,** Chapter 82, Article V, Section 82-132 of the City Code also requires an overview of the Annual Report be presented to City Council at an open and public meeting and that the Annual Report be a public document; and

**WHEREAS,** on June 4, 2018, City Council approved placing a question on the November 6, 2018 ballot relating to extension of the existing half-cent local Transaction and Use Tax until it is repealed by San Fernando voters; and

**WHEREAS,** the ballot measure to extend the City's half-cent Transaction and Use Tax, Measure "A", was approved by San Fernando voters at the General Municipal Election of November 6, 2018; and

WHEREAS, as part of the City Council's review of the annual report required by Chapter 82, Article V, Section 82-132 of the San Fernando Municipal Code, the City Council wishes to maximize public input in the setting of priorities for the use of Measure "A" funds; and

**WHEREAS,** the establishment of an annual town hall style forum in which all members of the public may attend and provide testimony regarding the priorities for the use of Measure "A" funds.

# NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, FIND, DETERMINE, AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. At least once each fiscal year, concurrent with the presentation to the City Council of the annual report called for under Chapter 82, Article V, Section 82-132 of the San Fernando Municipal Code, the City Council shall conduct a public hearing wherein members of the public may offer oral or written comment concerning suggested priorities for the expenditure of Measure "A" tax revenues for the upcoming fiscal year. The annual forum shall be conduct in

accordance with those polices set forth in the document entitled "Measure A Transparency Forum Guidelines" which is attached and incorporated hereto as Exhibit "1".

<u>Section 2.</u> San Fernando City Council Resolution No. 7895 ("Resolution No. 7895") is hereby repealed, rescinded, superseded and replaced by this Resolution. Any authorization or direction given pursuant to Resolution No. 7895 is hereby rescinded.

**Section 3.** This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption. The City Clerk shall certify the adoption of this Resolution.

#### **PURPOSE:**

To review the Annual Report of collection, management and expenditure of the local half-cent Transaction and Use Tax (Measure "A") revenue as required by Chapter 82, Article V, Section 82-132 of the City Code and make non-binding recommendations to the City Council general priorities for the use of Measure "A" funds during the annual budget process.

#### **ARTICLE 1 - ORGANIZATION:**

1. The Measure "A" Transparency Forum (hereinafter Transparency Forum or Forum) shall be open to any and all interested members of the community. Community members that participate in the bi-annual Town Hall style Transparency Forums (see Article 3 – Meetings) may provide feedback to City Council and staff that will form the basis of any recommendation to City Council as it relates to the Forum's objectives as described in Article 2 of these Guidelines.

#### **ARTICLE 2 - OBJECTIVES:**

- 1. In accordance with Chapter 82, Article V, Section 82-132 of the City Code, the Annual Report of collection, management, and expenditure of local Transaction and Use Tax revenues shall be presented and considered at a Transparency Forum.
- 2. A Transparency Forum may be held to discuss general recommended budget priorities for use of Measure "A" funds as part of the annual budget process. General recommended budget priorities include, but are not limited to, paying down debt, establishing reserves, investing in capital improvements, replacing equipment, adding staff, etc.

#### **ARTICLE 3 - MEETINGS:**

1. <u>Bi-annual Meetings</u>: The City may hold Town Hall style Transparency Forums twice each year: (1) in the month of September to review the Annual Measure "A" Report as described in Article 2.1, and (2) in February to discuss recommended budget priorities for Measure "A" revenues as described in Article 2.2.

- 2. <u>Date, Time and Location</u>: The date, time and location of the Forums shall be noticed in an adjudicated newspaper of general circulation and posted on the City's website at least seven (7) days prior to the scheduled meeting. Agenda materials for the Forums will be posted to the City's website no less than seventy-two (72) hours prior to the noticed meeting. Transparency Forums will be held on the same day as a Regular or Special meeting of the City Council. At the Presiding Officer's discretion, the Transparency Forum will be called to order either prior to the start of the City Council meeting or upon adjournment of the City Council meeting.
- 3. <u>Town Hall Style Transparency Forums</u>: Town Hall style Transparency Forums are more informal and offer more opportunity for community engagement than a traditional City Council meeting. Transparency Forums will have the following components:
  - a. City staff will present agenda material to the audience; and
  - b. Subsequent to presentation of agenda material, there will be an opportunity for all attendees to pose questions and provide feedback; and
  - c. City Council and staff will respond to questions and feedback from attendees.

#### **ARTICLE 4 - AMENDMENT TO GUIDELINES:**

1. These Guidelines may be amended by resolution of the City Council.

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Adopt Resolution No. 7952 (Attachment "A") amending the Fiscal Year (FY) 2019–2020 Salary Plan to implement negotiated wage adjustments for the San Fernando Police Officers' Association (SFPOA) and the San Fernando Part-time Employees Bargaining Unit (SFPEBU);
- b. Approve the implementation of the updated and negotiated wages for all applicable employees; and
- c. Authorize the City Manager to make non-substantive corrections and execute all related documents.

# **BACKGROUND:**

- 1. On November 21, 2016, the City Council approved a four-year MOU (Contract No. 1838) with the SFPEBU that includes provisions tying certain part-time wages to their full-time equivalent for July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2020.
- 2. On June 18, 2018, the City and San Fernando Public Employees' Association (SFPEA) executed a five-year MOU that includes certain changes in salaries and benefits for the term of July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2022 (Contract No. 1887).
- 3. On August 19, 2019, the City Council approved a three-year MOU (Contract No. 1928) with San Fernando Police Civilians' Association (SFPCA) that includes certain changes in salaries and benefits for the term of July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2021.

4. On September 23, 2019, the City Council approved a five-year MOU (Contract No. 1932) with SFPOA that includes certain changes to salaries and benefits for the term of July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2024.

#### **ANALYSIS:**

# SFPOA Wage Adjustments.

The MOU between the City and SFPOA includes the following changes to employee salaries and benefits for FY 2019-2020:

- 4.0% Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) effective the first day of the first full pay period beginning after July 1, 2019, with Classic CalPERS employees picking up 1.0% of the City's CalPERS cost.
- Change in Special Assignments Pay (i.e., Field Training Officer, Motor Officer, Canine Officer, Detective, and School Resource Officer) from the current flat pay of \$400 per month to a 6.0% premium pay.
- Change in all POST Certifications Pay (i.e., Intermediate, Advanced/Bachelor Degree, Supervisory/Master Degree) from the current flat monthly stipend to 4.0% additional pay for Intermediate POST certificate, 4.0% additional pay for Advanced POST certificate or Bachelor Degree, and 2.5% additional pay for Supervisory POST certificate or a Master Degree.
- Change in Call-Back Pay (i.e., Officers called back to work after a regularly scheduled shift)
  from minimum two-hours' pay to minimum three-hours' pay. In addition, officers that are
  required to work from home for more than 15 minutes will be paid for a minimum of one-hour.
- In lieu of accruing 96 hours of Holiday Leave each year, officers will be paid eight hours per month of Holiday In-Lieu pay (non-PERSable).

In order to implement these changes, it is necessary that the FY 2019-2020 Salary Plan be amended to reflect these provisions.

# SFPEBU Wage Adjustments.

The SFPEBU MOU (Contract No. 1838) stipulates that part-time employees whose classifications do not have a Full Time Equivalent (FTE) status, and which have salary ranges above the required minimum wage, shall receive an increase in base salary that is equal to the average increase received by classifications in the City's full-time non-sworn and non-management bargaining units (i.e., SFPEA and SFPCA). In addition, such increases shall be effective on the same date as

the classifications with an FTE. There are two part-time positions (i.e., City Maintenance Helper and Public Works Maintenance Helper) that fall in this category.

Per executed MOUs for both SFPEA (Contract No. 1887) and SFPCA (Contract No. 1928), the average increases received by full-time classifications, which shall be extended to the applicable part-time classifications are as follows:

- 3% COLA, effective the first full pay period following July 1, 2019 (i.e., July 6, 2019); and
- 1% COLA, effective the first full pay period following the date the City Council adopted the SFPCA MOU (i.e., August 31, 2019).

Both SFPEA and SFPCA members received 2% and 4% COLA, respectively, effective the first full pay period following July 1, 2019, while SFPCA received another 2% COLA effective August 31, 2019. SFPCA members agreed to contribute a total of 4% of their salary to pay a portion of the City's CalPERS pension costs.

The attached Salary Plan (Resolution No. 7952) reflects these increases, as well as extension of similar increases to two unrepresented part-time confidential job classifications (i.e., Deputy City Clerk and Personnel Assistant) as with part-time general employees.

#### **BUDGET IMPACT:**

Sufficient funds are included in the FY 2019-2020 Budget to cover all the salary and benefit provisions herein addressed in this amendment. For additional information regarding the funds for the SFPOA wages, please refer to the staff report for Agenda Item No. 1 of the City Council Special Meeting of September 23, 2019.

# **CONCLUSION:**

Approval of the amended Salary Plan is necessary to implement the provisions in the executed MOUs with SFPOA and SFPEBU, respectively.

- C) Change in Call-Back Pay (i.e. Officers called back to work after a regularly scheduled shift) from minimum 2-hours' pay to minimum 3-hours' pay. In addition, officers that are required to work from home for more than 15 minutes will be paid for a minimum of 1-hour.
- D) In lieu of accruing 96 hours of Holiday Leave each year, officers will be paid 8 hours per month of Holiday In-Lieu pay (non-PERSable).

For more details on the above benefits, as well as other benefits applicable to SFPOA unit members, please refer to their current MOU (Contract No. 1932), which was adopted by the City Council on September 23, 2019.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Review applications from eligible applicants to fill the current City Council vacancy;
- b. Receive presentations and pose questions to each applicant; and
- c. Appoint an applicant to fill the City Council vacancy, defer to a future meeting, or extend the application period.

NOTE: If an applicant is appointed, the Oath of Office will be administered by the City Clerk immediately following the appointment.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

- 1. On August 19, 2019, Councilmember Antonio Lopez submitted his resignation from City Council, effective September 30, 2019.
- 2. As a General Law City, the California Government Code sets basic parameters and deadlines for filling a City Council vacancy.
- 3. The City Council Procedural Manual provides additional guidance for filling a City Council vacancy.
- 4. On September 16, 2019, the City Council discussed the process for filling the vacant City Council seat and provided staff direction regarding the preferred process.
- 5. On October 1, 2019, applications were made available at the City Clerk's Office and on the City's website for registered San Fernando voters interested in applying to fill the vacancy.

### **ANALYSIS:**

Government Code section 36512 governs the process for filling the vacancy in an elective office. Section 36512 provides that a City Council must, within 60 days from the date of the vacancy, either fill the vacancy by appointment or call a special election to fill the vacancy. The effective date of the vacancy was September 30, 2019, therefore, City Council must appoint someone to fill the vacancy or call a special election by November 29, 2019.

If the City Council does not fill the vacancy by appointment, the special election must be held on the next regularly established election date not less than 114 days from the call of the election. In this case, the next regularly established election date is the California primary election on Tuesday, March 3, 2020.

If the vacancy is filled through a special election in March 2020, the candidate receiving the most votes would serve out the remainder of the current term, which expires in November 2022. Conversely, if the vacancy is filled through an appointment by City Council, the appointee would serve through the next regular City Council election in November 2020. In that scenario, there will be three open City Council seats in November 2020 with two seats serving four-year terms and one seat serving a two-year term. Candidates will have to designate their candidacy for a particular seat.

Pursuant to direction received by City Council on September 16, 2019, and in accordance with the California Government Code and the City Council Procedural Manual, the City has set the following process:

- 1. The City publicly noticed the application period for individuals interested in filling the impending City Council vacancy in the San Fernando Sun on Thursday, October 3, 2019 and on the City's website, social media, and posted at City Hall beginning Tuesday, October 1, 2019.
- 2. To be considered, applicants must be registered voters residing in the City of San Fernando. Application packets (Attachment "A") were available beginning Tuesday, October 1, 2019, and were due to the City Clerk's Office, either in person or electronically, no later than 8:00 a.m. on Monday, October 7, 2019. Late applications were not accepted.
- 3. The City Clerk reviewed all applications to confirm that applicants are registered voters residing in the City of San Fernando and made the eligible applications available on the City's website by 9:00 a.m. on Monday, October 7, 2019. Applicant names were not released until they were confirmed as eligible and applications were posted to the City's website on Monday, October 7, 2019.

- 4. Each eligible applicant will be given three minutes to make a public statement to City Council (time allotted to each applicant may be revised by City Council).
- 5. Members of the public will have the opportunity to comment on the applicants either during regular public comment at the beginning of the meeting or after all applicants have been given the opportunity to make a statement.
- 6. Once public comment is closed, all applicants will be asked to surrender electronic devices and be sequestered in the Community Room at City Hall.
- 7. Applicants will be called upon, one at a time, and the City Council will have the opportunity to publicly ask questions to each applicant.
- 8. Once the City Council has completed questioning an applicant, the applicant may then take a seat in the Council Chambers. They will not rejoin the remaining sequestered applicants in the Community Room.
- 9. After all applicants have responded to questions from the City Council, the Mayor may: 1) call for a vote to fill the vacancy, 2) defer making the appointment to a future date, or 3) extend the application period to solicit additional applicants.
- 10. If a vote is called, the City Clerk will conduct a roll call vote and each Councilmember will announce their vote to fill the vacancy until a replacement is appointed by simple majority vote.
- 11. The City Clerk will administer the Oath of Office to the applicant appointed to fill the vacancy.

# **BUDGET IMPACT:**

The estimated cost to make an appointment to fill the impending City Council vacancy is approximately \$500 for advertising costs and staff cost to verify applicant eligibility.

According to the Los Angeles County Registrar/Recorder, the estimated cost to hold a special election in March 2020 is approximately \$65,000.

#### **CONCLUSION:**

Staff recommends the City Council provide direction to staff related to the process for filling the City Council vacancy.

Each eligible candidate will get three minutes to make a presentation of their qualifications at the City Council meeting, which will be held in the City Council Chambers at 6:00 p.m. on Monday, October 7, 2019. Applicants will then be asked to surrender their electronic devices and be sequestered in a meeting room in City Hall. Applicants will be called upon individually to respond to questions from City Council. Once City Council has completed questions to the applicant, their electronic device(s) will be returned and they may take a seat in the Council Chambers. Once all applicants have been interviewed, the Mayor may entertain a motion to vote to appoint a candidate, defer the vote to a future meeting, or extend the application period.

<u>Term of Office</u>: The term of office will be from the day of appointment and will expire upon certification of the November 3, 2020 election results.

<u>General Information Regarding the Position</u>: Regular meetings of the City Council are held at 6:00 p.m. on the first and third Monday of each month and generally last more than three hours. Additional meetings and workshops may be called as necessary. In addition to regular City Council business, the selected individual must be available to actively participate as a City Council liaison to numerous external agencies and internal Ad-Hoc Committees.

In accordance with Government Code Section 87200, members of the City Council are subject to the State's financial disclosure laws and Fair Political Practices Commission regulations and will be required to disclose their economic interests upon appointment to this office.

Currently, City Councilmembers receive a stipend of \$580 per month. Additional benefits are included in the application.

- **COMPENSATION:** The members of the City Council shall be paid compensation in the amount of \$580.00 per month.
- AUTOMOBILE ALLOWANCE: City Councilmembers may elect to receive an automobile allowance in the
  amount of \$300 per month to assist the members with the cost of using and operating their own private
  vehicle, and to offset expenses such as gasoline, auto insurance, maintenance, repair, and other
  automobile related costs and expenses. Conversely, Councilmembers may elect to be reimbursed for
  actual miles driven at the IRS determined rate.
- MEDICAL, DENTAL, AND VISION INSURANCE: City Councilmembers shall receive any and all employee medical, dental, and vision insurance benefits otherwise accorded the City's executive management employees (Department Heads). However, where a fixed Cafeteria Plan allotment is accorded for purchase of medical, dental, and vision insurance, and the Councilmember does not spend his or her entire allotment, the balance shall be placed into a deferred compensation plan (Section 457 Plan) maintained by the City.
- **RETIREMENT:** City Councilmembers shall be entitled to retirement benefits, as per the stipulations of the State of California Public Employees' Retirement Laws.
- TECHNOLOGY REIMBURSEMENT: City Councilmembers may elect to receive a technology reimbursement
  of \$100 per month in lieu of a City-issued cell phone. Members that elect to receive a City-issued cell
  phone will not receive the reimbursement.
- WELLNESS REIMBURSEMENT: The City shall reimburse City Councilmembers up to annual maximum of \$600 for reimbursable "wellness" expenses specifically incurred for health and welfare to the extent defined and permitted by Government Code, Section 53200(d). Medical exams, uninsured medical care costs, vision and dental expenses may qualify as health and welfare benefits. However, health club/fitness center membership, registration fees for health classes, and entrance fees for competitive events shall not qualify as health and welfare benefits.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Approve the appointment of Martin Pastucha as Interim Director of Public Works pending completion of recruitment for the position; and
- b. Authorize the City Manager to finalize the interim appointment process, and execute all related documents.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

- 1. On April 19, 2019, the Director of Public Works resigned to accept a position with another agency.
- 2. On May 2, 2019, staff began active recruitment for the position by advertising extensively in major professional journals, publications and websites.
- 3. Filing for the position closed on June 28, 2019, and interview of the top seven applicants was conducted on July 26, 2019 by an outside oral interview panel.
- 4. On August 15, 2019, a panel of City Department Heads that included the Deputy City Manager/Director of Community Development, Director of Recreation and Community Services, City Clerk, and the Police Chief interviewed the top three applicants. The City Manager also interviewed all three candidates the same day.
- 5. On August 16, 2019, the City Manager made a conditional offer to the top candidate. Unfortunately, the candidate accepted another position and graciously declined the City's offer. The City Manager does not feel that the other candidates meet the relevant

requirements to be successful in the position, and will invalidate the eligibility list, and restart the recruitment shortly.

6. As the recruitment process will last approximately three to four months, the City Manager has reached out to a CalPERS retiree, who had served as Director of Public Works for the cities of La Habra, Pasadena and Santa Monica, to serve in the capacity of Interim Director of Public Works pending completion of the recruitment.

#### **ANALYSIS:**

Martin Pastucha comes highly recommended having served as Director of Public Works for the following Southern California cities before retiring under CalPERS in 2016: City of La Habra (1998-2003), City of Pasadena (2003-2011), and City of Santa Monica (2011-2016). Mr. Pastucha's application and resume are included as Attachment "A."

As a CalPERS annuitant, he is eligible to return to a vacant Director position with a CalPERS member agency on an interim basis during recruitment for a permanent Director as long as the following CalPERS' requirements are met:

- The appointment must be made by the agency's governing body;
- The retiree can only be appointed to the position once (no extensions or reappointments);
- The agency must be recruiting for the permanent replacement as of the day of the retiree's appointment;
- The retiree can only work 960 hours per fiscal year for all employment combined;
- The pay rate received cannot exceed the maximum paid to employees performing comparable duties; and
- The retiree cannot receive any benefits, incentives, or any other form of compensation in addition to the hourly pay rate.

Mr. Pastucha will be available to start work as Interim Director of Public Works effective November 4, 2019, and will work full-time, Monday through Thursday, on a salaried basis, at "E" step of the position (i.e., \$12,249/Month). He will attend City Council meetings and Transportation & Safety Commission meetings as needed.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the City Council discuss the two resolutions to be presented at the 2019 League of California Cities ("League") Annual Business Meeting and provide direction to the Voting Delegate regarding the City's position on each resolution.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

- 1. The 2019 Annual League Conference is scheduled for October 16-18, 2019, in Long Beach, California. An important part of the Annual Conference is the Annual Business Meeting, where the League membership considers and takes action on resolutions that establish League policy.
- On August 5, 2019, the City Council designated Councilmember Hector Pacheco as the Voting Delegate and Vice Mayor Sylvia Ballin and Mayor Joel Fajardo as the Alternate Voting Delegates for the League's General Assembly meeting on October 18, 2019.
- 3. In July 2019, staff received the 2019 Annual Conference Resolutions Packet (Attachment "A") to be considered during the business meeting at the Annual Conference. Resolutions submitted to the General Assembly must be concurred by five cities or by city officials from at least five or more cities.

# **ANALYSIS:**

The League encourages each City Council to consider the resolutions and determine the City position on each. There are two resolutions that will be considered during the League's General Assembly meeting:

### Resolution No. 1

RESOLUTION OF THE LEAGUE OF CALIFORNIA CITIES CALLING ON THE CALIFORNIA PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION TO AMEND RULE 20A TO ADD PROJECTS IN VERY HIGH FIRE HAZARD SEVERITY ZONES TO THE LIST OF ELIGIBLITY CRITERIA AND TO INCREASE FUNDING ALLOCATIONS FOR RULE 20A PROJECTS

Summary: This Resolution in response to intensifying fire seasons and hazards associated with exposed energized utility lines, proposes that the League of California Cities (League) call upon the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to amend the Rule 20A program by expanding the criteria for undergrounding overhead utilities to include projects in Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones (VHFHSZ). This Resolution also proposes that the League call upon the CPUC to increase utilities' funding allocations for Rule 20A projects.

Fiscal Impact: The costs to the State associated with this Resolution will be related to the staff and programmatic costs to the CPUC to take the necessary measures to consider and adopt changes to Rule 20A to include projects in VHFHSZ to the list of criteria for eligibility.

This Resolution calls for an unspecified increase in funding for Rule 20A projects, inferring that portions of increased funds will go towards newly eligible high fire hazard zones. While the Resolution does not request a specific amount be allocated, it can be assumed that these increased costs will be supported by utility ratepayers. According to the CPUC, the annual allocations towards Rule 20A are \$95.7 million.

The CPUC currently reports a cumulative credit surplus valued at roughly \$1 billion that in various regions, given the approval of expanded eligibility called for by this Resolution, could be used to supplement and reduce the level of new dollars needed to make a significant impact in VHFHSZ. The CPUC follows that overhead conversion projects range from \$93,000 per mile for rural construction to \$5 million per mile for urban construction.

The Resolution states that "California is experiencing fire seasons of worsening severity" which is supported by not only the tremendous loss of property and life from recent wildfires, but also in the rising costs associated with clean up, recovery, and other economic losses with high estimates in the hundreds of billions of dollars.

The Committee may wish to consider the costs associated with undergrounding utility lines in relation to the costs associated with past wildfires and wildfires to come.

#### Resolution No. 2

A RESOLUTION OF THE LEAGUE OF CALIFORNIA CITIES CALLING UPON THE FEDERAL AND STATE GOVERNMENTS TO ADDRESS THE DEVASTATING IMPACTS OF INTERNATIONAL TRANSBOUNDARY POLLUTION FLOWS INTO THE SOUTHERNMOST REGIONS OF CALIFORNIA AND THE PACIFIC OCEAN

# **Consideration to Determine a City Position on the 2019 League of California Cities Resolutions**Page 3 of 3

Summary: This Resolution states that the League of California Cities should call upon the State and Federal governments to restore and ensure proper funding for the U.S. – Mexico Border Water Infrastructure Program (BWIP) and work bi-nationally to address water quality issues resulting from transboundary flows from Mexico's Tijuana River into the United States containing untreated sewage, polluted sediment, and trash.

Fiscal Impact: California's economy is currently the sixth largest in the world, with tourism spending topping \$140.6 billion in 2018. In the past five years, San Diego's Border Field State Park has been closed for over 800 days because of pollution from the Tijuana River. A decline in the State's beach quality and reputation could carry macroeconomic effects that could ripple outside of the San Diego County region and affect coastal communities throughout California.

#### **BUDGET IMPACT:**

There is no fiscal impact associated with taking a position on each resolution. The intended outcomes of the proposed resolutions are to increase local control and protect public health, respectively.

#### **CONCLUSION:**

Staff recommends that the City Council discuss the proposed resolutions and provide direction to the Voting Delegate regarding the City's position on each resolution.

# **GUIDELINES FOR ANNUAL CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS**

Policy development is a vital and ongoing process within the League. The principal means for deciding policy on the important issues facing cities is through the League's seven standing policy committees and the board of directors. The process allows for timely consideration of issues in a changing environment and assures city officials the opportunity to both initiate and influence policy decisions.

Annual conference resolutions constitute an additional way to develop League policy. Resolutions should adhere to the following criteria.

# **Guidelines for Annual Conference Resolutions**

- 1. Only issues that have a direct bearing on municipal affairs should be considered or adopted at the Annual Conference.
- 2. The issue is not of a purely local or regional concern.
- 3. The recommended policy should not simply restate existing League policy.
- 4. The resolution should be directed at achieving one of the following objectives:
  - (a) Focus public or media attention on an issue of major importance to cities.
  - (b) Establish a new direction for League policy by establishing general principles around which more detailed policies may be developed by policy committees and the board of directors.

**WHEREAS**, the California Public Utilities Commission regulates the undergrounding conversion of overhead utilities under Electric Tariff Rule 20 and;

**WHEREAS**, conversion projects deemed to have a public benefit are eligible to be funded by ratepayers under Rule 20A; and

**WHEREAS**, the criteria under Rule 20A largely restricts eligible projects to those along streets with high volumes of public traffic; and

**WHEREAS**, the cost of undergrounding projects that do not meet Rule 20A criteria is left mostly or entirely to property owners under other parts of Rule 20; and

WHEREAS, California is experiencing fire seasons of worsening severity; and

**WHEREAS**, undergrounding overhead utilities that can spark brush fires is an important tool in preventing them and offers a public benefit; and

**WHEREAS**, brush fires are not restricted to starting near streets with high volumes of public traffic; and

**WHEREAS**, expanding Rule 20A criteria to include Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones would facilitate undergrounding projects that would help prevent fires; and

**WHEREAS**, expanding Rule 20A criteria as described above and increasing funding allocations for Rule 20A projects would lead to more undergrounding in Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones; and now therefore let it be,

**RESOLVED** that the League of California Cities calls on the California Public Utilities Commission to amend Rule 20A to include projects in Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones to the list of criteria for eligibility and to increase funding allocations for Rule 20A projects.

### **Background Information on Resolution No. 1**

# **Background:**

Rancho Palos Verdes is the most populated California city to have 90 percent or more of residents living in a Cal Fire-designated Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone. Over the years, the Palos Verdes Peninsula has seen numerous brush fires that were determined to be caused by electrical utility equipment.

Across the state, some of the most destructive and deadly wildfires were sparked by power equipment. But when it comes to undergrounding overhead utilities, fire safety is not taken into account when considering using ratepayer funds to pay for these projects under California's Electric Tariff Rule 20 program. The program was largely intended to address visual blight when it was implemented in 1967. Under Rule 20A, utilities must allocate ratepayer funds to undergrounding conversion projects chosen by local governments that have a public benefit and meet one or more of the following criteria:

- Eliminate an unusually heavy concentration of overhead lines;
- Involve a street or road with a high volume of public traffic;
- Benefit a civic or public recreation area or area of unusual scenic interest; and,
- Be listed as an arterial street or major collector as defined in the Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR) Guidelines.

As we know, brush fires are not restricted to erupting in these limited areas. California's fire season has worsened in severity in recent years, claiming dozens of lives and destroying tens of thousands of structures in 2018 alone.

Excluding fire safety from Rule 20A eligibility criteria puts the task of undergrounding power lines in Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones squarely on property owners who are proactive, willing and able to foot the bill.

The proposed resolution calls on the California Public Utilities Commission to amend Rule 20A to include projects in Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones to the list of criteria for eligibility. To facilitate more undergrounding projects in these high-risk zones, the proposed resolution also calls on the CPUC to increase funding allocations for Rule 20A projects.

If adopted, utilities will be incentivized to prioritize undergrounding projects that could potentially save millions of dollars and many lives.

# League of California Cities Staff Analysis on Resolution No. 1

# **Summary:**

This Resolution, in response to intensifying fire seasons and hazards associated with exposed energized utility lines, proposes that the League of California Cities (League) call upon the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to amend the Rule 20A program by expanding the criteria for undergrounding overhead utilities to include projects in Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones (VHFHSZ). This Resolution also proposes that the League call upon the CPUC to increase utilities' funding allocations for Rule 20A projects.

# **Background**

#### California Wildfires and Utilities

Over the last several years, the increasing severity and frequency of California's wildfires have prompted state and local governments to seek urgent prevention and mitigation actions. Record breaking wildfires in Northern and Southern California in both 2017 and 2018 have caused destruction and loss of life. This severe fire trend has local officials seeking solutions to combat what is now a year-round fire season exacerbated by years of drought, intense weather patterns, untamed vegetation and global warming.

These conditions create a dangerous catalyst for wildfires caused by utilities as extreme wind and weather events make downed power lines more of a risk. In response to recent catastrophic wildfires, Governor Newsom established a Strike Force tasked with developing a "comprehensive roadmap" to address issues related to wildfires, climate change, and utilities. The Strike Force report acknowledges that measures to harden the electrical grid are critical to wildfire risk management. A key utility hardening strategy: undergrounding lines in extreme high-fire areas.

Governor Newsom's Wildfire Strike Force program report concludes, "It's not a question of "if" wildfire will strike, but "when."

#### **Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones**

This Resolution seeks to expand the undergrounding of overhead utility lines in VHFHSZ. California Government Code Section 51178 requires the Director of the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CalFIRE) to identify areas in the state as VHFHSZ based on the potential fire hazard in those areas. VHFHSZ are determined based on fuel loading, slope, fire weather, and other relevant factors. These zones are in both local responsibility areas and state responsibility areas. Maps of the statewide and county by county VHFHSZ can be found <a href="here.">here.</a> <sup>1</sup>

More than 25 million acres of California wildlands are classified under very high or extreme fire threat. Approximately 25 percent of the state's population, 11 million people, live in those high-risk areas. Additionally, over 350,000 Californians live in cities that are nearly encompassed within Cal Fire's maps of VHFHSZ. Similar to the proponents of this Resolution, City of Rancho Palos Verdes, over 75 communities have 90 percent or more of residents living in a VHFHSZ.

### **CPUC Rule 20 Program**

The CPUC's Rule 20 program lays out the guidelines and procedures for converting overhead electric and telecommunication facilities to underground electric facilities. Rule 20 funding and criteria is provided at four levels. Levels A, B, and C, reflect progressively diminishing ratepayer funding for undergrounding projects. Recently added Rule 20D is a relatively new program that is specific to San Diego Gas and Electric (SDG&E), which was created in response to the destructive 2007 wildfires. Each of these levels will be discussed below:

#### Rule 20A

The first California overhead conversion program, Rule 20A, was created in 1967 under then Governor Ronald Reagan. The program was created to provide a consistent and structured means of undergrounding utility lines throughout the state with costs covered broadly by utility ratepayers.

Each year, Investor Owned Utilities (IOUs) propose their Rule 20A allocation amounts to the CPUC during annual general rate case proceedings. In this process, IOUs propose revised utility customer rates based on expected service costs, new energy procurement and projects for the following year, including Rule 20 allocations. The CPUC then reviews, amends, and approves IOU rates. Currently, the cumulative budgeted amount for Rule 20A for Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E), Southern California Edison (SCE), and San Diego Gas and Electric (SDG&E) totals around \$95.7 million.

The funding set aside by IOUs for Rule 20A is allocated to local governments through a credit system, with each credit holding a value to be used solely for the costs of an undergrounding project. The credit system was created so that local governments and IOUs can complete undergrounding projects without municipal financing. Through Rule 20A, municipalities that have developed and received city council approval for an undergrounding plan receive annual credits from the IOU in their service area. At the last count by the CPUC, over 500 local governments (cities and counties) participate in the credit system.

While these credits have no inherent monetary value, they can be traded in or banked for the conversion of overhead lines. Municipalities can choose to accumulate their credits until their credit balance is sufficient to cover these conversion projects, or choose to borrow future undergrounding allocations for a period of up to five years. Once the cumulative balance of credits is sufficient to cover the cost of a conversion project, the municipality and the utility can move forward with the undergrounding. All of the planning, design, and construction is performed by the participating utility. Upon the completion of an undergrounding project, the utility is compensated through the local government's Rule 20A credits.

At the outset of the program, the amount of allocated credits were determined by a formula which factored in the number of utility meters within a municipality in comparison to the utilities' service territory. However, in recent years the formula has changed. Credit allocations for IOUs, except for PG&E, are now determined based on the allocation a city or county received in 1990 and is then adjusted for the following factors:

- 50% of the *change from the 1990* total budgeted amount is allocated for the ratio of the number of overhead meters in any city or unincorporated area to the total system overhead meters; and
- 50% of the *change from the 1990* total budgeted amount is allocated for the ratio of the number of meters (which includes older homes that have overhead services, and newer homes with completely underground services) in any city or the unincorporated area to the total system meters.

As noted, PG&E has a different funding formula for their Rule 20A credit allocations as they are not tied to the 1990 base allocation. Prior to 2011, PG&E was allocating approximately five to six percent of its revenue to the Rule 20A program. The CPUC decided in 2011 that PG&E's Rule 20A allocations should be reduced by almost half in an effort to decrease the growing accumulation of credits amongst local governments. Since 2011, PG&E's annual allocations for Rule 20A have been around \$41.3 million annually, which is between two and three percent of their total revenue.

# Criteria for Rule 20A Projects

For an undergrounding project to qualify for the Rule 20A program, there are several criteria that need to be met. The project must have a public benefit and:

- 1. Eliminate an unusually heavy concentration of overhead lines
- 2. Involve a street or road with a high volume of public traffic
- 3. Benefit a civic or public recreation area or area of unusual scenic interest,
- 4. Be listed as an arterial street or major collector as defined in the Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR) Guidelines

Notably, fire safety is excluded from the list of criteria that favors aesthetic and other public safety projects.

# **Rule 20A Credit System Imbalance Threatens Program Effectiveness**

Allocations are made by utilities each year for Rule 20A credits. These current budget allocations total \$95.7 million a year. Currently, the cumulative balance of credits throughout the state totals over \$1 billion dollars. The Rule 20A cumulative balances aggregated by region can be found <a href="here">here</a>.<sup>2</sup>

Note: The existing credit allocation formulas do not consider a municipality's need or plans for overhead conversion projects, resulting in large credit balances in some jurisdictions.

Cities and counties are, however, able to trade or sell unallocated Rule 20A credits if they will not be used to fund local undergrounding projects. There have been several cases where one agency has sold their unused credits, often for less than the full dollar value of the credits themselves to another agency.

#### Rule 20B

Rule 20B projects are those that do not fit the Rule 20A criteria, but do, however, involve both sides of the street for at least 600 feet. These projects are typically done in conjunction with larger developments and are mostly paid for by the developer or applicant. Additionally, the applicant is responsible for the installation.

#### Rule 20C

Rule 20C projects are usually small projects that involve property owners. The majority of the cost is usually borne by the applicants. Rule 20C applies when the project does not qualify for either Rule 20A or Rule 20B.

# Rule 20D--Wildfire Mitigation Undergrounding Program

Rule 20D was approved by the CPUC in January of 2014 and only applies to SDG&E. The Rule 20D program was established largely in response to the destructive wildfires that occurred in San Diego in 2007 as a wildfire mitigation undergrounding program. According to SDG&E, the objective of the Rule 20D undergrounding is exclusively for fire hardening as opposed to aesthetics. The program is limited in scope and is restricted to communities in SDG&E's Fire Threat Zone (now referred to as the <u>High Fire Threat District or HFTD</u>). As of this time, the program has yet to yield any projects and no projects are currently planned.

For an undergrounding project to qualify for the Rule 20D program, a minimum of three of the following criteria must be met. The project must be near, within, or impactful to:

- Critical electric infrastructure
- Remaining useful life of electric infrastructure
- Exposure to vegetation or tree contact
- Density and proximity of fuel
- Critical surrounding non-electric assets (including structures and sensitive environmental areas)
- Service to public agencies
- Accessibility for firefighters

Similar to Rule 20A, SDG&E must allocate funding each year through their general rate case proceedings to Rule 20D to be approved by the CPUC. This funding is separate from the allocations SDG&E makes for Rule 20A. However, the process of distributing this funding to localities is different. The amount of funding allocated to each city and county for Rule 20D is based on the ratio of the number of miles of overhead lines in SDG&E Fire Threat Zones in a city or county to the total miles of SDG&E overhead lines in the entire SDG&E fire zone. The

Rule 20D program is administered by the utility consistent with the existing reporting, engineering, accounting, and management practices for Rule 20A.

The Committee may want to consider whether Rule 20D should instead be expanded, adapted, or further utilized to support funding for overhead conversions within VHFHSZ throughout the state.

### **Fiscal Impact:**

The costs to the State associated with this Resolution will be related to the staff and programmatic costs to the CPUC to take the necessary measures to consider and adopt changes to Rule 20A to include projects in VHFHSZ to the list of criteria for eligibility.

This Resolution calls for an unspecified increase in funding for Rule 20A projects, inferring that portions of increased funds will go towards newly eligible high fire hazard zones. While the Resolution does not request a specific amount be allocated, it can be assumed that these increased costs will be supported by utility ratepayers. According to the CPUC, the annual allocations towards Rule 20A are \$95.7 million.

The CPUC currently reports a cumulative credit surplus valued at roughly \$1 billion that in various regions, given the approval of expanded eligibility called for by this Resolution, could be used to supplement and reduce the level of new dollars needed to make a significant impact in VHFHSZ. The CPUC follows that overhead conversion projects range from \$93,000 per mile for rural construction to \$5 million per mile for urban construction.

The Resolution states that "California is experiencing fire seasons of worsening severity" which is supported by not only the tremendous loss of property and life from recent wildfires, but also in the rising costs associated with clean up, recovery, and other economic losses with high estimates in the hundreds of billions of dollars

The Committee may wish to consider the costs associated with undergrounding utility lines in relation to the costs associated with past wildfires and wildfires to come.

# CPUC Currently Exploring Revisions to Rule 20

In May 2017, the CPUC issued an Order Instituting Rulemaking to Consider Revisions to Electric Rule 20 and Related Matters. The CPUC will primarily focus on revisions to Rule 20A but may make conforming changes to other parts of Rule 20. The League is a party in these proceedings will provide comments.

# Beyond Rule 20A: Additional Options for Funding Undergrounding Projects

There are various ways in which cities can generate funding for undergrounding projects that fall outside of the scope of Rule 20A. At the local level, cities can choose to forgo the Rule 20A process and opt to use their own General Fund money for undergrounding. Other options are also discussed below:

# Rule 20D Expansion

The City of Berkley in a 2018 study titled "Conceptual Study for Undergrounding Utility Wires in Berkley," found that the city could possibly qualify for Rule 20D funding if they actively pursued this opportunity in partnership with PG&E and the CPUC.

One of the study's recommendations is to advocate for release of 20D funds (now earmarked exclusively for SDG&E) to be used for more aggressive fire hardening techniques for aboveground utility poles and equipment, for undergrounding power lines, and for more aggressive utility pole and vegetation management practices in the Very High Hazard Fire Zone within Berkeley's city limits.

As an alternative to changing the criteria for Rule 20A, the Committee may wish to consider whether there is the opportunity to advocate for the expansion of Rule 20D funding more broadly, expanding its reach to all IOU territories.

# Franchise Surcharge Fees

Aside from Rule 20 allocations, cities can generate funding for undergrounding through franchise fee surcharges. For example, SDG&E currently operates under a 50-year City franchise that was granted in 1970. Under the franchises approved by the San Diego City Council in December 1970, SDG&E agreed to pay a franchise fee to the City equivalent to 3% of its gross receipts from the sales of both natural gas and electricity for 30 years.

These fees were renegotiated in 2000 and in 2001 an agreement was between the City of San Diego, SDG&E, and the CPUC to extend the existing franchise fee to include revenues collected from surcharges. SDG&E requested an increase of 3.88% to its existing electric franchise fee surcharge. The bulk, 3.53% of this increase is to be used for underground conversion of overhead electric wires.

Based on SDG&E's revenue projections, the increase would result in an additional surcharge revenue amount of approximately \$36.5 million per year. SDG&E estimates that this would create a monthly increase of approximately \$3.00 to a typical residential customer's electric bill. These surcharge revenues would pay for additional undergrounding projects including those that do not meet the Rule 20A criteria. The City of Santa Barbara has also adopted a similar franchise surcharge fee.

Having this funding source allows the City of San Diego to underground significantly more miles of above ground utility lines than other municipalities. However, the surcharge is currently being challenged in court, as it is argued that the City had SDG&E impose a tax without a ballot measure.

# Utility Bankruptcy and Undergrounding Funding

In considering this Resolution, it is important to understand that Rule 20A allocations have been more substantial in the past. As mentioned earlier, prior to 2011, PG&E was allocating approximately 5% to 6% of its revenue to the Rule 20A program. Therefore, it is not unreasonable to encourage an increase in Rule 20A allocations as history shows that utilities had the capacity to do so in the past.

However, in a time where IOUs such as PG&E are facing bankruptcy as the result of utility caused wildfires, there is the possibility that expanding rule 20A funding will generate more costs for the ratepayers.

### **Questions to Consider:**

- 1) Is Rule 20A or Rule 20D the more appropriate program to advocate for such an expansion?
- 2) Are there any wildfire risks outside of VHFHSZ that could be mitigated by undergrounding projects?



**WHEREAS**, international transboundary rivers that carry water across the border from Mexico into Southern California are a major source of sewage, trash, chemicals, heavy metals and toxins; and

**WHEREAS,** transboundary flows threaten the health of residents in the United States and Mexico, harm important estuarine land and water of international significance, force closure of beaches, damage farmland, adversely impact the South San Diego County and Imperial County economy; compromise border security, and directly affect U.S. military readiness; and

WHEREAS, a significant amount of untreated sewage, sediment, hazardous chemicals and trash have been entering southern California through both the Tijuana River Watershed (75 percent of which is within Mexico) and New River flowing into southern California's coastal waterways and residential and agricultural communities in Imperial County eventually draining into the Salton Sea since the 1930s; and

**WHEREAS**, in February 2017, an estimated 143 million gallons of raw sewage flowed into the Tijuana River and ran downstream into the Pacific Ocean and similar cross border flows have caused beach closures at Border Field State Park that include 211 days in 2015; 162 days in 2016; 168 days in 2017; 101 days in 2018; and 187 days to date for 2019 as well as closure of a number of other beaches along the Pacific coastline each of those years; and

**WHEREAS,** approximately 132 million gallons of raw sewage has discharged into the New River flowing into California through communities in Imperial County, with 122 million gallons of it discharged in a 6-day period in early 2017; and

**WHEREAS**, the presence of pollution on state and federal public lands is creating unsafe conditions for visitors; these lands are taxpayer supported and intended to be managed for recreation, resource conservation and the enjoyment by the public, and

**WHEREAS**, the current insufficient and degrading infrastructure in the border zone poses a significant risk to the public health and safety of residents and the environment on both

sides of the border, and places the economic stress on cities that are struggling to mitigate the negative impacts of pollution; and

**WHEREAS,** the 1944 treaty between the United States and Mexico regarding *Utilization* of Waters of the Colorado and Tijuana Rivers and of the Rio Grande allocates flows on transborder rivers between Mexico and the United States, and provides that the nations, through their respective sections of the International Boundary Water Commission shall give control of sanitation in cross border flows the highest priority; and

WHEREAS, in 1993, the United States and Mexico entered into the Agreement Between the Government of the United States of America and the Government of the United Mexican States Concerning the Establishment of a North American Development Bank which created the North American Development Bank (NADB) to certify and fund environmental infrastructure projects in border-area communities; and

**WHEREAS**, public concerns in response to widespread threats to public health and safety, damage to fish and wildlife resources and degradation to California's environment resulting from transboundary river flow pollution in the southernmost regions of the state requires urgent action by the Federal and State governments, and

**WHEREAS,** Congress authorized funding under the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Safe Drinking Water Act and established the State and Tribal Assistance Grants (STAG) program for the U.S.-Mexico Border Water Infrastructure Program (BWIP) in 1996 to provide grants for high-priority water, wastewater, and storm-water infrastructure projects within 100 kilometers of the southern border; and

**WHEREAS**, the EPA administers the STAG and BWIP programs, and coordinates with the North American Development Bank (NADB) to allocate BWIP grant funds to projects in the border zone; and

**WHEREAS,** since its inception, the BWIP program has provided funding for projects in California, Arizona, New Mexico and Texas that would not have been constructed without the grant program; and

**WHEREAS,** the BWIP program was initially funded at \$100 million per year, but, over the last 20 years, has been continuously reduced to its current level of \$10 million; and

**WHEREAS,** in its FY 2020 Budget Request, the Administration proposed to eliminate the BWIP program; and

**WHEREAS,** officials from EPA Region 9, covering California, have identified a multitude of BWIP-eligible projects along the southern border totaling over \$300 million; and

**WHEREAS,** without federal partnership through the BWIP program and state support to address pollution, cities that are impacted by transboundary sewage and toxic waste flows are

left with limited resources to address a critical pollution and public health issue and limited legal remedies to address the problem; and

**WHEREAS**, the National Association of Counties, (NACo) at their Annual Conference on July 15, 2019 and the U.S. Conference of Mayors at their Annual Conference on in July 1, 2019 both enacted resolutions calling on the federal and state governments to work together to fund and address this environmental crisis; and

**WHEREAS**, local governments and the public support the State's primary objectives in complying with environmental laws including the Clean Water Act, Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act, and Endangered Species Act and are supported by substantial public investments at all levels of government to maintain a healthy and sustainable environment for future residents of California, and

**WHEREAS,** League of California Cities policy has long supported efforts to ensure water quality and oppose contamination of water resources; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** at the League General Assembly, assembled at the League Annual Conference on October 18, 2019 in Long Beach, that the League calls upon the Federal and State governments to restore and ensure proper funding to the U.S- Mexico Border Water Infrastructure Program (BWIP) and recommit to working binationally to develop and implement long-term solutions to address serious water quality and contamination issues, such as discharges of untreated sewage and polluted sediment and trashladen transboundary flows originating from Mexico, that result in significant health, environmental, and safety concerns in communities along California's southern border impacting the state.

#### **Background Information on Resolution No. 2**

#### Background:

Along California's southern border with Mexico, the New River in Imperial County and the Tijuana River in San Diego County are a major sources of raw sewage, trash, chemicals, heavy metals, and toxins that pollute local communities. Sewage contaminated flows in the Tijuana River have resulted in significant impacts to beach recreation that includes the closure of Border Field State Beach for more than 800 days over the last 5-years. Similarly, contaminated flows in the New River presents comparable hazards, impacts farm land, and contributes to the ongoing crisis in the Salton Sea. These transboundary flows threaten the health of residents in California and Mexico, harms the ecosystem, force closures at beaches, damage farm land, makes people sick, and adversely affects the economy of border communities. The root cause of this cross border pollution is from insufficient or failing water and wastewater infrastructure in the border zone and inadequate federal action to address the problem through existing border programs.

The severity of cross border pollution has continued to increase, due in part to the rapid growth of urban centers since the passage of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). While economic growth has contributed to greater employment, the environmental infrastructure of the region has not kept pace, which is why Congress authorized the Border Water Infrastructure Program (BWIP) in 1996. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) administers the BWIP and coordinates with the North American Development Bank (NADB) to provide financing and technical support for projects on both sides of the U.S./Mexico border. Unfortunately, the current BWIP funding at \$10 million per year is only a fraction of the initial program budget that shares funding with the entire 2,000 mile Mexican border with California, Arizona, New Mexico and Texas. EPA officials from Region 9 have identified an immediate need for BWIP projects totaling over \$300 million just for California. Without federal partnerships through the BWIP and state support to address cross border pollution, cities that are impacted by transboundary sewage and toxic waste flows are left with limited resources to address a critical pollution and public health issue.

The International Boundary and Water Commission (IBWC) is another important federal stakeholder that, under the Treaty of 1944 with Mexico, must address border sanitation problems. While IBWC currently captures and treats some of the pollution generated in Mexico, it also redirects cross border flows without treatment directly into California.

Improving environmental and public health conditions for communities along the border is essential for maintaining strong border economy with Mexico. The IBWC, EPA, and NADB are the important federal partners with existing bi-national programs that are able to immediately implement solutions on cross border pollution. California is in a unique position to take the lead and work with local and federal partners to implement real solutions that will addresses the long standing and escalating water quality crisis along the border.

For those reasons, the cities of Imperial Beach and Coronado requested the San Diego County Division to propose a resolution at the 2019 League Annual Conference calling upon the federal

and state governments to address the devastating impacts of international transboundary pollution flows into the waterways of the southernmost regions of California, San Diego and Imperial Counties and the Pacific Ocean.

On August 12, 2019 at the regularly scheduled meeting of the San Diego County Division, the membership unanimously endorsed submittal of the resolution, with close to 75% membership present and voting.

The Imperial County Division does not have a schedule meeting until after the deadline to submit proposed resolutions. However, the City of Calexico, which is most directly impacted by initial pollution flow of the New River from Mexicali, sent a letter in concurrence of this resolution as well as numerous city official from cities within Imperial County and the Imperial County Board of Supervisors. The League Imperial County Division will place a vote to support this resolution on the agenda of their September 26, 2019 meeting.

#### League of California Cities Staff Analysis on Resolution No. 2

#### **Summary:**

This Resolution states that the League of California Cities should call upon the State and Federal governments to restore and ensure proper funding for the U.S. – Mexico Border Water Infrastructure Program (BWIP) and work bi-nationally to address water quality issues resulting from transboundary flows from Mexico's Tijuana River into the United States containing untreated sewage, polluted sediment, and trash.

#### **Background:**

The League of California Cities' San Diego County Division is sponsoring this resolution to address their concerns over the contaminated flows from the Tijuana River into California that have resulted in the degradation of water quality and water recreational areas in Southern California.

The Tijuana River flows north through highly urbanized areas in Mexico before it enters the Tijuana River Estuary and eventually the Pacific Ocean via waterways in San Diego County in California. Urban growth in Tijuana has contributed to a rise in rates of upstream flows from water treatment facilities in Mexico. These treatment facilities have raised the amount of untreated sewage and waste in the Tijuana River due to faulty infrastructure and improper maintenance. The federal government refers to the river as an "impaired water body" because of the presence of pollutants in excess, which pose significant health risks to residents and visitors in communities on both sides of the border.

#### Federal Efforts to Address Pollution Crisis

To remedy the Tijuana River's low water quality, the United States and Mexico entered into a Treaty in 1944 entitled: *Utilization of Waters of the Colorado River and Tijuana Rivers and of the Rio Grande – the International Boundary and Water Commission* (IBWC). The IBWC was designed to consist of a United States section and a Mexico section. Both sections were tasked with negotiating and implementing resolutions to address water pollution in the area, which includes overseeing the development of water treatment and diversion infrastructure.

After the formation of the IBWC, the U.S. and Mexico entered into a treaty in 1993 entitled: Agreement Concerning the Establishment of a Border Environment Cooperation Commission and a North American Development Bank. This agreement established the North American Development Bank (NADB), which certifies and funds infrastructure projects located within 100 kilometers (62 miles) of the border line. The NADB supports federal programs like the Border Water Infrastructure Program (BWIP), which was initially funded at \$100 million, annually.

The degradation of existing water treatment infrastructure along the border coincides with the federal government's defunding of the BWIP, which has steadily decreased from \$100 million in 1996 to \$10 million today. The Federal FY 2020 Budget proposes eliminating BWIP funding

altogether. EPA's regions 6 and 9 (includes U.S. states that border Mexico) have identified a number of eligible projects that address public health and environmental conditions along the border totaling \$340 million.

The NADB has funded the development of water infrastructure in both the U.S. and Mexico. Water diversion and treatment infrastructure along the U.S – Mexico border includes, but is not limited to, the following facilities:

- The South Bay International Wastewater Treatment Plant (SBIWTP). This facility was constructed by the U.S. in 1990 and is located on the California side of the border and is operated under the jurisdiction of the IBWC. The SBIWTP serves as a diversion and treatment sewage plant to address the flow of untreated sewage from Mexico into the United States.
- *Pump Station CILA*. CILA was constructed by Mexico in 1991 and is located along the border in Mexico. This facility serves as the SBIWTP's Mexican counterpart.

Both the SBIWTP and CILA facilities have had a multitude of overflows containing untreated sewage and toxic waste that spills into the Tijuana River. The cause of overflows can be attributed to flows exceeding the maximum capacity that the infrastructure can accommodate (this is exacerbated during wet and rainy seasons) and failure to properly operate and maintain the facilities. Much of the existing infrastructure has not had updates or repairs for decades, causing overflows to become more frequent and severe. The most notable overflow occurred in February 2017, wherein 143 million gallons of polluting waste discharged into the Tijuana River; affecting the Tijuana Estuary, the Pacific Ocean, and Southern California's waterways.

#### State Actions

In response to the February 2017 overflow, the San Diego Water Board's Executive Officer sent a letter to the U.S. and Mexican IBWC Commissioners which included recommendations on how to improve existing infrastructure and communications methods between both nations.

In September of 2018, California Attorney General Xavier Becerra submitted a lawsuit against IBWC for Violating the Clean Water Act by allowing flows containing sewage and toxic waste to flow into California's waterways, posing a public health and ecological crisis. The cities of Imperial Beach, San Diego, Chula Vista, the Port of San Diego, and the San Diego Regional Water Quality Board have also filed suit against the IBWC. The suit is awaiting its first settlement conference on October 19, 2019. If parties are unable to reach a settlement, the case will go to trial.

#### **Fiscal Impact:**

California's economy is currently the sixth largest in the world, with tourism spending topping \$140.6 billion in 2018. In the past five years, San Diego's Border Field State Park has been closed for over 800 days because of pollution from the Tijuana River. A decline in the State's beach quality and reputation could carry macroeconomic effects that could ripple outside of the San Diego County region and affect coastal communities throughout California.

#### **Existing League Policy**

The League of California Cities has extensive language on water in its Summary of Existing Policy and Guiding Principles. Fundamentally, the League recognizes that beneficial water quality is essential to the health and welfare of California and all of its citizens. Additionally, the League advocates for local, state and federal governments to work cooperatively to ensure that water quality is maintained.

The following policy relates to the issue of water quality:

- Surface and groundwater should be protected from contamination.
- Requirements for wastewater discharge into surface water and groundwater to safeguard public health and protect beneficial uses should be supported.
- When addressing contamination in a water body, water boards should place priority emphasis on clean-up strategies targeting sources of pollution, rather than in stream or end-of-pipe treatment.
- Water development projects must be economically, environmentally and scientifically sound.
- The viability of rivers and streams for instream uses such as fishery habitat, recreation and aesthetics must be protected.
- Protection, maintenance, and restoration of fish and wildlife habitat and resources.

#### **Comments:**

- 1. Water quality issues are prevalent across California and have been a constant priority of the State's legislature and residents. In 2014, California's voters approved Proposition 1, which authorized \$7.5 billion in general obligation bonds to fund water quality improvement projects. In 2019, the Legislature reached an agreement to allocate \$130 million from the State's Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (GGRF) to address failing water infrastructure and bad water qualities for over one million of California's residents in rural communities. Water quality is not an issue unique to the County of San Diego and communities along the border.
- 2. Tijuana River cross-border pollution has caught national attention. Members of Congress have proposed recent funding solutions to address the pollution crisis, including:
  - In February of 2019, California Congressional Representatives Vargas, Peters, and Davis helped secure \$15 million for the EPA to use as part of its BWIP.
  - H.R. 3895 (Vargas, Peters, 2019), The North American Development Bank Pollution Solution Act. This bill seeks to support pollution mitigation efforts along the border by increasing the NADB's capital by \$1.5 billion.
  - *H.R.* 4039 (Levin, 2019), The Border Water Infrastructure Improvement Act. This bill proposes increasing funding to the BWIP from the existing \$10 million to \$150 million as a continuous appropriation until 2025.

Additionally, the National Association of Counties (NACo) and the U.S. Conference of Mayors enacted resolutions in support of increased funding for U.S. – Mexico border water infrastructure to address the environmental crisis in 2019.

3. The border pollution problem has sparked action from local, state, and federal actors. Should this resolution be adopted, League membership should be aware that future action will be adapted by what is explicitly stated in the resolution's language. In current form, the resolution's resolve clause cites the BWIP as the only program that should receive reinstated and proper funding. League staff recommends the language be modified to state:

"NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED at the League General Assembly, assembled at the League Annual Conference on October 18, 2019 in Long Beach, that the League calls upon the Federal and State governments to restore and ensure proper funding *for environmental infrastructure on the U.S. – Mexico Border, including to the U.S. – Mexico Border Water Infrastructure Program* (BWIP), and recommit to working bi-nationally to develop and implement long-term solutions to address serious water quality and contamination issues, such as discharges of untreated sewage and polluted sediment and trash-laden transboundary flows originating from Mexico, that result in significant health, environmental, and safety concerns in communities along California's southern border impacting the state."

Modifying the language would ensure enough flexibility for the League to support funding mechanisms outside of the prescribed federally-operated BWIP.

4. It remains unclear if there is an appetite in Washington to fund border-related infrastructure projects that address environmental quality. Given the high probability of another overflow containing waste and sewage from the existing infrastructure operated by the IBWC, League membership should consider the outcome if no resolution is reached to address the issue.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the City Council:

#### **BACKGROUND:**

- During Fiscal Year 2015-2016, the City Council created a Veterans Appreciation Event Ad Hoc Committee comprised of Councilmember Gonzales and Councilmember Soto. The goal of the Committee was to develop a special event to honor United States Armed Forces veterans residing in the City of San Fernando.
- 2. On August 7, 2017, the City Council approved allocating \$3,500 from the Independent Cities Finance Authority's Community Outreach Program to a Veterans Recognition Program.
- 3. On November 7, 2018, Recreation and Community Services (RCS) staff met with representatives of the American Legion to discuss possible events and obtain feedback from its members on the type of event that would be fitting to honor veterans.
- 4. On January 29, 2019, RCS staff met with the Ad Hoc Committee, currently comprised of Mayor Fajardo and Councilmember Gonzales, to discuss the American Legion members' feedback

about a possible veterans event. The discussion led to the concept of initiating a pole banner program to recognize veterans.

5. On September 16, 2019, RCS staff met with the Ad Hoc Committee to finalize the Veterans Recognition Program, and targeted the month of November 2019 for an unveiling ceremony.

#### **ANALYSIS:**

The Ad Hoc Committee was formed in 2016 to explore hosting a special event to honor veterans currently, or previously, residing in the City of San Fernando. The project was delayed due to staff shortages and placed on-hold pending the appointment of a permanent City Manager. The original Ad Hoc Committee included Councilmembers Soto and Gonzales. However, after the 2018 City Council elections, the Ad Hoc Committee was reconstituted, replacing outgoing Councilmember Soto with Mayor Fajardo.

Staff began researching types of events to honor and demonstrate the City's appreciation for local veterans. In an effort to get feedback from a local veterans stakeholder group, RCS staff met with American Legion San Fernando Post 176 president and board members on November 7, 2018.

The overwhelming feedback from the group was that a one-time event was not suitable. The American Legion members suggested a more permanent recognition to honor veterans that currently, or previously, reside in the City of San Fernando.

On January 29, 2019, RCS staff met with the Ad Hoc Committee to discuss the preference of the veterans for an ongoing tribute rather than a one-day event. As a result, the idea of a Veterans Recognition Banner Program was introduced to create pole banners with a veteran's likeness, name, rank, and branch of military service. Staff began to research similar programs in neighboring cities, and evaluated banner dimensions, cost and an application process for installing the banners.

On September 16, 2019, the Ad Hoc Committee met to finalize the proposed Veterans Recognition Banner Program. The proprosed program will be open current and former San Fernando residents, with priority given to current residents. Applications may be submitted by a veteran or family member of a veteran. Veterans must have an honorable or general discharge from service to qualify for the banner program.

To promote the Veterans Recognition Program, the City will host a Banner Reveal event on or around Veterans Day, which is November 11, 2019. This promotion will create news coverage and social media content to highlight the contributions made by veterans while protecting freedom. The American Legion Post 176 and the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) will be invited

to be honored guests. The event will serve in part to promote the services veterans may obtain at the American Legion and the VFW posts. The details of the Banner Reveal event will be disseminated once finalized.

#### **BUDGET IMPACT:**

City Coucil approved allocating \$3,500 from the Independent Cities Finance Authority's (ICFA) Community Outreach Program to establish the Veterans Recognition Program. These funds will be used to establish the event. After the initial Banner Reveal event, the intent is to have the Veterans Recognition Program be self-sustaining, with future banners being funded through the application fee and potential donations to the program.

The estimated cost to produce and install a double-sided banner is approximately \$80 plus an additional \$50 to purchase brackets for light poles. There are currently 14 light poles that have brackets sufficient to hang the banners. Banners will be placed on those poles first.

Staff will present a suggested application fee schedule and costs to install additional brackets at subsequent to the kickoff event in November.

#### **CONCLUSION:**

It is recommended that the City Council approve the Veterans Recognition Program, authorize the City Manager to establish a Veterans Recognition Program account to manage revenue and expenditures of the program.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

#### **BACKGROUND AND ANALYSIS:**

The City of San Fernando and City Clerk Elena G. Chávez entered into an employment agreement on December 7, 2015 (Master Agreement). Section 4.5 of the Master Agreement allows the parties to amend the agreement provided such amendments are memorialized in the form of a written amendment approved by the City Council and signed by the Mayor. The Master Agreement has been amended twice previously.

Under the terms of the City Clerk's employment contract as presently constituted, a formal performance evaluation must be conducted and completed within a fixed window of time starting September 1<sup>st</sup> of each year and ending by or before November 15<sup>th</sup> of the same year. In the interest of creating greater flexibility in the scheduling of performance evaluations for the City Clerk, it is proposed that the City Council approve the Third Amendment to the Master Agreement that will allow the City Council to conduct one formal evaluation that may be scheduled at any time during each City fiscal year and a maximum of four informal evaluations that may be conducted once each quarter on an as-needed basis. This language is similar to the language set forth in the recently approved City Manager employment contract.

#### **RECITALS**

WHEREAS, the Parties executed and entered into an employment agreement dated December 7, 2015 and entitled "2015 City Clerk Employment Agreement – Employee: Elena G. Chávez", Contract No. 1804 (hereinafter, the "Master Agreement") and

WHEREAS, the Parties later executed a first amendment to the Master Agreement dated as of April 17 2017, Contract No. 1804(a) (hereinafter, the "First Amendment") and a second amendment to the Master Agreement dated as of April 16, 2018, Contract No. 1804(b) (hereinafter, the "Second Amendment") which modified provisions of the Master Agreement (collectively, the "Prior Amendments") (A true and correct copy of the Master Agreement as amended by way of the Prior Amendments is attached and incorporated hereto as Exhibit "A");

WHEREAS, the Parties now wish to modify the Master Agreement further to create greater flexibility in the scheduling of Chávez's annual performance evaluation; and

WHEREAS, Section 4.5 (Amendments) of the Master Agreement allows the Parties to amend the Master Agreement provided such amendments are memorialized in the form of a written amendment approved by the San Fernando City Council ("City Council") and signed by the Mayor; and

WHEREAS, execution of this Amendment was approved in open session at the City Council's regular meeting of \_\_\_\_\_\_ 2019 under Agenda Item No. \_\_\_\_\_ as required under Government Code Section 53262.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual agreements contained herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, and intending to be legally bound hereby, the Parties agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The existing text of Subsection (A) of Section 1.9 (Performance Evaluation) of the Master Agreement as amended by way of the Prior Amendments is hereby amended in its entirety to now state the following:

A. Performance evaluations are an important way for the City Council and Chávez to ensure effective communications about City Council expectations and Chávez's performance. The City Council reserves the right to conduct a general job performance evaluation and review of Chávez at least once each fiscal year. In addition, the City Council

reserves the right to conduct an informal job performance review once each fiscal year quarter on an as-needed basis.

SECTION 2. Except as otherwise set forth in this Amendment, the Master Agreement as amended by way of the Prior Amendments shall remain binding, controlling and in full force and effect. The provisions of this Amendment shall be deemed a part of the Master Agreement as amended by way of the Prior Amendments and except as otherwise provided under this Amendment, the Master Agreement, the Prior Amendments and all provisions contained therein shall remain binding and enforceable. In the event of any conflict or inconsistency between the provisions of this Amendment and the provisions of the Master Agreement or the Prior Amendments, the provisions of this Amendment shall govern and control, but only in so far as such provisions conflict with the Master Agreement or the Prior Amendments and no further.

SECTION 3. The Master Agreement as amended by way of the Prior Amendments and this Amendment constitute the entire, complete, final and exclusive expression of the Parties with respect to the matters addressed herein and supersedes all other agreements or understandings, whether oral or written, or entered into between City and Chávez prior to the execution of this Amendment. No statements, representations or other agreements, whether oral or written, made by any Party which are not embodied herein shall be valid or binding. No amendment, modification or supplement to the Master Agreement as amended by way of the Prior Amendments and this Amendment shall be valid and binding unless in writing and duly executed by the Parties in the form of a written contract amendment.

#### 2015 CITY CLERK EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

(Employee: Elena G. Chávez)

THIS 2015 CITY CLERK EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered into on this 7<sup>th</sup> day of December 2015 by and between the CITY OF SAN FERNANDO, a municipal corporation and general law city ("CITY") and ELENA G. CHAVEZ, an individual ("CHAVEZ"). For purposes of this Agreement, the capitalized term "Parties" shall be a collective reference to both CITY and CHAVEZ. The capitalized term "Party" may refer to either CITY or CHAVEZ interchangeably and reasonably appropriate.

#### **RECITALS**

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into in consideration of the following:

WHEREAS, the City Clerk is an appointive officer of the City of San Fernando, established pursuant to California law and appointed by the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the public office of City Clerk is established pursuant to Division 3 (City Clerk) of Article III (Officers and Employees) of Chapter 2 (Administration) of the San Fernando Municipal Code; and

WHEREAS, CHAVEZ represents that she has the requisite specialized skills, training, certifications and experience required to serve as the City Clerk for the City of San Fernando; and

WHEREAS, CHAVEZ desires to accept employment as City Clerk subject to the consideration, terms and conditions set forth under this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the City Council initially approved this Agreement and the execution of the same in open session at its meeting of November 16, 2015; and

WHEREAS, subsequent to the November 16, 2015 the Parties sought to make certain amendments and clarifying edits to more precisely effectuate the intent of the Parties; and

WHEREAS, the Agreement was re-affirmed, ratified and approved, subject to certain clarifying amendment, by the City Council at its meeting of December 7, 2015; and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire, however, that the Agreements provisions take effect as of November 16, 2015, the date of initial approval.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual agreements contained herein, CITY and CHAVEZ agree as follows:

#### SECTION 1. POSITION, TERM, DUTIES

#### 1.1 Employment as City Clerk

This Agreement establishes the terms and conditions of employment of CHAVEZ as City Clerk for the City of San Fernando.

#### 1.2 **Duration of Employment**

- A. CHAVEZ's employment with CITY shall be at-will and CHAVEZ shall, at all times, serve at the pleasure of and at the convenience of the City Council of CITY. This Agreement may be terminated by either Party at any time for convenience subject to the notification and termination provisions prescribed in this Agreement.
- B. The foregoing notwithstanding, nothing in this Section shall operate to prohibit, modify or otherwise restrict the City Council's ability to terminate CHAVEZ's employment at any time for cause. Nothing in this section 1 shall prevent, limit, or otherwise interfere with the right of CHAVEZ to voluntarily terminate or resign at any time from her position with the CITY, subject to the notification and termination provisions hereunder.
- C. This Agreement shall have a term of five (5) years commencing as of November 16, 2015 ("Term"). For purposes of this Agreement, November 16, 2015 may hereinafter be referred to as the "Effective Date".

#### 1.3 Duties and Responsibilities

- A. CHAVEZ shall perform the duties and functions of the City Clerk as specified under the laws of the State of California, the San Fernando Municipal Code, the ordinances and resolutions and policies of the CITY and this Agreement. CHAVEZ shall also perform such other duties and functions as the City Council may assign from time to time.
- B. CHAVEZ shall serve as the City Clerk and shall be vested with the powers, duties and responsibilities of the City Clerk as set forth in Division 3 (City Clerk) of Article III (Officers and Employees) of Chapter 2 (Administration) of the San Fernando Municipal Code ("Division 3"), as the same may be repealed, amended, modified or clarified from time to time by the City Council by ordinance or resolution. CHAVEZ shall also perform those tasks and functions set forth under Exhibit A to that certain Resolution No. 7712 approved by the City Council on November 16, 2015 which approves Supplement No. 172 to that certain Position Classification Plan approved on December 12, 1966 by way of City Council Resolution No. 4144. CHAVEZ's performance of her duties shall be subject to the direction and oversight of the City Council. Subject to the terms and conditions of all applicable collective bargaining agreements with the City and all City employment policies and procedures, the City Council by resolution reserves the right to authorize the assignment of permanent and/or temporary staff to Department of the City Clerk and CHAVEZ will be responsible for the day-to-day supervision of such staff.

#### 1.4 Hours of Work

- A. The position of City Clerk shall be deemed an exempt position under state and federal wage and hour laws. CHAVEZ's compensation (whether salary or benefits or other allowances) is not based on hours worked and CHAVEZ shall not be entitled to any compensation for overtime.
- B. CHAVEZ shall be allowed reasonable flexibility in setting her own office hours, provided: (i) CHAVEZ maintains a reasonably substantial onsite presence at City Hall during

normal CITY business hours which, as of the Effective Date of this Agreement are Monday through Thursday 7:30 am to 5:30 pm and alternating Fridays from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm; and (ii) CHAVEZ is reasonably available to members of the City Council, members of CITY commissions, CITY staff and members of the public transacting business with the Department of the City Clerk on a regular and routine basis that generally conforms to the CITY's normal business hours as the same may be amended from time to time by the City Council.

Consistent with subsection B, above, CHAVEZ's work hours may generally C. conform to the 9/80 work schedule afforded department heads and directors, however, CHAVEZ understands that the duties, demands and responsibilities of the office of City Clerk may from time to time require that she work days and hours that do not strictly conform to the 9/80 schedule generally afforded to other department head level staff and shall be available to discharge the duties and responsibilities of City Clerk at all times as reasonably necessary.

#### 1.5 Regional and Professional Activities

The City Council desires that CHAVEZ be reasonably active in professional organizations that will promote the standing of the CITY and advance the CITY's goals, interests and policy objectives while also providing CHAVEZ with opportunities for the type of professional development that will enhance her ability to serve the CITY and perform her duties as City Clerk. Toward this end, CHAVEZ may, upon reasonable notice and approval by the City Council, join professional organizations and participate in the activities of such organizations insofar as such participation promotes the interests of the CITY and does not unduly interfere with the performance of CHAVEZ's duties as City Clerk. Subject to funding availability as determined by the City Council in its sole and absolute discretion, CITY may pay for the dues and subscriptions of the City Clerk necessary for her participation in national, statewide, regional or professional organizations.

#### 1.6 [Reserved - No Text]

#### 1.7 **Conflicts of Interest**

CHAVEZ shall not, during the term of this Agreement, individually, as a partner, joint venture, officer or shareholder, invest or participate in any business venture conducting business in the corporate limits of the CITY, except for stock ownership in any company whose capital stock is publicly held and regularly traded, without prior approval of the City Council. CHAVEZ shall further refrain from developing a financial stake in any commercial venture or partnership with any entity doing business with the CITY where such financial stake would create a violation of Government Code Section 1090. For and during the term of this Agreement and any extension term, CHAVEZ further agrees that except for a personal residence or residential property acquired or held for future use as her personal residence, CHAVEZ will not invest in any other real estate or property improvements within the corporate limits of the CITY without the prior consent of the City Council and subject to the restrictions of all applicable financial conflict of interest laws.

#### 1.8 ICMA Code of Ethics

CHAVEZ shall comply with the latest published edition of the written Code of Ethics of the International City/County Management Association ("ICMA"), provided such compliance is not inconsistent with or contrary to the laws of the State of California or the San Fernando Municipal Code.

B. CITY and the City Council agree that neither the City Council nor any of its members will give CHAVEZ any order, direction, or request that would require CHAVEZ to violate the ICMA Code of Ethics, unless such direction or request is authorized by the laws of the State of California or the San Fernando Municipal Code.

#### 1.9 Performance Evaluation

- A. Annual performance evaluations are an important way for the City Council and CHAVEZ to ensure effective communications about expectations and performance. The City Council reserves the right, but assumes no obligation, to conduct a job performance evaluation and review of CHAVEZ once each calendar year with the first such evaluation and review occurring no earlier than the first anniversary of the Effective Date.
- B. In conducting the review the Parties may, but shall not be required to, use the services of a professional consultant selected by the City Council. The job performance evaluation and review shall serve the following purposes and objectives: (i) to evaluate CHAVEZ's overall job performance over the course of the fiscal year; (ii) to identify areas of notable progress and/or accomplishment and identify ways to sustain and/or improve upon such progress and/or accomplishments; (iii) to identify areas requiring improvement and how such improvement might be accomplished; (iv) to measure CHAVEZ's success in meeting, achieving and/or exceeding City Council-defined goals, objectives, priorities, activities and programs over the fiscal year or since the last performance evaluation and review; (v) to establish goals, objectives, and priorities for the upcoming year; (vi) to determine what, if any, adjustments or enhancement should be considered and approved to CHAVEZ's compensation terms.
- C. The failure of CITY to undertake a performance evaluation shall not limit CITY's ability to terminate this Agreement pursuant to Section 3, below. Nothing in this Section 1 shall be construed to restrict or otherwise limit the ability of the CITY to undertake any other review or investigation of CHAVEZ during the course of a fiscal year which the City Council may deem necessary to address any allegation of unlawful or inappropriate conduct or other wrongdoing.

#### SECTION 2. BASE COMPENSATION; BENEFITS AND REIMBURSEMENTS

#### 2.1 Salary and Other Monetary Compensation

- A. <u>Base Salary.</u> CITY shall pay CHAVEZ an annual base salary of One Hundred and One Thousand, Fifty-Three Dollars (\$101,053) per year (hereinafter, the "Base Salary"), subject to deductions for taxes, deferred compensation and other out-of-pocket benefits paid for by CHAVEZ as a CITY department head employee. CITY shall pay CHAVEZ in bi-weekly installments at the same time other employees of CITY are paid. Commencing July 1, 2016 and each July 1<sup>st</sup> thereafter up to July 1, 2018, the Base Salary shall increase by an amount equal to two percent (2%) of the most recent Base Salary amount.
- B. <u>Bilingual Bonus and Longevity Pay.</u> CHAVEZ shall receive a bilingual bonus and longevity pay subject to the same terms and conditions the same are provided to City department heads under City Council Resolution No. 7692 approved August 3, 2015 (hereinafter, "Resolution No. 7692") as the same may be later repealed, amended or modified.

#### 2.2 Retirement/Deferred Compensation

- A. CHAVEZ shall receive any and all employee retirement and deferred compensation benefits otherwise accorded CITY's department head employees, consistent with CITY policies, including the CITY policy through the Public Employees Retirement System ("PERS") and applicable law. The PERS formula to be applied to CHAVEZ will be 3% at 60, single highest year compensation retirement calculation which applies to First Tier "Classic" members as referenced under Section 5 (Retirement) of Resolution No. 7692. CHAVEZ shall also be eligible for deferred compensation through voluntary contribution to the 457 Deferred Compensation plan available through the ICMA.
- B. Notwithstanding anything set forth under Resolution No. 7692 to the contrary and consistent with City Council Resolution No. 7718 dated December 7, 2015, the City shall continue to pay 4.0% of for CHAVEZ's First Tier CalPERS membership throughout the Term of this Agreement. The City's payments shall be treated as a "pick up" of employee contributions pursuant to IRC 414(h)(2). The City shall continue to report the value of the Employer Paid Member Contribution to CalPERS as compensation earnable on behalf of CHAVEZ, pursuant to Government Code Section 20636(c)(4).

#### 2.3 Annual Leave (Vacation and Sick)

#### A. Accrual of Annual Leave.

- 1. For purposes of this Agreement the term "Annual Leave" shall have the same meaning as set forth under Resolution No. 7692 or as the meaning of the term "Annual Leave" may be modified or amended by subsequent resolutions of the City Council that repeal, amend or otherwise modify the term "Annual Leave" as defined under Resolution No. 7692. Except as otherwise provided under this Agreement, commencing upon the Effective Date and throughout the term of this Agreement, CHAVEZ shall accrue Annual Leave in the same amount and in the same manner accrued by the City's Department Head Classification employees as set forth under Resolution No. 7692 or as the package of compensation and other benefits set forth under Resolution No. 7692 may be subsequently repealed, amended or otherwise modified by subsequent City Council resolution. The Parties acknowledge and agree that commencing upon the Effective Date, the above-described Annual Leave shall be given to CHAVEZ in lieu, and not in addition to, vacation leave and sick leave previously allocated to CHAVEZ prior to the Effective Date. Upon the Effective Date CHAVEZ shall cease to accrue vacation leave and sick leave.
- 2. Subsection 2.3.A.1 of this Agreement notwithstanding, CHAVEZ will not accrue any additional Annual Leave time during any period of time in which CHAVEZ's total bank of accrued but unused Annual Leave equals or exceeds a total of three hundred (300) hours. At such time as CHAVEZ's total bank of accrued but unused Annual Leave falls below 300 hours total, CHAVEZ will resume the accrual of Annual Leave until such newly accrued hours cause CHAVEZ's total bank of accrued but unused Annual Leave to again equal 300 hours.

#### B. Pre-existing Leave Hours.

1. As of the Effective Date of this Agreement, the Parties acknowledge and agree that CHAVEZ's pre-existing bank of accrued but unused vacation leave hours total 281.80 hours (hereinafter, the "Pre-Existing Vacation Leave Hours"). Upon the Effective Date, CHAVEZ's Pre-Existing Vacation Leave Hours shall be converted to Annual Leave Hours. The conversion

of CHAVEZ's Pre-Existing Vacation Leave Hours to Annual Leave shall count toward the 300 hour cap referenced under subsection 2.3.A.2, above. The conversion of Pre-Existing Vacation Leave Hours to Annual Leave shall be in accordance with Resolution No. 7692 as the same may be subsequently, repealed, amended or otherwise modified.

- 2. As of the Effective Date of this Agreement, the Parties acknowledge and agree that CHAVEZ's pre-existing bank of accrued but unused sick leave hours total 356.67 hours (hereinafter, "Pre-Existing Sick Leave Hours"). Within thirty (30) calendar days from the Effective Date, CHAVEZ shall sell back and CITY shall purchase, the full value of CHAVEZ's Pre-Existing Sick Leave Hours at a rate reflective of CHAVEZ's base salary prior to the Effective Date of this Agreement.
- 3. As of the Effective Date of this Agreement, the Parties acknowledge and agree that CHAVEZ's pre-existing bank of accrued but unused comp time hours total 95.68 hours (hereinafter, the "Pre-Existing Comp Time Amount"). Within thirty (30) calendar days from the Effective Date, CHAVEZ shall sell back and CITY shall purchase, the full value of CHAVEZ's Pre-Existing Comp Time Hours at a rate reflective of CHAVEZ's base salary prior to the Effective Date of this Agreement.
- 4. The Parties acknowledge and agree that upon the Effective Date, CHAVEZ shall cease to accrue additional vacation leave or additional sick leave but shall instead receive Annual Leave as described under subsection A of this Section above. The Parties further acknowledge and agree that upon the Effective Date, CHAVEZ shall cease to accrue any other variety of leave not otherwise expressly provided for under this Agreement.
- CHAVEZ shall provide both the Mayor and the Vice Mayor with no less than 5. fourteen (14) calendar days prior written notice in the event CHAVEZ intends to take any prescheduled time off (e.g., vacation and/or conferences etc.) anticipated to last more than two (2) consecutive CITY work days. A courtesy notice shall also be provided to the City Manager. CHAVEZ shall also use all reasonable efforts to coordinate the scheduling of vacation time off or other pre-scheduled time off with other City Clerk Department staff so as to ensure that routine City Clerk Department operations and duties, including the timely preparation and publication of City Council agendas is not unreasonably disrupted. CHAVEZ shall refrain from taking vacation time office during the thirty-day period immediately preceding and the thirty-day period immediately following any regularly scheduled general municipal election of the City of San Fernando. In so far as the City Council calls a special municipal election, CHAVEZ shall refrain from scheduling any vacation time off during the thirty-day period immediately preceding and the thirty-day period immediately following any such special municipal election but may take vacation time off in so far as such time was scheduled and formally requested by CHAVEZ prior to the calling of the special municipal election.

#### 2.4 Additional Miscellaneous Benefits.

A. Commencing upon the Effective Date, CHAVEZ shall receive the following benefits in the manner prescribed under Resolution No. 7692 as the same may be repealed, amended or otherwise modified in whole or in part by subsequent City Council resolution: (i) Management Leave; (ii) Bereavement Leave; and (iii) Wellness Reimbursement Benefit

#### 2.5 Holidays

CHAVEZ shall receive paid holidays in accordance with CITY's current practices as set forth under Section 6 of Resolution No. 7692 as such practices may be amended or modified from time to time by the CITY by action of the City Council. Paid holidays will be those approved by the CITY by action of the City Council. The CITY currently provides twelve (12) paid holidays per calendar year.

#### 2.6 Medical, Dental and Vision Insurance

Except as otherwise set forth in this Agreement, and in addition to the benefits specified herein, CHAVEZ shall receive the same employee medical, dental, and vision insurance benefits provided under Section 4 of Exhibit "A" of Resolution No. 7692 as the same may be repealed, amended or otherwise modified by subsequent City Council resolution.

#### 2.7 Bonding

Except as otherwise provided under the City Municipal Code or applicable state law, CITY shall bear the full cost of any fidelity or other bonds required of CHAVEZ under any law or ordinance.

#### 2.8 <u>Cellular Phone Allowance; Other Necessary and Customary Business</u> Equipment and Facilities; Special Electronic Equipment

- A. CITY recognizes that CHAVEZ's duties as City Clerk may require extensive use of a cell phone in the ordinary course of performing her duties as City Clerk. Accordingly, CITY shall provide CHAVEZ with a cell phone allowance in the amount of Sixty Dollars (\$60.00) per month for the use of CHAVEZ's personal cell phone to conduct CITY business. CITY shall not be responsible for any cellular phone related expenses in excess of the allowance set forth herein nor shall CHAVEZ be entitled to reimbursement for such expenses pursuant to Section 2.9.
- B. The CITY shall provide CHAVEZ with other customary and necessary equipment and facilities reasonably required for CHAVEZ to perform her duties and functions as City Clerk such as an office within City Hall, a landline telephone in the City Hall office, a desktop computer, a new laptop computer, business cards, business stationary and the like. All such equipment and facilities made available to CHAVEZ shall at all times remain the property of the CITY and CHAVEZ acknowledges, understands and agrees that she shall have no right of privacy to such equipment or any data or information stored in such equipment or facilities.
- C. The City Council reserves the right but does not assume the obligation to provide CHAVEZ at CITY's expense, special electronic communications equipment such as an iPad. All such equipment and facilities made available to CHAVEZ shall at all times remain the property of the CITY, and CHAVEZ acknowledges, understands and agrees that she shall have no right of privacy to such equipment or any data or information stored in such equipment or facilities.

#### 2.9 Reimbursement for Expenses Not Covered by Allowances

Excluding those expenses already covered by the supplemental compensation allowances set forth under Sections 2.7 and 2.8 above, CITY shall reimburse CHAVEZ for

reasonable and necessary travel, subsistence and other business expenses incurred by CHAVEZ in the performance of her duties or in connection with CHAVEZ's participation in those authorized activities referenced under Section 1.3, above. All reimbursements shall be subject to and in accordance with any limitations or restrictions set forth under the laws of the State of California and any CITY-adopted reimbursement policies as either may be adopted, updated or otherwise amended from time to time by the San Fernando City Council.

#### 2.10 [RESERVED – NO TEXT]

#### 2.11 <u>Term Life Insurance</u>

Except as otherwise set forth in this Agreement, and in addition to the benefits specified herein, CHAVEZ shall receive any and all term life insurance program benefits otherwise accorded CITY's department head employees, as prescribed as of the Effective Date of this Agreement and as those benefits may be changed from time to time.

#### 2.12 Jury Duty

CHAVEZ will receive full pay and benefits while responding to a jury summons or serving on a jury, up to a maximum of fourteen (14) business days. Any compensation for such jury duty (except travel pay) shall be remitted to CITY.

#### 2.13 Professional Development Conference

CHAVEZ shall be permitted to attend the annual professional development conference for city clerks organized by the California League of Cities and may receive reimbursement for travel, transportation and lodging at such conference in accordance with the City's travel and reimbursement policy as the same may be updated, amended and/or modified from time to time by the City Council.

#### 2.14 Other Benefits

- A. Except as otherwise provided or excepted under this Agreement, CHAVEZ shall receive any and all other non-monetary benefits as are customarily provided to all of the CITY's department head employees pursuant to applicable State law, applicable provisions of the San Fernando Municipal Code and other applicable policies, rules and regulations adopted by City Council resolution as polices, rules and regulations may be amended, repealed or otherwise modified from time to time.
- B. Subsection A of this Section notwithstanding, CHAVEZ shall not receive a car allowance benefit, including the car allowance benefit referenced under Section 9 (Car Allowance) of Resolution No. 7692.
- C. Subsection A of this Section notwithstanding, the 2% Base Salary increases scheduled for July 1, 2016, July 1, 2017 and July 1, 2018 as referenced under Section 2.1 of this Agreement are in lieu of and in place of the schedule of salary increases referenced under Section 2 (Salary) of Resolution No. 7692 and shall not be in addition to such increases.
- D. Subsection A of this Section notwithstanding, CHAVEZ shall not receive the Technology Reimbursement referenced under Section 8 of Resolution No. 7692.

#### SECTION 3. EMPLOYMENT "AT-WILL"; SEPARATION FROM EMPLOYMENT

#### 3.1 <u>Employment with CITY is "at-will"</u>

- Α. CHAVEZ's employment status with CITY shall be "at-will" and CHAVEZ shall serve at the pleasure of the City Council as provided under Government Code Section 36506. CITY, through the City Council, may at any time terminate CHAVEZ's employment with the CITY with or without cause by majority vote of its full membership (i.e., by no less than three affirmative votes). CHAVEZ acknowledges, understands and agrees that CHAVEZ may not avail herself of any procedures, provisions or protections set forth under the CITY's Employment Policies, as defined herein, insofar as such procedures, provisions or protections limit, restrict, modify, prohibit or regulate CHAVEZ's status as an "at-will" employee of CITY or the ability of the City Council to terminate CHAVEZ's employment at any time for cause or for convenience. For purposes of this Agreement, the capitalized term "Employment Policies" means and refers to any ordinance, resolution, regulation, rule or other written policy of the CITY as the same may be amended, modified or supplemented from time to time (including but not limited to the San Fernando Municipal Code and any written employment manual of the CITY) which governs, regulates or otherwise relates to employment with the CITY. The CITY's Employment Policies shall not apply to CHAVEZ insofar as such Employment Policies limit, restrict, modify or regulate (or may be interpreted to limit, restrict, modify or regulate) CHAVEZ's status as an "atwill" employee of CITY.
- B. Except as otherwise provided under this Section 3, CHAVEZ shall not be entitled to any pre-termination hearing or other similar proceeding or appeal proceeding as a precondition to any decision or action by the City Council to terminate CHAVEZ's employment whether for cause or for convenience.
- C. Nothing in this Agreement shall confer upon CHAVEZ any right to any property interest in continued employment with the CITY.

#### 3.2 Resignation/Retirement

- A. CHAVEZ may resign and/or retire from her employment with the CITY at any time for any reason, provided CHAVEZ provides the City Council with written notice of her intent to so terminate her employment at least forty-five (45) calendar days prior to the effective date of separation.
- B. The City Council in its sole and absolute discretion may waive or shorten the 45-day prior written notice requirement provided the request for such waiver is made in writing by CHAVEZ and further provided that the City Council's waiver of the notice requirement is also made in writing.
- C. The failure of CHAVEZ to provide the prior written notice required under this Section shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement.

#### 3.3 Separation for Convenience and Without Cause; Severance

A. In the event CHAVEZ is terminated for convenience and without cause by the City Council while CHAVEZ is willing and able to perform the City Clerk's duties under this Agreement, then in that event the CITY agrees to pay CHAVEZ a lump sum cash payment equal to twelve (12) months worth of CHAVEZ's annual Base Salary at the time of separation

[i.e., the prorated value of one months' worth of CHAVEZ's annual Base Salary at the time of separation multiplied by twelve months].

- B. CITY shall extend to CHAVEZ the right to continued health insurance as may be required by and pursuant to terms and conditions of this Consolidated Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1986 ("COBRA"). The CITY agrees to pay CHAVEZ's COBRA coverage for the same number of months for which CHAVEZ is entitled to a lump sum cash payment under Section 3.3(A), or until CHAVEZ either secures and begins full-time employment or obtains other health insurance, whichever of these three events first occurs. CHAVEZ shall notify the CITY within five (5) calendar days of securing new full-time employment or insurance.
- C. All payments required under Section 3.3(A) or 3.3(B), above, are subject to and shall be interpreted to comply with the limitations set forth in Government Code Section 53260. Further, in the event CHAVEZ is convicted of a crime involving an abuse of office or position, CHAVEZ shall reimburse the CITY for any paid leave or cash settlement (including severance), as provided by Government Code Sections 53243 through 53243.4.
- D. The foregoing notwithstanding, CITY shall not exercise its right to terminate CHAVEZ for convenience and without cause during the 120-day period immediately preceding or the 120-day period immediately following any General Municipal Election of the CITY in which two or more City Council seats are subject to an election contest or during the 120-day period immediately preceding or the 120-day period immediately following any Special Municipal Election of the CITY in which two or more City Council seats are subject to an election contest.

#### 3.4 Separation for Cause

- A. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 3.3, above, CHAVEZ may be terminated for cause. As used in this Section, "cause" shall mean any one or more of the following:
  - (i) Any Breach of this Agreement;
  - (ii) Conviction (including a plea of no contest) of a felony or any misdemeanor under the Political Reform Act (Government Code Section 81000 et seq.) or Government Code Section 1090;
  - (iii) Conviction (including a plea of no contest) of any offense constituting an "abuse of office or position" within the meaning of Government Code Section 53243.4;
  - (iv) Conviction (including a plea of no contest) of a misdemeanor involving a crime of moral turpitude or felony under California law, including but not limited to any conviction under Penal Code Section 424;
  - (v) Intoxication on duty, whether by alcohol, non-prescription drugs or any controlled substance.
  - (vi) Repeated and protracted unexcused absences from CHAVEZ's office and duties;
  - (vii) Fraud or dishonesty in securing her employment, including resume fraud;

- (viii) A finding by judicial proceeding that legally prohibited personal acts of sexual harassment against a CITY official or employee or legally prohibited acts of discrimination against a CITY official or employee have occurred;
- (ix) A pattern of repeated, willful and intentional failure to carry out materially significant and legally constituted policy decisions of the City Council made by the City Council as a body, or persistent willful violation of properly established rules and procedures; and
- (x) Any other action or inaction of CHAVEZ that materially and substantially impedes or disrupts the performance of CITY or its organizational units or is detrimental to employee safety or public safety.

The City Council, in its sole and absolute discretion, may place CHAVEZ on administrative leave with pay until resolution of allegations or charges, including but not limited to criminal charges, brought against CHAVEZ, or until a final judicial or administrative decision finding legally prohibited personal acts of sexual harassment against a CITY official or employee or legally prohibited personal acts of discrimination against a CITY official or employee. Prior to terminating this Agreement pursuant to this Section, the City Council shall give CHAVEZ at least ten (10) calendar days prior written notice of the charges. Within the ten-day period, but not earlier than five (5) calendar days after the notice has been given, the City Council shall meet with CHAVEZ in closed session and give CHAVEZ an opportunity to address the City Council regarding the charges. CHAVEZ may have a representative at the closed session with the City Council. After hearing CHAVEZ's response to the charges, the City Council shall make a decision as to whether to terminate this Agreement and shall inform CHAVEZ in writing of its decision. Other than as provided in this subsection, CHAVEZ expressly waives any other form of hearing or appeal of the City Council's decision. Nothing in this subsection creates a property right in employment. Notwithstanding anything contained in this subsection, CHAVEZ remains an at will employee serving at the pleasure of the City Council. The initiation of termination proceedings for cause shall not operate to prohibit or otherwise restrict the City Council from exercising its right to terminate CHAVEZ without cause as provided under Section 3.3 of this Agreement.

B. In the event the CITY terminates CHAVEZ for cause, then the CITY may terminate this Agreement immediately, and CHAVEZ shall be entitled to only the compensation accrued up to the date of termination, payments required under Sections 2 and subsection 3.3 and such other termination benefits and payments as may be required by law. In the event of termination for cause, the City Clerk shall not be entitled to any severance provided for under subsection 3.3, above. The foregoing notwithstanding, CITY may deduct from such payments any reimbursement sums it is owed pursuant to Government Code Sections 53243 through 53243.4.

#### 3.5 Return of City Equipment

CHAVEZ agrees that all property, including without limitation, all equipment, tangible, Proprietary Information (as defined below), documents, records, notes, contracts, and computer-generated materials furnished to or prepared by her incident to her employment are the property of CITY and shall be returned promptly to CITY upon termination of CHAVEZ's employment. CHAVEZ's obligations under this subsection shall survive the termination of her employment and the expiration or early termination of this Agreement.

#### SECTION 4. GENERAL PROVISIONS

#### 4.1 **Proprietary Information**

"Proprietary Information" means all information and any idea pertaining in any manner to the business of the City Council, the CITY or the CITY's various departments, divisions, committees and commissions, which was produced by CHAVEZ in the course of her employment or otherwise produced to or acquired by CHAVEZ in the course of her employment with the CITY. Proprietary Information shall include, without limitation, trade secrets, product ideas, inventions, processes, formulae, data, know-how, software and other computer programs, copyrightable material, marketing plans, strategies, sales, financial reports, forecasts and customer lists. All Proprietary Information not generally known outside of CITY's organization, and all Proprietary Information so known only through improper means, shall be deemed "Confidential Information". During her employment by CITY, CHAVEZ shall use Proprietary Information, and shall disclose Confidential Information, only for the benefit of CITY and as is or may be necessary to perform her job responsibilities under this Agreement. Following termination, CHAVEZ shall not use any Proprietary Information and shall not disclose any Confidential Information, except with the express written consent of CITY. CHAVEZ's obligations under this Section shall survive the termination of her employment and the expiration of this Agreement.

#### 4.2 Notices

All notices, requests, demands and other communications under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be effective upon delivery by hand or three (3) business days after deposit in the United States mail, postage prepaid, certified or registered, and addressed to CITY at the address below, and or at the last known address maintained in CHAVEZ's personnel file. CHAVEZ agrees to notify CITY in writing of any change in her address during her employment with CITY. Notice of change of address shall be effective only when accomplished in accordance with this Section.

#### 4.3 <u>Indemnification</u>

A. CITY shall defend, hold harmless and indemnify CHAVEZ against any claim, demand, judgment or action of any type or kind arising within the course and scope of CHAVEZ's employment to the extent required by Government Code Sections 825 and 995.

B. Subsection (A) of this Section notwithstanding, CITY reserves all rights (including all rights to monetary reimbursement) afforded under Government Code Sections 53243, 53243.1, 53243.2, 53243.3 and 53243.4 and nothing in this Agreement shall be operate or otherwise be construed to place any restriction upon CITY in exercising and/or enforcing such

rights under the foregoing Government Code Sections. In the event CHAVEZ is convicted of an offense constituting an abuse of office or position, CHAVEZ shall reimburse CITY for any sums expended investigating and/or defending such wrongdoing as provided under Government Code Section 53243, 53243.1 and 53243.3. For purposes of this Agreement, the phrase "abuse of office or position" shall have the same meaning as set forth under Government Code Section 53243.4

#### 4.4 Entire Agreement

This Agreement is intended to be the final, complete, and exclusive statement of the terms of CHAVEZ's employment by CITY. This Agreement supersedes all other prior and contemporaneous agreements and statements, whether written or oral, express or implied, pertaining in any manner to the employment of CHAVEZ, and it may not be contradicted by evidence of any prior or contemporaneous statements or agreements. To the extent that the practices, policies, or procedures of CITY, now or in the future, apply to CHAVEZ and are inconsistent with the terms of this Agreement, the provisions of this Agreement shall control.

#### 4.5 Amendments

This Agreement may not be altered, modified, or amended except in a written document signed by CHAVEZ, approved by the City Council and signed by Mayor.

#### 4.6 Waiver

Failure to exercise any right under this Agreement shall not constitute a waiver of such right.

#### 4.7 Assignment

CHAVEZ shall not assign any rights or obligations under this Agreement. CITY may, upon prior written notice to CHAVEZ, assign its rights and obligations hereunder.

#### 4.8 Severability

If any court of competent jurisdiction holds any provision of this Agreement to be invalid, unenforceable, or void, the remainder of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

#### 4.9 Attorney's Fees

In any legal action, arbitration, or other proceeding brought to enforce or interpret the terms of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorneys' fees and costs.

#### 4.10 Governing Law

This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California, with venue property only in Los Angeles County, State of California.

#### 4.11 Interpretation

This Agreement shall be construed as a whole, according to its fair meaning, and not in favor of or against any party. By way of example and not in limitation, this Agreement shall not be construed in favor of the party receiving a benefit nor against the party responsible for any particular language in this Agreement. Captions are used for reference purposes only and should be ignored in the interpretation of the Agreement. Each party waives their future right to claim, contest, or assert that this Agreement was modified, cancelled superseded or changed by any oral agreement, course of conduct, waiver or estoppel.

#### 4.12 Acknowledgment

CHAVEZ acknowledges that she has had the opportunity to consult legal counsel in regard to this Agreement, that she has read and understands this Agreement, that she is fully aware of its legal effect, and that she has entered into it freely and voluntarily and based on her own judgment and not on any representations or promises other than those contained in this Agreement.

#### 4.13 Counterparts

The Parties agree that this Agreement may be executed in multiple originals including multiple counterparts, and that each of the counterparts to any original taken together shall constitute one valid and binding agreement between the Parties.

#### CITY CLERK

#### **DEFINITION**

Under the direction of the City Council, independently plans and organizes the daily activities of the City Clerk's Department. Has a critical role in service delivery administering Federal, State, and local laws pertaining to the Brown Act, the Public Records Act, campaign finance, and Fair Political Practices Act filings. The City Clerk is responsible for election management and City records management. Traditional legislative support functions include the preparation of agendas and minutes, processes, prepares, records and maintains all City Council legislative actions, safeguards the City Seal, and performs a variety of other administrative duties in support of the City Council.

#### DISTINGUISHING CHARACTERISTICS

The City Clerk position is "at-will" and a member of the City's executive management team who is responsible for day-to-day operations of the City Clerk's Department.

Incumbents will be required to exercise considerable independent judgment, establish priorities, be detail-oriented, well-organized, a problem solver, well-rounded and have considerable knowledge of the principles and practice of the City Clerk function. S/he must understand and be experienced in the procedures and the preparation of agendas, parliamentary procedure, the Brown Act, have significant knowledge in the laws and regulations governing the election process, municipal budgeting and accounting, practices and techniques of effective supervision in a team environment, time management, ability to investigate and analyze administrative and technical problems, reach practical and logical conclusions and make effective recommendations. S/he must have strong communication and interpersonal skills to effectively interact with City Elected Officials, commissions, community representatives, business organizations, staff and the public.

#### IMPORTANT AND ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS

- 1) Serves as City Elections Official ensuring conformance to Election and Government Codes.
- 2) Organizes, and manages all aspects of the City's General Municipal and Special Elections including but not limited to the following:
  - a. Coordinates, and interfaces closely, with outside agencies such as:
    - California Secretary of State
    - County of Los Angeles Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk

- City of Los Angeles Elections Division
- Election Vendors
- b. Processes petitions relating to initiatives, recalls, and referendums.
- c. Oversees the preparation, distribution, and receipt of candidate packets.
- d. Supervises the nomination verification process for all candidates and incumbents.
- e. Informs candidates of their election responsibilities and disclosure requirements.
- f. Prepares all resolutions requiring City Council approval and action (before, during, and after election).
- g. Coordinates vote by mail ballot processing.
- h. Prepares, publishes, and posts all required notices (before, during, and after election).
- i. Responds to election questions.
- j. Procures all election supplies and equipment.
- k. Recruits precinct workers and (after elections) processes payroll.
- l. Provides for training of poll workers.
- m. Designates and secures polling places.
- n. Manages the election material processing operation (order, assemble and distribute materials and supplies for polling locations).
- o. Supervises all poll workers and City employees working Election Day and Night.
- p. Canvasses and certifies the election results, conducts City Council reorganization, and coordinates the Oath of Office Ceremony.

#### Other local elections (i.e., State Primary, Presidential):

- Assists with securing polling places, poll worker training, and central ballot counting locations within City boundaries and assist with other election matters deemed necessary.
- 3) Attends City Council and other meetings, as assigned.
- 4) Attends and participates in Department Head meetings.
- 5) Supervises the preparation and distribution of the City Council and Successor Agency agendas (ensures that the agenda packets are compiled, assembled, and distributed to the appropriate officials, interested parties, and can be immediately accessed by the public).
- 6) Prepares Agenda Forecasts for distribution to Elected Officials and staff.
- 7) Takes and transcribes the minutes.
- 8) Administers the City's Conflict of Interest Code regarding Economic Interest Statements of the City Council, City Treasurer, City Attorney, Planning Commission, and all designated employees as required by the State Political Reform Act; and maintains documents and logs as required by law for public inspection.
- 9) Serves as City's Filing Officer for the Fair Political Practices Commission for campaign statements.
- 10) Assists staff in complying with requirements imposed by AB1234 Mandatory Ethics Training and maintains updated list.
- 11) Serves as custodian of the official records and archives of the City including ordinances, resolutions, contracts, minutes, agendas, agreements, encroachments, liens, deeds, easements.
- 12) Maintains custody of City Seal.

- 13) Supervises the preparation and distribution of the City's Municipal Code (i.e., attest, publish, index, and codify adopted ordinances).
- 14) Prepares and processes contracts for Mayor, City Manager, and City Attorney's signature and distributes as necessary.
- 15) Conducts research and provides necessary documentation in response to inquiries from the public in compliance with the California Public Records Act.
- 16) Receives bids and officiates at bid openings.
- 17) Serves as secretary to the Education Commission.
- 18) Maintains updated roster of all commissions, boards, and committees.
- 19) Complies with annual requirements of the Maddy Act Local Appointments List.
- 20) Files Affidavits of Completion with the County Recorder's Office.
- 21) Administers oaths of office to various individuals including City officials.
- 22) Develops policies and procedures for departmental operations; assists in developing shortand long-range planning for departmental activities.
- 23) Responsible for the City Records Retention Program.

#### OTHER JOB-RELATED DUTIES

Duties may include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 1) Participates in the development of the City Clerk's Department and Election budget by preparing documentation, estimating cost increases, submitting budget data for review and tracking expenditures.
- 2) Supervises City Clerk Department staff and delegates tasks accordingly.
- 3) Responds to a variety of inquiries and requests for information from employees and City Officials regarding past City Council actions and documents.
- 4) Publishes legal notices required by the offices of the City Council and City Clerk and may assist City departments regarding publishing notices.
- 5) Communicates effectively in both oral and written form.
- 6) Operates office and document imaging equipment including computer hardware and software.
- 7) Operates computer systems and other common office equipment.
- 8) Utilizes standard word processing, spreadsheet and database applications.
- 9) Prepares and composes reports, memoranda, and other documents.
- 10) May schedule and coordinate tours of City Hall for local schools.
- 11) Performs related duties and responsibilities as assigned.

#### JOB RELATED AND ESSENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS

#### Knowledge of:

Modern municipal administrative methods and procedures, organizations and functions; applicable local, State and Federal laws, rules and regulations regarding local government and election operations; purposes, policies and procedures of City Council and municipal commissions, record keeping and management; budget development and administration;

management and supervision practices; and business English usage, spelling, grammar, and punctuation.

#### Ability to:

Perform legislative duties under stressful circumstances where it is required to observe and enforce deadlines, prepare and analyze complex reports of a general or technical nature, supervise and direct multiple and diverse functions at the same time with attention to accuracy and detail. Effectively interpret and apply policies, laws, rules, regulations and procedures and make appropriate decisions; interact with Elected Officials and members of the community; establish and maintain cooperative relationships with those contacted in the course of work; review organizational and administrative problems and recommend and implement solutions; prepare agendas, minutes, reports and correspondence; prioritize and work independently; exercise independent judgment in the day-to-day operations of the office; understand and speak Spanish (highly desirable).

## FIRST AMENDMENT TO CITY CLERK EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT (Employee: Elena G. Chávez)

THIS 2017 FIRST AMENDMENT ("Amendment") to that certain agreement entitled "2015 City Clerk Employment Agreement – Employee: Elena G. Chávez" originally executed this 24th day of 2017 by and between the CITY OF SAN FERNANDO, a municipal corporation and general law city ("City") and ELENA G. CHÁVEZ, an individual ("Chávez") is made and entered into this 15th day of April 2013 2016—("Effective Date"). For purposes of this Amendment, the capitalized term "Parties" shall be a collective reference to both City and Chávez. The capitalized term "Party" may refer to either City or Chávez interchangeably as appropriate.

#### RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Parties executed and entered into an agreement dated December 7, 2015 and entitled "2015 City Clerk Employment Agreement – Employee: Elena G. Chávez", Contract No. 1804 (hereinafter, the "Master Agreement") (A true and correct copy of the Master Agreement is attached and incorporated hereto as Exhibit "A"); and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 20691(a), provides that contracting agency, like the City, may pay all or a portion of the normal contributions required to be paid by a member; and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 20691(a) further provides that "[w]here the member [(i.e., an employee)] is included in a group or class of employment, the payment shall be for all members in the group or class of employment; and

WHEREAS, however, Government Code Section 20691(a), also provides that "[i]f an individual is not part of a group or class, the payment shall be limited to the amount that the board determines is payable to similarly situated members in the closest related group or class..."; and

WHEREAS, the closest group or class in relation to Chávez is the City's Department Head group; and

WHEREAS, following the execution of the Master Agreement, the California Public Employees Retirement System ("CalPERS") advised the City that in order to comply with Government Code Section 20691, the City's payment of 4.0% of Chávez's First Tier CalPERS membership would need to be amended so as to match the contribution made to the rest of the City's Department Head employees as presently prescribed under Exhibit "A" of Resolution No. 7692 approved by the City Council on August 3, 2015; and

WHEREAS, Section 4.5 (Amendments) of the Master Agreement allows the Parties to amend the Master Agreement provided such amendments are memorialized in the form of a written amendment approved by the San Fernando City Council ("City Council") and signed by the Mayor; and

WHEREAS, execution of this Amendment was approved in open session at the City Council's regular meeting of April 17, 2017 under Agenda Item No. 6 as required under Government Code Section 53262.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual agreements contained herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, and intending to be legally bound hereby, the Parties agree as follows:

The text of the first sentence of subsection (B) of Section 2.2 (Retirement/Deferred SECTION 1. Compensation) of the Master Agreement is hereby deleted, repealed and replaced with the following text:

The City shall pay for CHÁVEZ's First Tier CalPERS membership at a percentage equivalent to that of the City's department head employee group as specified in Resolution No. 7692 or as the same may later be amended for the entire group by the City Council at a later date.

This amendment to subsection (B) of Section 2.2 (Retirement/Deferred Compensation) shall be retroactive as of July 1, 2015.

SECTION 2. Except as otherwise set forth in this Amendment, the Master Agreement shall remain binding, controlling and in full force and effect. The provisions of this Amendment shall be deemed a part of the Master Agreement and except as otherwise provided under this Amendment, the Master Agreement and all provisions contained therein shall remain binding and enforceable. In the event of any conflict or inconsistency between the provisions of this Amendment and the provisions of the Master Agreement, the provisions of this Amendment shall govern and control, but only in so far as such provisions conflict with the Master Agreement and no further.

SECTION 3. The Master Agreement as amended by way of this Amendment constitutes the entire. complete, final and exclusive expression of the Parties with respect to the matters addressed herein and supersedes all other agreements or understandings, whether oral or written, or entered into between City and Employee prior to the execution of this Amendment. No statements, representations or other agreements, whether oral or written, made by any Party which are not embodied herein shall be valid or binding. No amendment, modification or supplement to the Master Agreement as amended by this Amendment shall be valid and binding unless in writing and duly executed by the Parties in the form of a written contract amendment.

# 2018 SECOND AMENDMENT TO CITY CLERK EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT (Employee: Elena G. Chavez)

THIS 2018 SECOND AMENDMENT ("Amendment") to that certain agreement entitled "2015 City Clerk Employment Agreement – Employee: Elena G. Chavez" originally executed this the day of 2017 by and between the CITY OF SAN FERNANDO, a municipal corporation and general law city ("City") and ELENA G. CHAVEZ, an individual ("Chavez") is made and entered into this 2nd day of April 2018 ("Effective Date"). For purposes of this Amendment, the capitalized term "Parties" shall be a collective reference to both City and Chavez. The capitalized term "Party" may refer to either City or Chavez interchangeably as appropriate.

#### RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Parties executed and entered into an employment agreement dated December 7, 2015 and entitled "2015 City Clerk Employment Agreement – Employee: Elena G. Chávez", Contract No. 1804 (hereinafter, the "Master Agreement") and

WHEREAS, the Parties later executed a first amendment to the Master Agreement dated as of April 17, 2017, Contract No. 1804(a) (hereinafter, the "First Amendment") which modified provisions of the Master Agreement relating to the City's CalPERs contributions to Chavez; and

WHEREAS, the Parties now wish to modify the Master Agreement further such that the other benefits provided to members of the City's Department Head/Executive Team pursuant to City Council Resolution No. 7692 ("Resolution No. 7692") dated August 3, 2015 are also provided to the City Clerk in the same manner as set forth in Resolution No. 7692; and

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 7692 was later modified by way of City Council Resolution No. 7807 dated August 7, 2017 ("Resolution No. 7807"); and

WHEREAS, Section 4.5 (Amendments) of the Master Agreement allows the Parties to amend the Master Agreement provided such amendments are memorialized in the form of a written amendment approved by the San Fernando City Council ("City Council") and signed by the Mayor; and

WHEREAS, execution of this Amendment was approved in open session at the City Council's regular meeting of April 2, 2018 as required under Government Code Section 53262.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual agreements contained herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, and intending to be legally bound hereby, the Parties agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The existing text of Subsection (A)(2) of Section 2.3 (Annual Leave (Vacation and Sick)) is hereby repealed and deleted in its entirety and hereby replaced by the following new text:

A.2. Subsection (A)(1) of this Section 2.3 notwithstanding, effective as of April 1, 2018, CHAVEZ shall accrue Annual Leave in the same amount and in the same manner accrued by the City's Department Head Classification employees as the same is presently set by way of Resolution No. 7807 and as the same may later be repealed, amended or otherwise modified

#### by subsequent resolution of the City Council.

- SECTION 2. The second sentence of Subsection (A) of Section 2.8 (Cellular Phone Allowance; Other Necessary and Customary Business Equipment and Facilities; Special Electronic Equipment) is hereby amended in its entirety to now state the following:
  - A. CHAVEZ shall receive the technology reimbursement afforded City Department Heads under Section 8 of Exhibit "A" of Resolution No. 7692.
- SECTION 3. Section 2.9 (Reimbursement for Expenses Not Covered by Allowances) is hereby amended in its entirety to state the following:
  - A. CITY shall reimburse CHAVEZ for reasonable and necessary travel, subsistence and other business expenses incurred by CHAVEZ in the performance of her duties or in connection with CHAVEZ's participation in those authorized activities referenced under Section 1.3, above. All reimbursements shall be subject to and in accordance with any limitations or restrictions set forth under the laws of the State of California and any CITY-adopted reimbursement policies as either may be adopted, updated or otherwise amended from time to time.
  - B. CHAVEZ may also receive such reimbursements as are offered City Department Heads under Section 8 of Exhibit "A" of Resolution No. 7692.
- SECTION 4. Section 2.10 of the Master Agreement which is marked as "[Reserved No Text]" is hereby amended to now set forth the following:

#### 2.10 Long Term Disability

Except as otherwise set forth in this Agreement, and in addition to the benefits specified herein, CHAVEZ shall receive any and all employee long term disability program benefits otherwise provided to CITY's Department Head employees as such benefits may be modified, amended or repealed from time to time by the City Council.

- SECTION 5. Section 2.14 (Other Benefits) of the Master Agreement is hereby amended by the repeal and deletion of Subsections (B) and (D) of Section 2.14 which shall be of no further force of effect as of the effective date of this Amendment.
- SECTION 6. The first sentence of Subsection (C) of Section 3.3 (Separation for Convenience and Without Cause; Severance) is hereby amended in its entirety to state the following:
  - "All payments required under Section 3.3(A) or 3.3(B), above, or any other cash settlement associated with the termination of this Agreement shall be subject to and shall be interpreted to comply with the limitations and restrictions set forth under Government Code section 53260 and 53261. ..."
- SECTION 7. Subsection A of Section 1.9 (Performance Evaluation) of the Master Agreement is hereby amended by the addition of the following sentence:
  - "The foregoing notwithstanding, effective as of April 1, 2018, the City Council shall not

commence the annual performance evaluations contemplated under this Section earlier than September Ist of each calendar year and shall complete the same no later than November 15th of the same calendar year. Nothing in the preceding sentence shall be construed to modify, nullify, limit or otherwise restrict the rights of the City Council as set forth under Section 1.9(C) of the Agreement."

SECTION 8. Except as otherwise set forth in this Amendment, the Master Agreement as amended by way of the prior First Amendment shall remain binding, controlling and in full force and effect. The provisions of this Amendment shall be deemed a part of the Master Agreement and previously amended and except as otherwise provided under this Amendment, the Master Agreement, the First Amendment and all provisions contained therein shall remain binding and enforceable. In the event of any conflict or inconsistency between the provisions of this Amendment and the provisions of the Master Agreement or the First Amendment, the provisions of this Amendment shall govern and control, but only in so far as such provisions conflict with the Master Agreement or the First Amendment and no further.

SECTION 9. The Master Agreement as amended by way of this Amendment and the First Amendment constitutes the entire, complete, final and exclusive expression of the Parties with respect to the matters addressed herein and supersedes all other agreements or understandings, whether oral or written, or entered into between City and Chavez prior to the execution of this Amendment. No statements, representations or other agreements, whether oral or written, made by any Party which are not embodied herein shall be valid or binding. No amendment, modification or supplement to the Master Agreement as amended by this Amendment shall be valid and binding unless in writing and duly executed by the Parties in the form of a written contract amendment.
