STUDY SESSION

1) FISCAL YEAR 2015-2016 BUDGET STUDY SESSION

City Manager Saeki presented the staff report and department representatives each gave brief presentations.

Discussion ensued and staff replied to various questions from Councilmembers.

Items discussed included: proposed budget enhancements (i.e., \$50,000 for High-Speed Rail outreach); inclusion of organizational charts in the budget book; priorities and accomplishments; budget versus actual, and consideration to provide small budgets for the City Commissions.

In response to the discussion regarding personnel, City Manager Saeki reported that all departments have stated that they are in need of personnel and he said a salary survey will be done soon that will help shed some light (staff could report back regarding a list of suggested changes to include in the next fiscal year).

Mayor Fajardo agreed with Vice Mayor Ballin's comments regarding keeping the Mayor position as one to be rotated by Councilmembers and not voted on by the constituents. He inquired about past priorities that have not been addressed and said we need to make certain there's enough in the budget for on-going capital improvements (along with a "priority" list and timeline for the improvements).

City Manager Saeki reminded Councilmembers that the budget is not set in concrete; if, at any time during the year, something comes up and we need to make an appropriation, we can make necessary adjustments.

LAFD Battalion Chief Jack Wise was hoping to introduce the new captain but had an emergency call. Chief Wise briefly talked about the brush clearance program.

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John Blue thanked the San Fernando Police Department regarding the professional handling of a recent complaint.

CONSENT CALENDAR

Mayor Fajardo pulled Item No. 1, and Vice Mayor Ballin pulled Item No.s 4 and 6 for further discussion.

Motion by Vice Mayor Ballin, seconded by Councilmember Gonzales, to approve the remaining Consent Calendar Items:

- 2) CONSIDERATION TO ADOPT RESOLUTION NO. 15-052 APPROVING THE WARRANT REGISTER
- 3) FISCAL YEAR (FY) 2015-2016 LANDSCAPING AND LIGHTING ASSESSMENT DISTRICT (LLAD) – APPROVAL OF ENGINEER'S REPORT AND SETTING DATE FOR THE PUBLIC HEARING
- 5) CONSIDERATION TO APPROVE A CONTRACT EXTENSION WITH FIRST TRANSIT, INC.
- 7) CONSIDERATION TO APPROVE CITY COUNCIL POLICIES REGARDING CITY COUNCIL CONTACT AND CITY ATTORNEY SERVICES

1) REQUEST TO APPROVE MINUTES OF FEBRUARY 2, 2015 – REGULAR MEETING

Mayor Fajardo said that the meeting adjourned in memory of Michelle Vash Payne and would like the minutes to reflect her nickname "Yasmine".

Motion by Mayor Fajardo, seconded by Vice Mayor Ballin, to approve the minutes with the change. By consensus, the motion carried.

4) CONSIDERATION TO IMPLEMENT PHASE II OF THE WATER CONSERVATION ORDINANCE

Deputy City Manager/Public Works Director Chris Marcarello presented the staff report and replied to questions from Councilmembers.

Motion by Vice Mayor Ballin, seconded by Councilmember Soto, to:

a. Adopt Resolution 7674, declaring a water shortage condition and implementing Phase II of the City's Water Conservation Ordinance; and

b. Approve the Guidelines for Residential Parkway Landscaping to encourage reduced water usage in parkway locations throughout the City.

By consensus, the motion carried.

6) PROPOSITION A RECREATIONAL AND SPECIAL EVENT TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM UPDATE

Director of Recreation and Community Services Ismael Aguila presented the staff report and replied to questions from Councilmembers.

Discussion ensued regarding: the procedure for requesting buses and the cost range; who utilizes the buses; how to better advertise (in order to reach wider audiences and more schools); bus accommodations for the special needs community; raising the standards and quality of the buses provided to San Fernando; services and satisfaction of the vendors used (possibly contracting with a specific vendor); and maybe having the Education Commission handle bus requests.

By consensus, the City Council agreed that the Ad Hoc Committee on City Commissions is to look into these comments/concerns and report back with their findings and recommendations.

7) CONSIDERATION TO APPROVE CITY COUNCIL POLICIES REGARDING CITY COUNCIL CONTACT AND CITY ATTORNEY SERVICES

Motion by Vice Mayor Ballin, seconded by Councilmember Soto, to reconsider the approval of Consent Calendar Item No. 7 to allow City Manager Saeki to review the grammatical edits and proposed changes to both policies.

Motion by Vice Mayor Ballin, seconded by Councilmember Soto, to approve the policies as presented by staff. By consensus, the motion carried.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTS

8) APPOINTMENT TO THE PLANNING AND PRESERVATION COMMISSION

Motion by Councilmember Gonzales, seconded by Vice Mayor Ballin, to appoint Theale "Stormy" E. Haupt to the Planning and Preservation Commission as Councilmember Gonzales' representative. By consensus, the motion carried.

9) APPOINTMENT TO THE EDUCATION COMMISSION

Motion by Councilmember Soto, seconded by Vice Mayor Ballin, to appoint Angel Zobel-Rodriguez to the Education Commission as his representative. By consensus, the motion carried.

10) DISCUSSION REGARDING THE CITY ARBORIST

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At the request of Councilmember Soto, this item was tabled.

11) CALIFORNIA HIGH-SPEED RAIL PROJECT UPDATE

City Manager Saeki gave an update and Councilmembers expressed their concerns.

Discussion ensued and Vice Mayor Ballin asked whether the California High-Speed Rail (HSR) Authority will allow for public comments and input at their May 26th meeting in San Fernando and if all of the activities at Las Palmas Park will be cancelled on that day to facilitate parking.

Councilmember Soto suggested distributing HSR information at functions where people congregate or holding sever park functions and workshops to educate the people.

City Manager Saeki talked about the 100 feet of right-of-way required by the HSR Authority and the businesses and properties that may be affected such as Starbucks, the bike path, and the César Chávez Memorial.

By consensus, staff was directed to check with HSR Authority staff on *how* the meeting will be structured (i.e., will it be interactive and allow for community involvement?), possibly seek an expert that may assist San Fernando with our argument, and, in the meantime, to try to get as many people to attend the meeting as possible.

COMMITTEE/COMMISSION LIAISON UPDATES

Councilmember Lopez gave an update regarding a Metro meeting and Southern California Association of Governments workshop he attended that offered great networking opportunities.

Vice Mayor Ballin and Deputy City Manager/Public Works Director Marcarello gave updates regarding a recent Metropolitan Water District meeting and said there's another important meeting coming up on May 26th.

Mayor Fajardo gave an update regarding a HSR meeting that was held in Burbank and said the discussion included the Environmental Impact Report and the four proposed routes (including SR 14).

GENERAL COUNCIL COMMENTS

Councilmember Soto said that the High-Speed Rail will be a major battle and he wants to see more people informed; not just through water bills and the newspaper but by taking advantage of places where people congregate and distribute information.

Mayor Fajardo and Vice Mayor Ballin thanked staff for their hard work on the budget.

BACKGROUND:

For each City Council meeting the Finance Department prepares a Warrant Register for Council approval. The Register includes all recommended payments for the City. Checks, other than handwritten checks, generally are not released until after the Council approves the Register. The exceptions are for early releases to avoid penalties and interest, excessive delays and in all other circumstances favorable to the City to do so. Handwritten checks are those payments required to be issued between Council meetings such as insurance premiums and tax deposits. Staff reviews requests for expenditures for budgetary approval and then prepares a Warrant Register for Council approval and or ratification. Items such as payroll withholding tax deposits do not require budget approval.

The Finance Director hereby certifies that all requests for expenditures have been signed by the department head, or designee, receiving the merchandise or services thereby stating that the items or services have been received and that the resulting expenditure is appropriate. The Finance Director hereby certifies that each warrant has been reviewed for completeness and that sufficient funds are available for payment of the warrant register.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Adopt the settlement agreement reached in *State of California ex rel David Sherwin v. Office Depot, Inc.*; and
- b. Accept the settlement allocation of \$25,684.84.

BACKGROUND:

- 1. On February 23, 2015, the City received a Notice of Entry Judgement and Orders in *State of California ex rel David Sherwin v. Office Depot, Inc.*
- 2. In March 2009, David Sherwin, a former Account Manager with Office Depot's Business Solutions Division filed a qui tam action under seal on behalf of the State of California. This action alleged that Office Depot violated the California False Claims Act by overcharging various entities for office and classroom supplies.
- 3. When the Court unsealed the action, various public entities intervened in the case, filing and litigating their own complaints against Office Depot.
- 4. On November 18, 2014, Honorable Delila C. Lyons of the Los Angeles Superior Court ordered the case dismissed with prejudice, pursuant to a settlement agreement, awarding various public entities' settlement allocations with whom he did not separately agree to different terms.
- 5. As relator, Mr. Sherwin is entitled to a statutory 38% share of the public entities' settlement allocations with whom he did not separately agree to different terms.

ANALYSIS:

Pursuant to the Court's Orders, the City was not one of the public entities that intervened in this case. As such, the City was not able to separately agree to the settlement terms with Mr. Sherwin different from the statutory 38% share. Nevertheless, the City received a net settlement allocation of \$25,684.84 from Office Depot, Inc.

Since the City did not intervene, it technically is not a "party" to the suit. Additionally, since a judgement has already been entered, the City can no longer intervene. The City simply receives an allocated share of the settlement, similar to a recipient in a class action suit.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The settlement allocation of \$25,684.84 is one-time revenue that will be deposited as miscellaneous income in the General Fund.

CONCLUSION:

Acceptance the City's statutorily allocated share of the settlement represents fair compensation under the settlement agreement.



The Settlement Agreement was entered between Defendant Office Depot, Inc., the 11 Intervening Government Entities listed in the Agreement, and the Relator who, 12 pursuant to the California False Claims Act ("CFCA"), California Government 13 Code § 12652, alleged claims on behalf of all Government Entities listed in Exhibit 14 1, attached hereto. Pursuant to the CFCA, the Relator conducted the action on 15 behalf of the non-intervening Government Entities. 16 4. The Court finds that the parties, having engaged in years of litigation and two 17 mediations conducted by independent mediators, have reached the Settlement 18 19 Agreement as a result of arm's length negotiations and in good faith. 20 5. The Court, having reviewed the Settlement Agreement and considered the public 21 purposes of the CFCA, holds that the terms of the Settlement Agreement, including 22 but not limited to the dismissal of the Actions with prejudice and the releases, are 23 in all respects fair, adequate, and reasonable and in the best interests of the parties 24 involved, and serve the public purposes behind the CFCA. Accordingly, the 25 Settlement Agreement is hereby APPROVED. 26 6. The Court further holds that all parties and all real parties in interest, including all 27 of the Government Entities listed in Exhibit 1, are bound by and shall comply with 28 the terms of the Settlement Agreement, including specifically the releases (00062317; 2) [PROPOSED] ORDER GRANTING JOINT MOTION FOR APPROVAL OF SETTLEMENT 1201176.4

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1		contained therein, to the fullest extent permitted by law. However, notwithstanding
2		anything to the contrary in this Order, to the extent that Exhibit A to the Settlement
3		Agreement recites relator's share percentages that conflict with this Court's Order
4		Approving Award of Relator's Share, the terms of the Court's Order Approving
5		Award of Relator's Share (and not the relator's share percentages set forth in
6		Exhibit A to the Settlement Agreement) shall govern.
7	7	
	7.	The Court will enter separate Orders approving the distribution of the Settlement
8		Amount and the payment of Relator David Sherwin's shares in the Settlement
9	0	pursuant to Government Code Section 12652(g)(2) & (3).
10	8.	The Parties have filed a Stipulation of Dismissal with Prejudice, which was
11		contingent upon this Court's approving the Settlement Agreement. Having
12		approved the Settlement Agreement, it is further ORDERED that, pursuant to
13		Government Code, Section 12652(c)(1), all claims in the Actions, including
14		specifically all claims of the Relator, all claims asserted on behalf of the
15		Government Entities by the Relator, and all claims of the Intervenors are hereby
16		DISMISSED in their entirety WITH PREJUDICE and FINAL JUDGMENT is
17		hereby entered in the Actions.
18	9.	Without affecting the finality of approval of the Settlement Agreement in any way,
19		pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure 664.6, the Court retains jurisdiction
20		over this Action and the Parties, including all Government Entities listed in Exhibit
21		1, to resolve any disputes arising from or related to the Settlement Agreement or
22		this Order.



RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Receive and file a staff presentation on the City of Los Angeles' increase of minimum wage; and
- b. Provide staff with direction.

BACKGROUND:

- 1. On May 19, 2015, the City of Los Angeles City Council voted to approve a plan to increase the City's minimum wage to \$15 per hour by July 1, 2020.
- 2. Beginning in 2016, the minimum wage in the City of Los Angeles will increase as follows:
 - a. July 1, 2016: \$10.50
 - b. July 1, 2017: \$12.00
 - c. July 1, 2018: \$13.25
 - d. July 1, 2019: \$14.25
 - e. July 1, 2020: \$15.00
- 3. Beginning in 2017, a modified minimum wage schedule for businesses with 25 or fewer employees will increase as follows:

a. July 1, 2017: \$10.50
b. July 1, 2018: \$12.00
c. July 1, 2019: \$13.25
d. July 1, 2020: \$14.25
e. July 1, 2021: \$15.00

- 4. Non-profit organizations with 25 or fewer employees may apply with a waiver if they meet certain criteria set forth by the City of Los Angeles.
- 5. Beginning July 1, 2022, the minimum wage will increase annually based on the average Consumer Price Index over the previous 20 years.
- 6. On September 25, 2013, the California Legislature enacted legislation, signed by the Governor, raising the minimum wage for all industries. Accordingly, effective July 1, 2014, the minimum wage in California was increased to \$9.00 per hour. Additionally, effective January 1, 2016, the minimum wage in California is \$10.00 per hour.

ANALYSIS:

Minimum wage is the minimum hourly wage an employer can pay an employee for work. Minimum wage may be set by federal, state, or local governments, but cannot be less than the federal minimum wage, which is currently \$7.25 per hour. The State of California has enacted a higher minimum wage that is currently \$9.00 per hour and will increase to \$10.00 per hour on January 1, 2016. The City of Los Angeles recently approved raising the minimum wage within their City limits to \$10.50 per hour on July 1, 2016 with incremental increases thereafter until the City's minimum wage reaches \$15 per hour in 2020.

To support their decision, the City of Los Angeles retained numerous consultants and commissioned an economic study from the Institute for Research on Labor and Employment's Center on Wage and Employment Dynamics at the University of California, Berkeley (Attachment "A"). The study concluded, the proposed minimum wage increase would provide significant gains in income to Los Angeles' low-wage workers and their families. Most businesses would be able to absorb the increased costs, and consumers would see a small one-time increase in restaurant prices. The increases impact on overall employment is not likely to be significant.¹

There are many important considerations to analyze before making a decision to increase minimum wage. The City of San Fernando is in a relatively unique position as the City is completely surrounded by the City of Los Angeles with the nearest incorporated cities – Santa Clarita, Glendale, Simi Valley and La Cañada – Flintridge – more than ten (10) miles away. Therefore, businesses in San Fernando compete directly with businesses in Los Angeles for both employees and customers. Businesses also weigh the total cost of doing business when deciding where to locate. Cost of business decisions typically consider local permit costs, business license fees, other taxes, and wage requirements.

In accordance with state law, San Fernando's minimum wage will increase to \$10.00 per hour effective January 1, 2016. Further increasing the City's minimum wage to match Los Angeles' minimum wage schedule would increase the cost of doing business in San Fernando, which may, in turn, put upward pricing pressure on local goods and services. Conversely, failing to increase the minimum wage may keep the cost of doing business in San Fernando lower relative to City of Los Angeles, but may put the City's businesses at a competitive disadvantage in the labor pool due to lower wages. It is important to note, if local businesses are having trouble with hiring staff that meets their needs due to low wages, they may make the business decision to increase wages above the minimum wage to better compete in the labor pool.

The economic study included as Attachment "A" ("Study") provides information specific to the City of Los Angeles. However, using the demographic and economic data provided in the report for the City of Los Angeles as well as demographic and economic data available for the City of San Fernando, staff can extrapolate an estimated impact on the effect of a minimum wage increase on workers in San Fernando.

Estimating the impact of a minimum wage increase on business operating costs specific to San Fernando will be a little more difficult. However, the Study explores the impact to three industries – 1) Restaurant, 2) Retail, and 3) Manufacturing – which are all prominent industries in San Fernando. Together, those three industries account for approximately thirty percent (30%) of the City's sales tax base.

Overall, the Study concludes there is a net positive economic impact to increasing the minimum wage. It should be noted that there are also studies that conclude there is a net negative economic impact to increasing the minimum wage. This particular Study has been highlighted because it formed the basis for the City of Los Angeles' decision to increase minimum wage.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The specific budget impact is contingent on the direction given by City Council and may range from little to no budget impact to a very significant budget impact. See options in the Conclusion of this report for a brief identification of potential budget impact.

CONCLUSION:

Staff is seeking City Council direction related to further discussion and community outreach related to a potential minimum wage increase in San Fernando. Potential direction include, but is not limit to, the following:

1. Do not pursue increasing the minimum wage at this time (no budget impact);

- 2. Continue to pursue increasing the minimum wage and direct staff to conduct the related analysis (minimal budget impact with a few month turnaround);
- 3. Continue to pursue increasing the minimum wage and engage an economic consultant to calculate the specific impact on San Fernando (significant budget impact and potentially significant turnaround).

The Mayor of Los Angeles' Proposed City Minimum Wage Policy: A Prospective Impact Study

Executive Summary

The Mayor of Los Angeles has requested that UC Berkeley's Institute for Research on Labor and Employment conduct an impact study of his proposal to establish a city-wide minimum wage of \$13.25 an hour by 2017, phased in over three steps. This report therefore examines the effects of the minimum wage policy on Los Angeles workers, businesses and the overall economy. Drawing on a variety of government data sources, we find the following:

About 567,000 workers – or 37 percent of workers covered by the policy – would receive a pay raise under the proposed law by 2017.

• 39 percent of female workers and 35 percent of male workers would receive pay increases.

Workers' hourly wages and annual incomes would rise, resulting in a total increase in aggregate earnings of \$1.8 billion (in 2014 dollars) by 2017.

- Hourly wages of affected workers would rise by an average of \$1.89 per hour.
- Average annual earnings would increase by 21 percent, or about \$3,200 per year.

Adults, workers of color, and working poor families would see significant benefits from the proposed policy.

- 97 percent of affected workers are in their twenties or older, and 59 percent of the workers receiving raises are in their thirties or older.
- The average worker who would benefit from the law contributes 51 percent of his or her family's income.
- Workers of color (black, Hispanic, Asian and other) will disproportionately benefit from the law, representing about 83 percent of affected workers.
- The affected workers have a wide range of educational backgrounds—46 percent have at least some college and 14 percent have a bachelor's degree or higher.
- Over 80 percent of Los Angeles workers who are in low-income families will receive an increase in income from the proposed law.
- The current median annual earnings of affected workers is about \$16,000, or 44 percent of the median annual earnings in Los Angeles (\$36,000).

Previous economic research on federal, state and local minimum wage increases has found little to no measurable effect on employment or hours from minimum wage policies.

• Instead, research evidence indicates that the costs of minimum wage increases are absorbed through reduced worker turnover, improved worker performance and small one-time increases in restaurant prices. Increased costs may also be offset by the additional spending by low-wage workers and their families, acting as an economic stimulus in local economies.

The proposed minimum wage law would have a modest impact on business operating costs and consumer prices.

- About half of all affected workers are employed in four industries: restaurants (17.4 percent); retail trade (13.9 percent); health services (11.7 percent); and administrative and waste management services (9.5 percent).
- Operating costs would increase by 0.6 percent for retailers, by 4.7 percent for restaurants, and by 0.4 percent in the manufacturing sector by the time the proposed law is fully implemented in 2017.
- Restaurant prices would increase by 4.1 percent by the time the law is fully implemented. A \$10 meal would increase by 41 cents, to a total of \$10.41. For retail and the local economy as a whole, price increases would be negligible.
- We cannot rule out the possibility that the restaurant industry might experience small reductions in growth (about 560 fewer jobs a year) over the three year phase-in of the proposed law, and that some apparel manufacturing jobs might relocate outside the city.

The percentage increase in the proposed minimum wage policy is above the average of existing local minimum wage laws, but within their range.

- The proposal would raise Los Angeles' minimum wage by 47.2 percent over 3 years in nominal dollars (adjusted for inflation, the percentage increase is 36.7 percent). The 14 existing local minimum wage laws in the U.S. have mandated an average total increase of 41.3 percent, with a range of 13.3 percent to 84.5 percent.
- The proposed policy would increase the minimum wage to 59 percent of the Los Angeles median wage for full-time workers. This ratio is similar to the ratio for Seattle, and somewhat above the 55 percent historical peak for the ratio of the federal minimum wage to the national median wage.

In sum, the proposed policy would provide significant gains in income to Los Angeles' low-wage workers and their families. Most businesses would be able to absorb the increased costs, and consumers would see a small one-time increase in restaurant prices. The policy's impact on overall employment is not likely to be significant.

Introduction

The Mayor of Los Angeles has requested that UC Berkeley's Institute for Research on Labor and Employment conduct an impact study of his proposed minimum wage law for the city of Los Angeles. The proposal under consideration would establish a minimum wage of \$13.25 an hour for businesses operating in the city by 2017. The minimum wage would be raised to \$10.25 an hour in 2015; to \$11.75 in 2016; and to \$13.25 in 2017 (see Table 1). It would then be indexed to inflation in subsequent years. The proposed law would cover everyone who works in Los Angeles (except state and federal government employees and the self-employed).

In this report, we first estimate the number of workers that would be affected by the law and describe their demographic and job characteristics. We next estimate the resulting increase in wages and analyze their likely impacts on business costs, prices and employment, drawing in part on previous research. We then compare the magnitude of the proposed increase to those in existing local minimum wage laws.


Background

Although Los Angeles experienced significant job losses and unemployment during the Great Recession, its recovery is well on track. Employment growth during the recovery has matched that of California and Los Angeles County (see Figure 1). During the past year (July 2013 to July 2014), the city's employment growth rate of 2.7 percent has outpaced California's of 1.6 percent.¹ And while the city's current unemployment rate of 9.1 percent is higher than California's (7.4 percent), it has been declining at about the same rate as the state's.² In particular, analysts point to the recent rebound of the construction sector in projecting continued economic growth in the coming years (Beacon Economics 2014; Kleinhenz 2014).

By contrast, workers' wages have not recovered. Between 2007 and 2012, median annual earnings (adjusted for inflation) fell by 11.3 percent for those who work in the city of Los Angeles.³ And according to a recent Brookings Institution report, household income inequality in Los Angeles ranks ninth among U.S. cities and has increased since the start of the recession (Berube 2014).

Los Angeles is one of many localities looking to set their minimum wages at levels that reflect local economic conditions and living costs. To date, 14 cities and counties have approved local minimum wage laws, with Seattle capturing national attention this spring when it approved a minimum wage of \$15 an hour, to be phased in over several years. In California, San Jose voters approved a minimum wage initiative in 2012, and San Diego, Berkeley and Richmond all adopted city minimum wage laws this summer. Oakland will vote on a \$12.25 minimum wage in November, and San Francisco will vote on a \$15 minimum wage.

Impacts on Workers

Estimated Number of Affected Workers

To estimate the number of workers affected by the proposed minimum wage increase, we obtain the wage distribution of workers in Los Angeles County using the 2012 American Community Survey (ACS), scaled to approximate employment counts for the city of Los Angeles.⁴ This step is necessary because the ACS does not allow us to identify individuals who work in the city of Los Angeles; the smallest geographic area for measuring place of work is the county. (Using place of work data is critical for analyzing wages because 54.4 percent of those who work in the city of Los Angeles live outside the city).⁵ Our analysis suggests that the Los Angeles County wage distribution serves as a good proxy for the city of Los Angeles wage distribution. For example, 2012 median annual earnings were \$31,754 for workers employed in Los Angeles County and \$31,746 for workers employed in the city of Los Angeles.⁶ We do not include self-employed workers or federal or state government employees in our sample, since these groups of workers are not covered by the proposed Los Angeles law (the latter because of limits on city authority to regulate state and federal employers).

After simulating the wage distribution in the city of Los Angeles just before the proposed minimum wage law would go into effect in 2015, we estimate, for each yearly phase-in step, the number of workers that would be affected by the increase and the additional wages they would receive as a result. We also project

the wage distribution if the proposed law is not adopted; our impact estimates are therefore a comparison of wages under the proposed minimum wage law to wages under the state minimum wage law. In constructing these estimates, we also adjust for expected employment growth and wage growth (see Welsh-Loveman, Perry and Bernhardt (2014) for more details).

Our model produces a low and a high estimate to account for measurement error. Both estimates include a directly affected group (workers who make less than the proposed minimum wage) and an indirectly affected group (workers who make slightly more than the proposed minimum wage, but who are also likely to receive a small raise via what is known as the "ripple effect"). The two estimates differ in their assumptions about the size of the ripple effect and the number of very low-wage earners (workers making less than the minimum wage). More information on our methodology is available in the online technical appendix (Welsh-Loveman, Perry and Bernhardt 2014). In this report we present the average of the two estimates, unless otherwise noted.

Table 2 shows the estimated number and percent of workers affected by Los Angeles' proposed minimum wage increase.⁷ By 2017, 36.9 percent of covered workers will receive pay raises, or about 567,000 workers. The majority of the affected workers are directly affected workers – that is, those earning less than \$13.25 when the law is fully implemented in 2017.

Estimated Size of Wage Increases

We also estimate the additional earnings that affected workers would receive as a result of the proposed city minimum wage law, relative to their earnings under the state's minimum wage law. Table 3 presents four measures: the average increase in hourly wages, the average increase in annual earnings, the average percentage increase in annual earnings, and the total projected increase in earnings. By full implementation in 2017, we estimate that hourly wages of affected workers will have risen by about \$1.89 and that their annual earnings will have risen by about \$3,200, an increase of about 21.4 percent. In total, workers will earn about \$1.8 billion more in the first year of full implementation as a result of the higher wage rate. All estimates are expressed in 2014 dollars.⁸

Demographics of Affected Workers

Table 4 profiles key demographic characteristics of the workers affected (both directly and indirectly through the ripple effect) by the proposed Los Angeles minimum wage law.

The first column of Table 4 displays the distribution of affected workers among demographic groups. For example, 50.7 percent of affected workers are women and 49.3 percent are men. Column 2 shows the same breakdown for all covered workers in Los Angeles. The last column shows the percentage of workers in each demographic group that will be affected by the proposed law. For example, 38.6 percent of female workers and 35.2 percent of male workers will receive a wage increase under the proposed law.

Contrary to the common perception that minimum wage workers are mainly teens, we estimate that 97 percent of affected workers are in their twenties or older, and that 59 percent of the workers receiving raises are in their thirties or older. Over one-third (36.4 percent) of affected workers have children and 35 percent are married. On average, affected workers contribute 51.0 percent of family income.

Workers of color will disproportionately benefit from the law, representing about 83 percent of affected workers. Over half of affected workers are immigrants (51.8 percent). The families of affected workers are disproportionately low-income (with 51.3 percent at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty level). Over four-fifths of working poor families will receive an increase in income from the proposed law. Compared to the overall workforce, affected workers are less likely to hold a Bachelor's degree.

Job Characteristics of Affected Workers

In Table 5, we profile the job characteristics of workers affected by the proposed minimum wage law. The median of annual earnings among the affected workers is less than half of the median for the Los Angeles workforce as a whole. Affected workers are also more likely to work part-time and part-year than the overall workforce, and are less likely to have health insurance provided by their employer.

The industry breakdown is also instructive. About half of all affected workers are employed in four industries: restaurants (17.4 percent); retail trade (13.9 percent); health services (11.7 percent); and administrative and waste management services (9.5 percent). (The latter set of industries includes building services contractors and employment agencies). Several smaller industries also have a disproportionate number of affected workers, such as accommodation, apparel manufacturing, social assistance and other services.

Impacts on Businesses

Impact on Costs for Business Owners

We next estimate the impact of Los Angeles' proposed minimum wage law on the operating costs of businesses. Our analysis compares the estimated increase in total labor costs resulting from the proposed law to the existing labor costs paid by employers, drawing on our estimates in Table 2 and Table 3 above.

Table 6 shows our analysis of the estimated increase in business operating costs in three industries that play a key role in the Los Angeles economy and that have significant numbers of low-wage workers. By 2017, businesses' total payroll costs will increase by 14.0 percent in the restaurant industry, 5.2 percent in the retail industry, and 3.0 percent in the manufacturing sector, compared to payroll costs under state minimum wage law. However, operating costs will rise by a much smaller amount, since labor costs only make up a portion of total operating costs that businesses face. Labor costs excluding health benefits currently account for 31 percent of restaurant operating costs, 11 percent of retail operating costs rise due the proposed minimum wage increase).⁹ We therefore estimate that by 2017, total operating costs will increase by 4.7 percent for restaurants, by 0.6 percent for retail and by 0.4 percent for manufacturing, as a result of the proposed minimum wage law.

Offsets to Increased Business Costs

As reviewed in detail by Reich, Jacobs and Bernhardt (2014), businesses absorb the costs of a higher minimum wage in a variety of ways. One mechanism, discussed next, involves increases in prices. Others

include improved worker performance and reduced turnover. We also summarize what the research evidence shows in terms of impacts on employment and hours, and briefly discuss possible responses in apparel manufacturing in particular. Finally, we review the potential benefits from increased spending by affected workers and their families.

Impact on Restaurant and Retail Prices

Firms may adjust to increased costs by passing on some or all of the increases to consumers through higher prices. Since the minimum wage applies to all employers, individual firms such as restaurants that serve the local market will be able to pass costs through to consumers without experiencing a competitive disadvantage within their industry.

Research by Aaronson, French and MacDonald (2008) has found that for every percentage point increase in the minimum wage, restaurant prices rise by 0.072 percent. Preliminary results from a study of San Jose's recent minimum wage increase (from \$8 to \$10 in March 2013) arrive at a similar estimate (Allegretto and Reich 2014). An earlier study (Lee et al. 2000) showed that restaurant operating costs increase by about 0.1 percent for each percentage increase in the minimum wage (see also Benner and Jayaraman 2012). These studies together thus suggest that 70 to 75 percent of cost increases are passed on as higher restaurant prices.

In Table 7 we provide our estimates of the impact on restaurant and retail prices under the proposed Los Angeles minimum wage law.¹⁰ (We do not estimate likely price adjustments for manufacturing because the minimum wage research literature does not offer guidance on how this sector will adjust.) For restaurants, we predict a cumulative increase in prices of 4.1 percent by 2017, which is very similar to the prediction from the research literature above. The price of a \$10 menu item would thus increase very modestly, to \$10.41. (Prices in the restaurant industry overall have increased about 2.1 percent per year in recent years.) For retail trade and the local economy as a whole, price increases would be negligible.

Impact on Turnover and Productivity

Increasing the minimum wage can also reduce the high levels of job churning that characterize lowwage labor markets. The National Restaurant Association estimates that annual employee turnover in restaurants approaches 75 percent in some restaurant classifications (National Restaurant Association 2010). Turnover levels are high because workers often leave to find a higher-wage job, or because they are unable to stay in their jobs due to poverty-related problems such as difficulties with transportation, child care, or health. Dube, Naidu and Reich (2007) found that worker tenure increased substantially in San Francisco restaurants after the 2003 minimum wage law, especially in fast-food restaurants. Dube, Lester and Reich (2013) found that a 10 percent increase in the minimum wage results in a 2.1 percent reduction in turnover for restaurant workers. Turnover can be quite costly to firms, even for low-wage workers. Boushey and Glynn (2012) find that the median cost of replacement for a job paying \$30,000 a year or less is 16.1 percent of an employee's annual earnings. As a result, raising the minimum wages can reduce turnover and increase job stability. The associated reduction in employers' recruitment and retention costs offsets about 20 to 25 percent of the costs of minimum wage increases (Dube, Lester and Reich 2013).¹¹

Paying workers more can also affect morale, absenteeism, the number of grievances, customer service, and work effort among other metrics (Reich, Jacobs and Dietz 2014; Hirsch, Kaufman and Zelenska 2011).

Impact on Employment and Hours

The above research on prices, turnover, and work performance helps to explain why an extensive body of research has found few to no measurable impacts on employment or hours from minimum wage increases in the United States. Belman and Wolfson (2014) provide the most extensive recent summary of the minimum wage research literature. They conclude that minimum wage employment effects in the U.S. are "both vanishingly small and not statistically significant in even the most generous test" (p. 168). A separate review of minimum wage research by Schmitt (2013) similarly finds "the minimum wage has little or no discernible effect on the employment prospects of low-wage workers."

Allegretto, Dube, Reich and Zipperer (2013) looked at every state and federal minimum wage increase in the U.S. between 1990 and 2012 and identified several hundred pairs of adjacent counties that were located on different sides of a state border with a minimum wage difference. This research design compares the employment trends of the most affected groups – teens and restaurants – across adjacent counties with different minimum wage levels. The comparison across county borders provides a close proxy for what can be expected from local minimum wage laws. The study finds no statistically significant effects of minimum wage increases on either employment or hours in restaurants and other low-wage industries, controlling for a range of regional and local differences. Using the border county pair method, Aaronson, French and Sorkin (2013) obtained similar results.

Several rigorous studies have analyzed the impact of local minimum wage laws, with similar results. Dube, Naidu and Reich (2007) studied the impact of San Francisco's minimum wage law after it increased from \$6.75 to \$8.50 an hour in 2004. The authors surveyed a sample of restaurants before and after the wage increase. The sample included restaurants from San Francisco as well as neighboring East Bay cities that were not covered by the policy.




Figure 2. Bay Area Restaurant Employment

The authors found no statistically significant negative effects on either employment or the proportion of full-time jobs as a result of the San Francisco law. This finding holds for both full-service and fast-food restaurants (one might expect more sensitivity to a higher minimum wage in the latter). Figure 2 shows the results from their follow-up study (Reich, Jacobs, and Dietz 2014). Restaurant employment in San Francisco rose slightly faster than in surrounding counties after the minimum wage increase, and again after San Francisco implemented two additional policies (paid sick leave and a health spending requirement).

Potter (2006) studied the impact of Santa Fe's minimum wage law after it increased from \$5.15 to

\$8.50 in 2004, a substantial increase of 65 percent. Potter compares changes in employment at Santa Fe businesses before and after the ordinance went into effect, and to changes in employment in nearby Albuquerque over the same time period. (Albuquerque did not have a city minimum wage law at that time.) Potter found no statistically significant negative impact of Santa Fe's minimum wage increase on the city's employment. This finding also held for accommodation and food services, the industries with the highest proportion of minimum wage workers.

Schmitt and Rosnick (2011) studied the impact of city minimum wage laws in San Francisco and Santa Fe, comparing employment trends in these cities before and after their minimum wage increases to control groups of surrounding suburbs and nearby metropolitan areas. The authors focused on fast-food restaurants, food services, retail trade, and other low-wage industries, and found no discernible negative employment effects, even three years after the ordinances were implemented.¹²

In summary, the best research studies find that minimum wage mandates (in the range implemented to date) do not have a statistically significant negative effect on employment or hours. However, the minimum wage increase proposed for Los Angeles is higher than the range studied in existing research. We therefore cannot rule out limited disemployment effects in highly affected industries. The most affected industries are likely to be restaurants (and apparel manufacturing, to which we turn below). To illustrate the potential magnitudes involved, we have modeled a scenario that uses high-range estimates of restaurant employment losses due to minimum wage increases (Allegretto et al. 2013; Zipperer 2014). Under this scenario, the proposed law might reduce restaurant employment – over the next three years. To place this estimate in context, consider that the Los Angeles restaurant industry grew by 3.5 percent from February 2013 to February 2014 (Beacon Economics 2014). This estimate can also be compared to the large number of Los Angeles' restaurant workers – 77 percent – who will receive significant wage increases.

Impact on the Location of Apparel Manufacturing

Wages in the Los Angeles manufacturing sector range from very low in apparel manufacturing to much higher in aerospace and biotech manufacturing. As seen in Table 6, the impact on operating costs for the city's manufacturing sector as a whole is relatively small, but this estimate averages across very different industries. In particular, for apparel manufacturing, the impact of the proposed minimum wage law on operating costs by 2017 is larger, at 3.3 percent. Unfortunately, the existing research literature does not give guidance on how apparel firms are likely to adjust to minimum wage increases. We do know that employment in the Los Angeles apparel industry exhibits a long-term downward trend due to the globalization of production, and that the industry currently represents 1.7 percent of employment (28,000 jobs in the third quarter of 2013). Two scenarios are possible for the firms that remain.¹³ On the one hand, the apparel manufacturers that still operate in Los Angeles are there because of specific location advantages, serving just-in-time markets or specializing in higher-end segments of the industry – and those advantages might outweigh the impact of a minimum wage increase. If all manufacturers in the city fit this description, employment would not decline because of the proposed law, but prices might increase by as much as 3.3 percent. On the other hand, smaller garment contractors in particular are quite mobile and therefore might move from the city of Los Angeles to other locations within the county, where the minimum wage would remain lower. The actual effect is likely to be somewhere between these two scenarios.

Impact on Consumer Spending

Finally, a higher minimum wage will boost consumer spending by low- and moderate-income households whose workers receive pay increases, which in turn can act as a modest economic stimulus (Cooper and Hall 2012). Low-wage workers spend a greater share of their income than do other income groups. As with other forms of economic stimulus, the increased spending would have a multiplier effect resulting in additional benefits to economic growth (Aaronson and French 2013; Cooper and Hall 2012). The industries that would gain the most from increased consumer spending include those that are also more highly affected by the minimum wage increase – such as restaurants and retail.¹⁴ While not all of the increased spending would be captured in the city, it would have a positive impact on consumer demand in the economic region. A full estimation of the consumer spending impact in Los Angeles is beyond the scope of this paper. But this stimulus effect is likely one of the factors that explains the consistent finding in the literature of no significant net employment effects of minimum wage increases.

The Overall Impact on the Los Angeles Economy

Given the above analysis, how will the proposed minimum wage increase affect the Los Angeles economy as a whole? There will be both positive and negative effects, and a key question is which will be larger. On the positive side, as Table 3 reports, by the time the law is fully implemented, Los Angeles' low-wage workers would receive about \$1.8 billion more in pay, beyond what they would receive under scheduled increases in the state's minimum wage law. These workers and their families will in turn spend this amount, some of it in Los Angeles, some of it in the rest of the county, and some elsewhere. The spending that takes place in Los Angeles will increase the level of economic activity. Also on the positive side, employer turnover costs will fall and worker productivity will increase. On the negative side, there may be a small reduction in restaurant growth during the law's phase-in period, some apparel jobs may relocate outside the city, some companies may earn lower profits, and we can expect a modest one-time price

increase, mainly in the restaurant industry. For moderate minimum wage increases, the findings in the minimum wage research literature indicate that these positive and negative effects on the overall economy balance each other out, without measurable net effects either way.

Still, the economic research summarized above is necessarily limited to studying the minimum wage laws that have been implemented to date. While these studies are suggestive, they cannot tell us definitively what might occur when minimum wages are increased significantly beyond existing local, state, or federal mandates. It is therefore useful to ask how Los Angeles' proposed minimum wage increase compares to those that have been implemented in the past.

Comparison to Other Minimum Wage Increases

As shown in Table 8, at the point of full implementation in 2017, the proposed ordinance will have increased Los Angeles' minimum wage by 47.2 percent in nominal dollars (adjusting for inflation, the percentage increase is 36.7 percent).

This percentage increase in the minimum wage is within the range of other local minimum wage laws. The 14 other local minimum wage laws in the U.S. have mandated a total average increase of 41.3 percent in their minimum wage, with a range of 13.3 to 84.5 percent.¹⁵ A number of these laws were also phased in over time. Across all existing local laws, first-year increases ranged from 6.7 to 65.0 percent, with an average of 22.0 percent. The first-year increase in Los Angeles would be 13.9 percent, so again, Los Angeles' proposed increase falls within the range of other cities' laws.

The ratio of the minimum wage to the median full-time wage provides another measure used by economists to determine the ability of an economy to absorb higher minimum wage levels. The proposed final 2017 wage of \$13.25 (converted to 2014 dollars) equals 59 percent of the 2014 median full-time wage in Los Angeles of \$20.81 an hour. This ratio is above the historical range of the federal minimum wage/median ratio, which reached 55 percent in 1968 (Dube 2013) and it is equal to the 59 percent ratio in the new Seattle law (Weissman 2014). New research by Zipperer (2014) shows that the overall effects of past minimum wage increases have been no greater at up to 55 percent of the median wage than at lower percentages. The Los Angeles proposal can also be compared to current California minimum wage law. The minimum wage/median wage ratio will increase to just under 50 percent when California's minimum wage increases to \$10 on January 1, 2016 (Allegretto, Reich and West 2014).

While these perspectives on past increases are instructive, the share of workers projected to receive wage increases under the proposed law (37 percent), is higher than found in research on other laws. Caution is therefore required. As we have mentioned in the context of the restaurant industry, Los Angeles' proposed minimum wage increase could increase restaurant prices by about 4.1 percent, which in turn might have a small effect on restaurant industry growth. We also cannot estimate how low-wage manufacturing industries such as apparel will be affected. Nonetheless, the effect on employment overall in Los Angeles is not likely to be significant. The phase-in period would provide additional information on this issue.

Conclusion

Drawing on a variety of government data sources, we estimate that 567,000 workers would benefit from the proposed minimum wage law, with the average worker earning an additional \$3,200 a year (once the law is fully implemented). Our analysis of the existing economic research literature suggests that most businesses will adjust to modest increases in operating costs through reduced employee turnover costs, improved work performance, and a small, one-time increase in restaurant prices. A few industries might experience slower growth or some relocation of jobs outside the city; these effects would be far outweighed by the income increases of the low-wage workforce as a whole.

The existing research evidence is based upon minimum wage increases between 1990 and 2012, which did not reach the levels now being proposed or enacted by Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle and other localities. Prudence therefore suggests that the actual effects of the law should be monitored.

For the restaurant industry, we use industry data on gross operating surplus available from the <u>Bureau of Economic</u> <u>Analysis Input-Output Account Data</u> (Use Table, 2012, Before Redefinitions, Producer Value). We subtract gross operating surplus from sales to get total restaurant operating costs, and then proceed as was done for retail. For manufacturing industries we use data from the <u>2012 Economic Census (Table EC123111</u>). To determine operating expenses we add together payroll costs and fringe benefits, total cost of materials, total capital expenditures, depreciation, rental or lease payments, and all other operating expenses. To determine labor costs we add together payroll costs and fringe benefits excluding health insurance.

¹¹ An increased minimum wage may also lead to greater firm turnover in the time period immediately following the increase as well. A recent study at the Chicago Federal Reserve Board (Aaronson, French and Sorkin 2013) estimates that while a larger number of restaurants exit the industry after a minimum wage increase, they are replaced by an equal number of new and similarly-sized entrants, and that overall employment does not change.

¹² The restaurant industry-backed Employment Policies Institute has produced three studies of Santa Fe and San Francisco (Yelowitz 2005a; 2005b; 2012). In our assessment, these studies suffer from serious methodological

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council introduce for a first reading, in title only, of Ordinance No. 1642 (Attachment "A") titled, "An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of San Fernando Amending Article III, Stormwater and Urban Runoff Pollution Control Low Impact Development (LID) Requirements Pursuant to the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit Requirements for the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4).

BACKGROUND:

- On November 8, 2012, the Los Angeles Regional Water Quality Control Board (Regional Board) adopted Order R4-2012-0175, the newest municipal National Pollutant Discharge Elimination Systems Permit (MS4 Permit), which became effective on December 28, 2012. This MS4 Permit contained a number of new LID requirements for development and redevelopment activities, and incentives for permittees willing to work cooperatively with other agencies in watershed planning efforts.
- 2. On December 2, 2013, the City Council approved participation in the Upper Los Angeles River Enhanced Watershed Management Plan Group and authorized the City's participation in the Upper Los Angeles River Enhanced Watershed Management Plan (ULAR-EWMP). Electing to participate in the development of the ULAR-EWMP provided a 24-month extension to the City for LID requirements of the Permit to be incorporated into the City's Municipal Code.

Consideration to Adopt Ordinance No. 1642 Updating Municipal Code, Article III, Stormwater and Urban Runoff Pollution Control

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ANALYSIS:

The City of San Fernando is a permittee under the MS4 permit which was adopted by the California Regional Water Quality Central Board, Los Angeles Region, on November 8, 2012. This permit contains all regulations and requirements for subject cities in Los Angeles County for compliance with the NPDES program.

The NPDES program for municipal dischargers, established by the federal Clean Water Act, requires the permittee to demonstrate that they have the necessary legal authority to prohibit non-storm water discharges to the MS4, as well as possess adequate legal authority to develop and enforce storm water and non-storm water ordinances for its jurisdiction. A new MS4 permit is issued to municipal dischargers approximately every five years.

The 2012 MS4 Permit requires that minor edits be made throughout Article III of the City's Municipal Code for consistency with the new terminology and requirements. In addition, the MS4 Permit requires the incorporation of Low Impact Development (LID) requirements into the City's Municipal Code. This ordinance will now require development and redevelopment activities to change post construction controls from a Standard Urban Stormwater Mitigation Plan (SUSMP) requiring traditional structural Best Management Practices (BMPs) to a Storm Water Mitigation Plan (SWMP) that incorporates LID practices. These LID requirements are intended to lessen the impacts of development by using smart growth practices, including preserving and recreating natural landscape features and minimizing impervious features to create functional site drainage that treats stormwater as a resource rather than a water product. Examples of LIDs are swales with sump wells and parking lots that drain into adjacent vegetated areas.

The new LID ordinance will require developers of projects to submit and receive approval for a LID plan prior to the issuance of grading and building permits. The following projects must comply with LID regulation:

- New development projects involving one (1) acre or greater of distributed area and adding more than 10,000 square feet of impervious area;
- New industrial parks and commercial centers with 10,000 square feet or more of surface area;
- New retail gas stations with 5,000 square feet or more of impervious area or 25 or more parking spaces;
- New auto service facilities with 5,000 square feet or more of service area.

Under this new requirement, LID plans will be reviewed during the plan check process for development projects.

Consideration to Adopt Ordinance No. 1642 Updating Municipal Code, Article III, Stormwater and Urban Runoff Pollution Control

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The City is required to have these proposed revisions to the storm water ordinance in effect no later than June 28, 2015.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The adoption of Ordinance No.1642 will have no impact on the proposed Fiscal Year 2015-2016 budget.

CONCLUSION:

Pursuant to the City's MS4 Permit requirements, it is recommended that the City Council introduce and give first reading by title only to the attached Ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. 1642

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO AMENDING ARTICLE III – STORMWATER AND URBAN RUNOFF POLLUTION CONTROL LOW **IMPACT DEVELOPMENT (LID) REQUIREMENTS PURSUANT TO** NATIONAL POLLUTANT THE DISCHARGE SYSTEM ELIMINATION (NPDES) PERMIT **REOUIREMENTS FOR THE MUNICIPAL SEPARATE STORM SEWER SYSTEM (MS4)**

The City Council of the City of San Fernando does ordain as follows:

Section 1. Article III – Storm and Urban Runoff Pollution Control of the San Fernando City Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 34-96. - Title.

This article shall be known as the City of San Fernando Stormwater and Urban Runoff Pollution Control Low Impact Development (LID) Requirements Pursuant to the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit Requirements for the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Ordinance.

(Code 1957, § 22A.70)

Sec. 34-97. - Purpose and intent.

- (a) The purpose of this article is to ensure the future health, safety and general welfare of the citizens of the city and the water quality of the receiving waters of the county and surrounding coastal areas by:
 - (1) Reducing pollutants in stormwater discharges to the maximum extent possible;
 - (2) Regulating illicit connections and illicit discharges and thereby reducing the level of contamination of stormwater and urban runoff into the city stormwater system; and
 - (3) Regulating nonstormwater discharges to the city stormwater system.
- (b) The intent of this article is to protect and enhance the quality of watercourses, water bodies, and wetlands within the city in a manner consistent with the Federal Clean Water Act, the California Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act and the city National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit.
- (c) This article is also intended to provide the city with the legal authority necessary to control discharges to and from those portions of the city stormwater system over which it has jurisdiction, as required by the city NPDES permit, and thereby fully and timely comply with the terms of the city NPDES permit while the Countywide Storm Water Management Plan CSWMP and the Upper Los Angeles River Enhanced Watershed Management Plan or 'ULAR EWMP" is being developed by the permittees under the city NPDES permit, and in contemplation of the subsequent

amendment of this article or adoption by the city of additional provisions of this article to implement the subsequently adopted CSWMP and ULAR EWMP or other programs developed under the city NPDES permit.

(d) This chapter also sets forth requirements for the construction and operation of certain "Commercial Development", "New Development", "Redevelopment", "Priority Planning Projects" and other projects (as further defined herein) that are intended to ensure compliance with the stormwater mitigation measures prescribed in the current version of the Standard Urban Stormwater Mitigation Plan (SUSMP), ULAR EWMP, or other documents approved by the Regional Water Quality Control Board-Los Angeles Region ("LARWQCB"), and on file in the office of the city clerk of this city. This chapter authorizes the Director (herein identified as the city's Public Works Director) to define and adopt applicable Best Management Practices and other stormwater pollution control measures, to grant waivers from certain requirements, as provided herein, to cite infractions and to impose fines pursuant to this chapter. Except as otherwise provided herein, the Director shall administer, implement and enforce the provisions of this article of this chapter of the city code.

(Code 1957, § 22A.71; Ord. No. 1517, § 1, 9-5-2000; Ord. No. 1519, § 2, 2-5-2001)

Sec. 34-98. - Definitions.

Except as specifically provided herein, any term used in this chapter shall be defined as that term is defined in the current city NPDES permit, or in the most recent version of the standard urban storm water mitigation plan ("SUSMP"), ULAR EWMP, or other documents approved by the Los Angeles Regional Water Quality Control Board, State Water Resources Control Board, or if it is not specifically defined in either the city NPDES permit or LARWQCB approved planning documents, then as such term is defined in the Federal Clean Water Act, as amended, and/or the regulations promulgated thereunder. If the definition of any term contained in this section conflicts with the definition of the same term in the current city NPDES permit or LARWQCB approved planning document, then the definition contained in the city NPDES permit shall govern and, if not set forth in the city NPDES permit, the definition contained in the ULAR EWMP shall govern. The following words and phrases shall have the following meanings when used in this chapter:

Area susceptible to runoff means any surface directly exposed to precipitation or in the path of runoff caused by precipitation, which path leads off the parcel on which the surface is located.

Automotive service facilities means a facility that is categorized in any one of the following Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) codes: 5013, 5014, 5511, 5541, 7532-7534, or 7536-7539 (as amended).

Best management practices (BMPs) means activities, practices, facilities, and/or procedures that when implemented to their maximum efficiency will prevent or reduce pollutants in discharges and any program, technology, process, siting criteria, operational methods or measures, or engineered systems that when implemented prevent, control, remove, or reduce pollution. Examples of BMP's may include, but are

not limited to public education and outreach, proper planning of development projects, proper cleaning of catch basin inlets, and proper sludge or waste-handling and disposal.

Biofiltration means a Low Impact Development (LID) BMP that reduces Storm Water Pollutant Discharges by intercepting rainfall on vegetative canopy, and through incidental Infiltration and/or evapotranspiration, and filtration. Incidental Infiltration is an important factor in achieving the required pollutant load reduction.

Bioretention means a LID BMP that reduces stormwater runoff by intercepting rainfall on vegetative canopy, and through evapotranspiration and Infiltration.

City means the City of San Fernando.

Clean Water Act or CWA means the Federal Water Pollution Control Act enacted in 1972, by Public Law 92-500, and amended by the Water Quality Act of 1987. The Clean Water Act prohibits the Discharge of Pollutants to Waters of the United States unless the Discharge is in accordance with an NPDES permit.

Commercial development means any development on private land that is not heavy industrial or residential. The category includes, but is not limited to: hospitals, laboratories and other medical facilities, educational institutions, recreational facilities, plant nurseries, car wash facilities, mini-malls and other business complexes, shopping malls, hotels, office buildings, public warehouses and other light industrial complexes.

Construction means constructing, clearing, grading, or excavation that results in soil disturbance. Construction includes structure teardown. It does not include: routine maintenance to maintain original line and grade, hydraulic capacity, or original purpose of facility; emergency construction activities required to immediately protect public health and safety; interior remodeling with no outside exposure of construction material or construction waste to storm water; mechanical permit work; or sign permit work.

Control means to minimize, reduce, eliminate, or prohibit by technological, legal, contractual or other means, the discharge of pollutants from an activity or activities.

CSWMP means the countywide stormwater management plan being developed by the permittees under the city NPDES permit.

Development means any construction, rehabilitation, redevelopment or reconstruction of any public or private residential project (whether single-family, multiunit or planned unit development, or mixed-use developments); industrial, commercial, retail and other nonresidential projects, including public agency projects; or mass grading for future construction. It does not include routine maintenance to maintain original line and grade, hydraulic capacity, or original purpose of facility, nor does it include emergency construction activities required to immediately protect public health and safety.

Directly adjacent means situated within 200 feet of the contiguous zone required for the continued maintenance, function, and structural stability of the environmentally sensitive area.

Director means the city's Public Works Director, or his or her designee, and shall be considered the authorized "enforcement officer" of this article of this chapter of the city code.

Discharge means any release, spill, leak, pump, flow, escape, dumping, or disposal of any liquid, semi-solid, or solid substance.

Discharge of a pollutant means any addition of any "pollutant" or combination of pollutants to "waters of the United States" or "waters of the State" from any "point source" or, any addition of any pollutant or combination of pollutants to the waters of the "contiguous zone" or the ocean from any point source other than a vessel or other floating craft that is being used as a means of transportation. The term "discharge" includes additions of pollutants into waters of the United States from: surface runoff that is collected or channeled by man; discharges through pipes, sewers, or other conveyances owned by a state, city, or other person that do not lead to a treatment works; and discharges through pipes, sewers, or other conveyances, leading into privately owned treatment works.

Discharging directly means outflow from a drainage conveyance system that is composed entirely or predominantly of flows from the subject property, development, subdivision, or industrial facility, and not commingled with the flows from adjacent lands.

Discretionary project is defined in the same manner as section 15357 of the Guidelines for Implementation of the California Environmental Quality Act contained in Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations, as amended, and means a project that requires the exercise of judgment or deliberation when the city decides to approve or disapprove a particular activity, as distinguished from situations where the city merely has to determine whether there has been conformity with applicable statutes, ordinances, or regulations.

Disturbed area means an area that is altered as a result of clearing, grading, and/or excavation.

Environmentally sensitive area ("ESA") means an area in which plant or animal life or their habitats are either rare or especially valuable because of their special nature or role in an ecosystem and that would be easily disturbed or degraded by human activities and developments (Public Resources Code § 30107.5). Areas subject to storm water mitigation requirements are areas designated as significant ecological areas by the county (*Los Angeles County Significant Areas Study, Los Angeles County Department of Regional Planning* (1976) and amendments); an area designated as a significant natural area by the State department of fish and game's significant natural areas program, provided that area has been field verified by the State department of fish and game; an area listed in the basin plan as supporting the rare, threatened, or endangered species (RARE) beneficial use; and an area identified by the city as environmentally sensitive.

Flow-through BMPs means a modular, vault type "high flow biotreatment" devices contained within an impervious vault with an underdrain or designed with an impervious liner and an underdrain.

Green Roof means a LID BMP using planter boxes and vegetation to intercept rainfall on the roof surface.

Good housekeeping practices means common practices related to the storage, use, or cleanup of materials, performed in a manner that minimizes the discharge of

pollutants. Examples include, but are not limited to: purchasing only the quantity of materials to be used at a given time; use of alternative and less environmentally harmful products; cleaning up spills and leaks; and, storing materials in a manner that will contain any leaks or spills.

Greater-than-nine unit home subdivision means any subdivision being developed for ten or more single-family or multifamily dwelling units.

Hillside means property located in an area with known erosive soil conditions, where the development contemplates grading on any natural slope that is 25 percent or greater and where grading contemplates cut or fill slopes.

Infiltration means the downward entry of water into the surface of the soil.

Illicit connection means any human-made conveyance that is connected to the storm drain system without a permit, excluding roof drains and other similar type connections. Examples include channels, pipelines, conduits, inlets, or outlets that are connected directly to the storm drain system.

Illicit discharge means any discharge to the storm drain system that is prohibited under local, State or Federal statutes, ordinances, codes or regulations. This includes all nonstormwater discharges except discharges pursuant to a separate NPDES permit and discharges that are exempted or conditionally exempted in accordance with the city NPDES permit.

Low Impact Development or "*LID*" consists of building and landscape features designed to retain or filter stormwater runoff.

Material means any substance, including, but not limited to, garbage and debris; lawn clippings, leaves, and other vegetation; biological and fecal waste; sediment and sludge; oil and grease; gasoline; paints, solvents, cleaners, and any fluid or solid containing chemicals.

City NPDES permit means the "Waste Discharge Requirements for City Storm Water and Urban Runoff Discharges within the County of Los Angeles, and the Incorporated Cities therein, except the City of Long Beach, which became effective on December 28, 2012, issued by the State regional water quality control board, Los Angeles Region, and any successor permit to that permit.

City separate storm sewer system or "*MS4*" means streets, gutters, conduits, natural or artificial drains, channels and watercourses, or other facilities that are owned, operated, maintained or controlled by the city and used for the purpose of collecting, storing, transporting, or disposing of stormwater.

National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System or "NPDES" means the national program for issuing, modifying, revoking and reissuing, terminating, monitoring and enforcing permits, and imposing and enforcing pretreatment requirements, under CWA Section 307, 402, 318, and 405.

New development means land disturbing activities; structural development, including construction or installation of a building or structure, creation of impervious surfaces; and land subdivision.

Nonstormwater discharge means any discharge to a city stormwater system that is not composed entirely of stormwater.

Parking lot means land area or a facility for the parking or storage of motor vehicles used for businesses, commerce, industry, or personal use, with a lot size of 5,000 square feet or more of surface area, or with 25 or more parking spaces.

Planning Priority Projects means those projects that are required to incorporate appropriate storm water mitigation measures into the design plan for their respective project, including:

- (1) All new development projects equal to one (1) acre or greater of disturbed area and adding more than 10,000 square feet of impervious surface area;
- (2) New industrial parks 10,000 square feet or more of surface area;
- (3) New commercial malls 10,000 square feet or more surface area;
- (4) New single-family Hillside homes;
- (5) New streets and roads construction of 10,000 square feet or more of impervious surface area, including standalone streets, roads, highways, freeway projects, and streets within larger Projects;
- (6) Ten or more unit homes (includes single-family homes, multifamily homes, condominiums, and apartments);
- (7) One (1) acre or more square feet of impervious surface area industrial/commercial development (including parking area);
- (8) Automotive service facilities (SIC 5013, 5014, 5541, 7532-7534, and 7536-7539);
- (9) Retail gasoline outlets;
- (10)Restaurants (SIC 5812);
- (11)Parking lots 5,000 square feet or more of surface area or with 25 or more parking spaces;
- (12)Redevelopment projects in subject categories that meet redevelopment thresholds;
- (13) Projects located in or directly adjacent to or discharging directly to an ESA that meet the thresholds described herein; and
- (14) Those projects that require the implementation of a site-specific plan to mitigate post development storm water for new development not requiring a SUSMP but which may potentially have adverse impacts on post-development storm water quality, and where the following project characteristics exist:
 - a. Vehicle or equipment fueling areas;

b. Vehicle or equipment maintenance areas, including washing and repair;

c. Commercial or industrial waste handling or storage;

- d. Outdoor handling or storage of hazardous materials;
- e. Outdoor manufacturing areas;
- f. Outdoor food handling or processing;
- g. Outdoor animal care, confinement, or slaughter; or
- h. Outdoor horticulture activities.

Pollutant means those pollutants defined in section 502(6) of the federal Clean Water Act (33 USC 1362(6)), or incorporated into Water Code § 13373. Examples of pollutants include, but are not limited to the following:

- (1) Commercial and industrial waste, such as fuels, solvents, detergents, plastic pellets, hazardous substances, fertilizers, pesticides, slag, ash, and sludge.
- (2) Metals such as cadmium, lead, zinc, copper, silver, nickel, chromium; and nonmetals such as phosphorus and arsenic.
- (3) Petroleum hydrocarbons, such as fuels, lubricants, surfactants, waste oils, solvents, coolants and grease.
- (4) Excessive eroded soils, sediment and particulate materials in amounts which may adversely affect the beneficial use of the receiving waters, flora or fauna of the state.
- (5) Animal wastes, such as discharge from confinement facilities, kennels, pens, recreational facilities, stables, and show facilities.
- (6) Substances having characteristics such as pH less than six or greater than nine, or unusual coloration or turbidity, or excessive levels of fecal coliform or fecal streptococcus or enterococcus.

The term "pollutant" does not include uncontaminated stormwater, potable water or reclaimed water generated by a lawfully permitted water treatment facility. The term "pollutant" also shall not include any substance identified in this definition if, through compliance with the best management practices available, the discharge of such substance has been reduced or eliminated to the maximum extent possible. In an enforcement action, the burden shall be on the person who is the subject of such action to establish the reduction or elimination of the discharge to the maximum extent possible through compliance with the best management practices available.

Project means all development, redevelopment, and land disturbing activities.

Redevelopment means land disturbing activity that results in the creation, addition or replacement of at least 5,000 square feet of impervious surface area on an already developed site. Redevelopment includes, but is not limited to the following activities that meet the minimum standards set forth in this definition: (1) the expansion of a building footprint; (2) addition or replacement of a structure; (3) replacement of impervious surface that that is not part of a routine maintenance activity; and (4) land disturbing activities related to structural or impervious surfaces. Redevelopment does not include routine maintenance activities that are conducted to maintain original line and grade, hydraulic capacity, original purpose of facility or emergency redevelopment activity required to protect public health and safety.

Regional Board or "LARWQCB" means the California Regional Water Quality Control, Los Angeles Region.

Restaurant means a facility that sells prepared foods and drinks for consumption, including stationary lunch counters and refreshment stands selling prepared foods and drinks for immediate consumption. (SIC Code 5812).

Retail gasoline outlet means any facility engaged in selling gasoline and lubricating oils.

Routine Maintenance means recurring, preventative, and on-going maintenance necessary to delay and/or prevent the failure of critical and non-critical building systems and equipment including, but not limited to the following:

- A. Maintain the original line and grade, hydraulic capacity, or original purpose of the facility; or
- B. Perform as needed restoration work to preserve the original design grade, integrity and hydraulic capacity of flood control facilities; or
- C. Includes road shoulder work, regrading dirt or gravel roadways and shoulders and performing ditch cleanouts; or
- D. "Update existing lines" and facilities to comply with applicable codes, standards, and regulations regardless if such Projects result in increased capacity; or

E. Repair leaks.

Routine maintenance does not include construction of "new lines" or facilities resulting from compliance with applicable codes, standards and regulations.

"Update existing lines" includes replacing existing lines with new materials or pipes.

"New lines" are those that are not associated with existing facilities and are not part of a project to update or replace existing lines.

Runoff means any runoff including storm water and dry weather flows from a drainage area that reaches a receiving water body or subsurface. During dry weather it is typically comprised of base flow either contaminated with pollutants or uncontaminated, and nuisance flows.

Site means the land or water area where any "facility or activity" is physically located or conducted, including adjacent land used in connection with the facility or activity.

Source control BMP means any schedule of activities, prohibition of practices, maintenance procedures, managerial practices or operational practices that aim to prevent stormwater pollution by reducing the potential for contamination at the source of pollution.

Storm event means a rainfall event that produces more than 0.1 inch of precipitation and that is separated from the previous storm event by at least 72 hours of dry weather.

Storm Water means runoff, snow melt runoff, and surface runoff and drainage related to precipitation events (pursuant to 40 CFR § 122.26(b)(13); 55 Fed. Reg. 47990, 47995 (Nov. 16, 1990)).

Storm Water Quality Design Volume or "SWQDV" means the runoff from either of the following, whichever is greater:

- A. The 85th percentile 24-hour runoff event as determined from the Los Angeles County 85th percentile precipitation isohyetal map; or
- B. The volume of runoff produced from a 0.75 inch, 24-hour rain event.

Stormwater runoff means that part of precipitation (rainfall or snowmelt) which travels via flow across a surface to the MS4 or receiving waters from impervious, semipervious or pervious surfaces.

Structural BMP means any structural facility designed and constructed to mitigate the adverse impacts of stormwater and urban runoff pollution (e.g. canopy, structural enclosure). Structural BMPs may include both treatment control BMPs and source control BMPs.

Treatment means the application of engineered systems that use physical, chemical, or biological processes to remove pollutants. Such processes include, but are not limited to: filtration, gravity settling, media adsorption, biodegradation, biological uptake, chemical oxidation and UV radiation.

Treatment control BMP means any engineered system designed to remove pollutants by simple gravity settling of particulate pollutants, filtration, biological uptake, media adsorption or any other physical, biological, or chemical process.

Urban runoff means surface water flow produced by nonstormwater resulting from residential, commercial, and industrial activities involving the use of potable and nonpotable water.

Waters of the State means any surface water or groundwater, including saline waters, within the boundaries of the State of California.

Waters of the United States or Waters of the U.S. shall be defined as follows:

a. All waters that are currently used, were used in the past, or may be susceptible to use in interstate or foreign commerce, including all waters which are subject to the ebb and flow of the tide;

b. All interstate waters, including interstate "wetlands";

c. All other waters such as intrastate lakes, rivers, streams (including intermittent streams), mudflats, sandflats, "wetlands," sloughs, prairie potholes, wet meadows, playa lakes, or natural ponds the use, degradation, or destruction that would affect or could affect interstate or foreign commerce including any such waters:

1. Which are or could be used by interstate or foreign travelers for recreational or other purposes;

2. From which fish or shellfish are or could be taken and sold in interstate or foreign commerce; or

3. Which are used or could be used for industrial purposes by industries in interstate commerce;

d. All impoundments of waters otherwise defined as waters of the United States under this definition;

e. Tributaries of waters identified in paragraphs (a) through (d) of this definition;

f. The territorial sea; and

g. "Wetlands" adjacent to waters (other than waters that are themselves wetlands) identified in paragraph (a) through (f) of this definition.

Waste treatment systems, including treatment ponds or lagoons designed to meet the requirements of CWA (other than cooling ponds as defined in 40 CFR section 423.22(m) that also meet the criteria of this definition) are not waters of the United States. This exclusion applies only to man-made bodies of water that neither were originally created in waters of the United States (such as disposal area in wetlands) nor resulted from the impoundment of waters of the United States. Waters of the United States do not include prior converted cropland. Notwithstanding the determination of an area's status as prior converted cropland by any other federal agency, for the purposes of the CWA, the final authority regarding CWA jurisdiction remains with USEPA.

Wet Season means the calendar period beginning October 1 through April 15.

Sec. 34-99. - Construction and application.

This article shall be construed to ensure consistency with the requirements of the Federal Clean Water Act and acts amendatory thereof or supplementary thereto, applicable implementing regulations, and the city NPDES permit and any amendment, revision or reissuance thereof.

(Code 1957, § 22A.73)

Sec. 34-100. - Prohibited activities.

(a) *Illicit discharges and connections.* It is prohibited to commence, establish, use, maintain, or continue any illicit connections to the city separate storm sewer system or any illicit discharges to the city separate storm sewer system. This prohibition against illicit connections applies to the use, maintenance, or continuation of any

illicit connection, whether that connection was established prior to or after the effective date of the ordinance from which this article derives.

- (b) Littering. It is prohibited to throw, deposit, place, leave, maintain, keep, or permit to be thrown, deposited, placed, left, or maintained or kept any refuse, rubbish, garbage, or any other discarded or abandoned objects, articles or accumulations in or upon any street, alley, sidewalk, storm drain, inlet, catchbasin conduit or drainage structure, business place, or upon any public or private plot of land in the city, so that such might be or become a pollutant. No person shall throw or deposit litter in any fountain, pond, lake, stream, or other body of water within the city. This subsection shall not apply to refuse, rubbish or garbage deposited in containers, bags or other appropriate receptacles which are placed in designated locations for regular solid waste pickup and disposal.
- (c) *Disposal of landscape debris.* It is prohibited to intentionally dispose of leaves, dirt, or other landscape debris into the city separate storm sewer system.
- (d) Nonstormwater discharges.
 - (1) Except as specified by this chapter, discharging any material other than storm water to the storm drain system is prohibited.
 - (2) The following non-stormwater discharges are exempt from the prohibition set forth in Section 34-100(d)(1):
 - a. Any discharge regulated under a NPDES permit issued to the discharger and administered by the State of California pursuant to Chapter 5.5, division 7 of the California Water Code under authority of the United States Environmental Protection Agency, provided that the discharger is in compliance with all requirements of the permit and other applicable laws and regulations.
 - b. Discharges from the following activities will not be considered a source of pollutants to waters of the United States when properly managed:
 - 1. Water line flushing and other discharges from potable water sources subject to a written agreement with the city;
 - 2. Landscape irrigation and lawn watering using potable water;
 - 3. Rising ground waters;

4. Uncontaminated ground water infiltration as defined by the MS4 Permit;

- 5. Water from crawl space pumps;
- 6. Air conditioning condensation;
- 7. Natural springs;
- 8. Non-commercial washing of vehicles by a non-profit organization, which has provided written notice to the city at least five (5) business days prior to the event, or by a resident at his or her

residence provided the non-profit organization or resident, as applicable:

- (a) Obtains a permit or written approval from the Director;
- (b) Implements BMPs and ensure discharge avoids potential sources of pollutants in the flow path to prevent introduction of pollutants prior to discharge to the MS4 or receiving water;
- (c) Minimizes the amount of water used by employing water conservation practices such as turning off nozzles and using a low volume pressure washer;
- (d) When possible, use biodegradable, phosphate free detergents and non-toxic cleaning products;
- (f) Where possible, wash cars on a permeable surface where wash water can percolate into the ground (e.g. gravel or grassy areas); and
- (g) Empty buckets of soapy or rinse water into the sanitary sewer system (e.g., sinks or toilets).
- 9. Flows from riparian habitats and wetlands;
- 10. Dechlorinated/ debrominated swimming pool and dewatering of decorative fountain discharges, provided:
 - (a) The discharger implements BMPs and ensure discharge avoids potential sources of pollutants in the flow path to prevent introduction of pollutants prior to discharge to the MS4 and receiving water;
 - (b) The discharge is dechlorinated or debrominated using holding time, aeration, and/or sodium thiosulfate. Chlorine residual in the discharge shall not exceed 0.1 mg/L;
 - (c) The discharge does not contain any detergents, wastes, or algaecides, or any other chemicals including salts from pools commonly referred to as "salt water pools" in excess of applicable water quality objectives;
 - (d) The discharge has a pH adjusted, if necessary, to be within the range of 6.5 and 8.5 standard units;
 - (e) The discharge is volumetrically and velocity controlled to promote evaporation and/or infiltration; and
 - (f) For discharges of 100,000 gallons or more, require the authorization of the Director and verification that the discharge pathway to the MS4 inlet is cleared of debris and mobilization of pollutants.
- 11. Flows from emergency firefighting activities;

- 12. Street/sidewalk wash water resulting from use of high pressure, low volume spray washing using only potable water with no cleaning agents at an average usage of 0.006 gallon per square feet of sidewalk area; and
- Waters not otherwise containing wastes as defined in California Water Code § 13050(d) and the California Health and Safety Code § 25117.
- (e) Discharges in violation of city NPDES permit. Any discharge that would result in or contribute to a violation of the city NPDES permit, either separately or in combination with other discharges, is prohibited. Liability for any such discharge shall be the responsibility of the person causing or responsible for the discharge, and such person shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the City from all losses, liabilities, claims, or causes of actions in any administrative or judicial action relating to such discharge.

(Code 1957, § 22A.74)

Sec. 34-101. - Exempted discharges, conditionally exempted discharges, or designated discharges.

Discharges from those activities specifically identified in or pursuant to Part III, Section A of the city NPDES permit as being exempted discharges, conditionally exempted discharges, or designated discharges shall not be considered a violation of this article, provided that any applicable best management practices developed pursuant to the city NPDES permit are implemented to minimize any adverse impacts from such identified sources.

(Code 1957, § 22A.75)

Sec. 34-102. - Good housekeeping practices.

Pursuant to this article, owners and occupants of property within the city shall comply with the following:

- (1) Septic waste. No person shall leave, deposit, discharge, dump, or otherwise expose any chemical or septic waste to precipitation in an area where a discharge to city streets or the MS4 may or does occur.
- (2) Use of water. Runoff of water used for irrigation purposes shall be minimized to the maximum extent practicable. Runoff of water from the permitted washing down of paved areas shall be minimized to the maximum extent practicable.
- (3) Storage of materials, machinery, and equipment. Machinery or equipment that is to be repaired or maintained in areas susceptible to or exposed to stormwater shall be placed in a manner so that leaks, spills and other maintenance-related pollutants are not discharged to the MS4.
- (4) Removal and disposal of debris from industrial/commercial motor vehicle parking lots. Industrial/commercial motor vehicle parking lots with more than 25 parking spaces that are located in areas potentially exposed to stormwater shall

be swept regularly or other equally effective measures shall be utilized to remove debris from such parking lots.

- (5) *Food wastes.* Food wastes generated by nonresidential food service and food distribution sources shall be properly disposed of and in a manner so such wastes are not discharged to the city separate storm sewer system.
- (6) Best management practices. Best management practices shall be used in areas exposed to stormwater for the removal and lawful disposal of all fuels, chemicals, fuel and chemical wastes, animal wastes, garbage, batteries, or other materials which have potential adverse impacts on water quality.

(Code 1957, § 22A.76)

Sec. 34-103. - Requirements for industrial/commercial and construction activities.

For the purposes of this article, each industrial discharger, discharger associated with construction activity, or other discharger described in any general stormwater permit addressing such discharges, as may be issued by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the State Water Resources Control Board, or the Regional Board shall comply with all requirements of such permit. Each discharger identified in an individual NPDES permit shall comply with and undertake all activities required by such permit. Proof of compliance with any such permit may be required in a form acceptable to the city engineer prior to the issuance of any grading, building or occupancy permits or any other type of permit or license issued by the city.

(Code 1957, § 22A.77)

Sec. 34-104. - Requirements for Planning Priority Projects.

- (a) Planning Priority Projects shall be designed to control pollutants, pollutant loads, and runoff volume to the maximum extent feasible by minimizing impervious surface area and controlling runoff from impervious surfaces through Infiltration, evapotranspiration, bioretention and/or rainfall harvest and use.
- (b) A new single-family hillside home development shall include mitigation measures to:
 - (1) Conserve natural areas;
 - (2) Protect slopes and channels;
 - (3) Provide storm drain system stenciling and signage;
 - (4) Divert roof runoff to vegetated areas before discharge unless the diversion would result in slope instability; and
 - (5) Direct surface flow to vegetated areas before discharge, unless the diversion would result in slope instability.
- (c) New street and road construction of 10,000 square feet or more of impervious surface shall follow USEPA guidance regarding Managing Wet Weather with Green Infrastructure: Green Streets (December 2008 EPA-833-F-08-009) to the maximum extent practicable.

- (d) Applicants for "Priority Planning Projects", except new single-family hillside home development and new street and road construction of 10,000 square feet or more of impervious surface, shall prepare a LID Plan to comply with the following:
 - (1) Retain stormwater runoff onsite for the SWQDV.
 - (2) Minimize hydromodification impacts to Natural Drainage Systems as defined in Order No. R4-2012-0175.
 - (3) If partial or complete onsite retention is technically infeasible, in accordance with section 9.20.110 below, the project site may biofiltrate 1.5 times the portion of the remaining SWQDV that is not reliably retained onsite. Biofiltration BMPs must adhere to the design specifications provided in Order No. R4-2012-0175.
 - (4) The remaining SWQDV that cannot be retained or biofiltered onsite must be treated onsite to reduce pollutant loading. BMPs must be selected and designed to meet Pollutant-specific benchmarks as required per Order No. R4-2012-0175. Flow-through BMPs may be used to treat the remaining SWQDV and must be sized based on a rainfall intensity of:
 - a. 0.2 inches per hour; or
 - b. The one (1) year, one (1) hour rainfall intensity as determined from the most recent Los Angeles County isohyetal map, whichever is greater.
- (e) In addition to the requirements set forth in Sec. 34-104.(d), Redevelopment Projects shall also comply with the following:
 - (1) Where Redevelopment results in an alteration to more than fifty percent of impervious surfaces of a previously existing development, and the existing development was not subject to post-construction stormwater quality control requirements, the entire Project must be mitigated.
 - (2) Where Redevelopment results in an alteration of less than fifty percent of impervious surfaces of a previously existing development, and the existing development was not subject to post-construction stormwater quality control requirements, only the alteration must be mitigated, and not the entire development.
 - (3) Existing single-family dwelling and accessory structures are exempt from the Redevelopment requirements unless such Projects create, add, or replace 10,000 square feet of impervious surface area.

Sec. 34-104.1. Submittal and Review of Low Impact Development Plans.

- (a) Prior to issuance of a building permit or a grading permit by the city, LID plans shall be submitted by the property owner or his or her agent to the Director for all "Priority Planning Projects", except as provided in Sec. 34-104.3. below.
- (b) LID plans shall be submitted in accordance with the Article X, Green Building Code, a copy of which shall be located in the office of the city clerk.

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(c) The Director, or his or her designee, shall review and approve LID plans to assure that the applicant has identified the BMPs that are necessary and feasible to protect the MS4. The reviewer shall identify any deficiencies in the plan and return it to the applicant for modification, if necessary. When the plan is found to comply with the provisions of this chapter, and after compliance with the requirements of section 34-104.2. below, the grading or building permits may be issued for the project. If, during construction, the plan is found to be deficient by the city or any other interested party or responsible agency with authorization/oversight, the applicant shall amend the plan to address the deficiency.

Sec. 34-104.2. Recording of LID plans.

Upon acceptance of an LID plan by the city, and prior to the city issuing the grading and/or building permit, the applicant shall file a signed original of the plan with the Los Angeles County recorder. The document shall contain sufficient legal description to identify the property covered and shall be binding on the applicant and all successors in interest to the property. The form shall be provided by the City and shall only be amended or removed from title with the consent of the City.

Sec. 34-104.3. Waiver of LID plan due to technical infeasibility.

- (a) The Director may waive the requirement of an LID Plan if he or she can determine, in writing, the technical infeasibility of the Project, as set forth in section 34-104.3(b), below.
- (b) To demonstrate technical infeasibility, the Project applicant shall demonstrate that the Project cannot reliably retain 100 percent of the SWQDV onsite, even with the maximum application of "Green Roofs" and rainwater harvest and use, and that compliance with the applicable post-construction requirements would be technically infeasible by submitting a site-specific hydrologic and/or design analysis conducted and endorsed by a registered professional engineer, geologist, architect, and/or landscape architect.
- (c) Technical infeasibility may result from conditions including the following:
 - (1) The infiltration rate of saturated in-situ soils is less than 0.3 inch per hour and it is not technically feasible to amend the in-situ soils to attain an Infiltration rate necessary to achieve reliable performance of infiltration or bioretention BMPs in retaining the SWQDV onsite.

(2) Locations where seasonal high groundwater is within five to ten feet of surface grade;

- (3) Locations within 100 feet of a groundwater well used for drinking water;
- (4) Brownfield development sites or other locations where pollutant mobilization is a documented concern;
- (5) Locations with potential geotechnical hazards;
- (6) Smart growth and infill or Redevelopment locations where the density and/ or nature of the Project would create significant difficulty for compliance with the onsite volume retention requirement.

Sec. 34-104.4. Maintenance of structural BMP's.

Structural BMPs required by the city, County of Los Angeles, or State or Federal agency shall be properly operated and maintained, consistent with the approved SUSMP or as specified by an approved plan or program, or otherwise determined by the Director. Records and documentation of such maintenance shall be provided to the Director upon reasonable request.

Sec. 34-104.5. Inspections.

- (a) The Director may, upon seventy-two (72) hour written notice, unless exigent circumstances justify a shorter time period, enter upon and inspect any private premises for the purposes of verifying compliance with the terms and conditions of this chapter. Such inspection may include, but is not limited to:
 - (1) Identifying products produced, processes conducted, chemicals and materials used, stored or maintained on the subject premises;
 - (2) Identifying points of discharge of all wastewater, non-stormwater, processed water systems and pollutants;
 - (3) Investigating the natural slope of the premises, including drainage patterns and man-made conveyance systems;
 - (4) Establishing location of all points of discharge from the premises, whether by surface runoff or through a storm drain system;
 - (5) Locating any illicit connection or illicit discharge;
 - (6) Investigating and inspecting a vehicle, truck, trailer, tank or other mobile equipment;
 - (7) A review and inspection of all records of the owner or occupant of public or private property relating to chemicals or processes presently or previously stored or occurring on the property, including material and/or chemical inventories, facilities maps or schematics and diagrams, material safety data sheets, hazardous waste manifests, business plans, pollution prevention plans, state general permits, stormwater pollution prevention plans, and any and all records relating to illicit connections, illicit discharges, or any other source of contribution or potential contribution of pollutants to the storm drain system;
 - (8) Inspecting, sampling and testing any area runoff, soils area (including groundwater testing), process discharge, materials with any waste storage area (including any container contents), and/or treatment system discharges for the purpose of determining the potential for contribution of pollutants to the storm drain system;
 - (9) Inspecting the integrity the MS4, any connection to other pipelines on the property, including the use dye and smoke tests, video surveys, photographs or videotapes, and the taking of measurements, drawings or any other records reasonably necessary to document conditions as they exist on the premises;

- (10) The installation and maintenance of monitoring devices for the purpose of measuring any discharge or potential source of discharge to the storm drain system;
- (11)Evaluating compliance with this chapter or the Federal Clean Water Act.
- (b) The Director may enter upon and inspect any private premises for the purposes of verifying compliance with the terms and conditions of this chapter by any other lawful means including, but not limited to obtaining an inspection warrant issued by a court.

Sec. 34-104.6. Fees.

Fees to be charged for LID plan checking, inspection, enforcement, and other activities carried out by the city under this chapter shall be adopted by resolution of the city council.

Sec. 34-104.7. California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) compliance.

Provisions of this section shall be complimentary to, and shall not replace, any applicable requirements for stormwater mitigation required under CEQA.

Sec. 34-105. - Enforcement.

- (a) *Penalties.* Violation of this article shall be punishable as provided in section 1-10 of this city code. Each day that a violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.
- (b) *Concealment.* Causing, permitting, aiding, abetting, or concealing a violation of any section of this article shall constitute a violation of such section.
- (c) *Violations deemed public nuisance.* The following violations shall be deemed a public nuisance:
 - (1) Any condition caused or permitted to exist in violation of:
 - a. Any of the provisions of this chapter; or
 - b. Any failure to comply with any applicable requirement of an approved SUSMP, LID Plan, or stormwater mitigation plan or program with respect to a property; or
 - c. Any false certification or verification, or any failure to comply with a certification or verification provided by a project applicant or the applicant's successor in interest; or
 - d. Any failure to properly operate and maintain any structural or treatment control BMP on a property in accordance with an approved SUSMP, LID Plan, or stormwater mitigation plan or program, is hereby determined to be a threat to the public health, safety and welfare, is declared and deemed a public nuisance, and may be abated or restored by any authorized enforcement officer in accordance with the procedures set forth in section

106-1081 et seq. of this city code, and a civil or criminal action to abate, enjoin or otherwise compel the cessation of such nuisance may be brought by the city attorney.

- (2) The cost of such abatement and restoration shall be borne by the owner of the property, and the cost thereof shall be invoiced to the owner of the property, as provided by law or ordinance for the recovery of nuisance abatement costs.
- (3) If any violation of this article constitutes a seasonal and recurrent nuisance, the Director, or his or her designee, shall so declare. The failure of any person to take appropriate annual precautions to prevent stormwater pollution after written notice of a determination under this subsection shall constitute a public nuisance and a violation of this article.
- (d) *Civil actions.* In addition to any other remedies provided in this section, any violation of this article may be enforced by civil action brought by the city. In any such action, the city may seek, as appropriate, any or all of the following remedies:
 - (1) A temporary and/or permanent injunction.
 - (2) Assessment of the violator for the costs of any investigation, inspection, or monitoring survey which led to the establishment of the violation, and for the reasonable costs of preparing and bringing legal action under this subsection.
 - (3) Costs incurred in removing, correcting, or terminating the adverse effects resulting from violation.
 - (4) Compensatory damages for loss or destruction to water quality, wildlife, fish and aquatic life.
- (e) Administrative enforcement powers. In addition to the other enforcement powers and remedies established by this city code, any authorized enforcement officer has the authority to utilize the following administrative remedies:
 - (1) Cease and desist orders. When an authorized enforcement officer finds that a discharge has taken place or is likely to take place in violation of this article, the officer may issue an order to cease and desist such discharge or practice or operation likely to cause such discharge and direct that those persons not complying shall:
 - a. Comply with the requirement;
 - b. Comply with a time schedule for compliance; and
 - c. Take appropriate remedial or preventive action to prevent the violation from recurring.
 - (2) Notice to clean. Whenever an authorized enforcement officer finds any oil, earth, debris, grass, weeds, dead trees, tin cans, rubbish, refuse, waste or any other material of any kind in or upon the sidewalk abutting or adjoining any parcel of land or upon any parcel of land or grounds, which may result in pollutants entering the city separate storm sewer system or a nonstormwater discharge to the MS4, the officer may give notice to the owner or occupant of the adjacent property to remove such oil, earth, debris, grass, weeds, dead

trees, tin cans, rubbish, refuse, waste or other material, in any manner that the officer may reasonably provide. The recipient of such notice shall undertake the activities as described in the notice.

- (f) Permit revocation. To the extent the city makes a section of this article or any identified best management practice a condition of approval to the issuance of a permit or license, any person in violation of such condition is subject to the permit revocation procedures set forth in this city code.
- (g) *Remedies.* Remedies under this article are in addition to and do not supersede or limit any and all other remedies, civil or criminal. The remedies provided for in this section shall be cumulative and not exclusive.

Sec. 34-106. - Taking of property.

The sections of this article shall not be construed or operate to deprive any property owner of substantially all of the market value of such owner's property or otherwise constitute an unconstitutional taking without compensation.

Sec. 34-107. - Article controls over other provisions.

To the extent any section of this article conflicts with any provision of division 3 of article Il of chapter 94, the sections of this article shall control.

(Code 1957, § 22A.80)

Section 2. Severability. If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase in this ordinance or any part thereof is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid or ineffective by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity or effectiveness of the remaining portions of this ordinance or any part thereof. The City Council hereby declares that is would have passed each section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more subsections, subdivisions, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases be declared unconstitutional, or invalid, or ineffective.

The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this Ordinance and shall Section 3. cause this Ordinance to be published or posted as required by law.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council provide staff with direction related to allowing the use of the City Seal in advertising material for a LGBTQ Awareness Event proposed to be held in the City of San Fernando.

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS:

RESOLUTION NO. 6904

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO, AMENDING THE STANDARD MANAGEMENT PROCEDURE REGARDING USE OF CITY SEAL

WHEREAS, the City Council adopted a standard management procedure for the use of the City seal on August 3, 1987.

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to revise the procedure to limit the use of the City seal, as provided in this resolution.

WHEREAS, it shall be City policy that the City seal, as described in Municipal Code Section 1-13, shall only be used as provided in this policy. The purpose of this policy is to:

A. Ensure that the City seal is not used for inappropriate events and affairs.

B. Control use of the City seal so as to prevent unauthorized use, which could imply City participation, support, or sponsorship in commercial, political, or non-City events.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO HEREBY FINDS AND RESOLVES:

The City has designated an official seal, which serves to identify City involvement in some manner. Typically, the seal is used on City stationary, City vehicles, brochures and other information. It is important that some guidelines be followed so that the seal be used in an appropriate manner. Therefore, the following guidelines shall be followed pertaining to the City seal:

- 1. The City seal may be used on all City related literature, material, vehicles, etc., and for City sponsored or co-sponsored functions and events.
- 2. The City seal may be used on t-shirts, hats, calendars and other like material when sponsored by the City upon approval of the City Administrator.
- 3. The City seal may not be used by organizations other than the City without prior approval of a majority of the City Council.
- 4. The City seal may not be used for political or commercial purposes.
- 5. In cases where it is unclear whether a proposed use of the seal is appropriate, three members of the City Council must approve the use as a scheduled item on a City Council agenda.

SANITARY SEWER MANAGEMENT PLAN OVERVIEW

Summary

In accordance with State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) Order No. 2006-0003, public agencies are required to develop and implement a Sanitary Sewer System Management Plan (SSMP). The mandate includes the requirement to properly manage, operate, and maintain all parts of the City's local sanitary sewer system, including the mitigation of any potential sewer overflows. The mandate also consists of General Waste Discharge Requirements (WDRs), which prohibit the discharge of untreated wastewater that may reach waters of the United States or cause a public nuisance. The WDRs require that the SSMP address 11 separate categories involved with managing and operating the sewer system. These issues are identified in the SSMP.

In order to certify the City's SSMP, the City Council reviewed and approved the document in order to ensure that it meets all of the WDR requirements. In addition, the SSMP must be reviewed and recertified every five years to maintain compliance with state programs.

Sewer System Management Plan Details

City Sewer System

- The City of San Fernando's local sewer system provides wastewater collection service to a population of approximately 25,000, as well as numerous commercial and industrial customers.
- The sanitary sewer system consists of approximately 43 miles of gravity sewer mains, which most ranging in sizes from 6-inches to 12-inches in diameter.
- The City's collection system discharges to the City of Los Angeles trunk sewers. The City of San Fernando's sewer system is operated and maintained by the Public Works Department.

State Mandate to Develop Sewer Management Plan

On May 2006, the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) adopted Order No. 2006-0003, establishing General Waste Discharge Requirements (WDR) for sanitary sewer systems. This order is required for all public agencies that own or operate a sanitary sewer system comprised of more than one mile of sewer lines which convey untreated wastewater to a publicly owned treatment facility. The mandate further requires public agencies to electronically report all sanitary sewer overflows (SSOs) such as spills, releases, discharges, or diversions of untreated or partially treated wastewater from a sanitary sewer system to the State Board's database. Noncompliance with the mandate could subject the City to penalties and potential fines. The goal for SSO reduction is to decrease the risk to human health and the environment. The WDR required the City Council to approve the SSMP at a public meeting, which was completed in April 2014. Thereafter, the SSMP must be updated every five (5) years, and certified by the City's authorized representative upon completion.

CITY OF SAN FERNANDO SANITARY SEWER MANAGEMENT PLAN OVERVIEW

The mandatory elements of the SSMP include the following categories:

1. Goals

To provide a plan and schedule to properly manage, operate, and maintain all parts of the sanitary sewer system. This will help reduce and prevent sanitary sewer overflows (SSOs), as well as mitigate any SSOs that do occur.

2. Organization

To identify the name of the responsible representative, the names and telephone numbers for positions responsible with implementing specific measures in the SSMP program, and to establish the chain of communication for reporting SSOs.

3. Legal Authority

To demonstrate, through sanitary sewer system use ordinance, services agreements, or other legally binding procedures that an agency possesses the legal authority to prevent illicit discharges in the sewer system; require that sewers and connections be properly designed and built; ensure access for maintenance, inspection and repairs; limit the discharge of debris that cause blockages; and enforce any violation of sewer ordinances.

4. Operations and Maintenance

To maintain sewer system maps; describe routine preventative maintenance activities; develop a rehabilitation and replacement plan for the sewer system; provide staff training for responsible personnel; and provide equipment and replacement parts for the system.

- 5. Design and Performance Provisions To establish design and construction standards and specifications for the installation of new sanitary sewer systems.
- Overflow Emergency Response Plan To develop and implement an overflow emergency response plan that identifies measures to protect public health and the environment.
- Fats, Oils and Greases (FOG) Control Plan To implement a FOG source control program to minimize the amount of these substances discharged to the sanitary sewer system.
- System Evaluation and Capacity Assurance Plan To prepare and implement a capital improvement program that will provide hydraulic capacity of key sanitary sewer system elements for dry and wet flow conditions.
- Monitoring, Measurement, and Program Modifications
 To maintain and monitor information that can be used to establish and prioritize
 SSMP activities.

10. Program Audits

To conduct periodic internal audits that evaluate the effectiveness of the SSMP and compliance with requirements listed in the SSMP.

11. Communication Program

To communicate on a regular basis with the public on the development, implementation, and performance of the SSMP.

Sewer System Evaluation and Future Planning

The City's SSMP helped to establish a baseline of the sewer system's existing condition. In doing so, several key initiatives were accomplished, including:

- Meeting State requirements for sewer system evaluation, regular operational activities, and ongoing reporting of system performance;
- Updating sewer maps that will allow the City to complete necessary hydraulic model assessments of the sewer system;
- Identifying system capacity deficiencies and recommending ideas for needed improvements; and
- Updating sewer system information into a geographic information system (GIS) program whereby sewer information can be readily obtained and evaluated using mapping programs.

Altogether, the SSMP identified approximately \$10.7 million in needed maintenance and replacement costs. These items will not occur immediately due to budget constraints, however, the City has initiated a phased multi-year improvement plan to address sewer items. During the Fiscal Year 2015-16 budget, the following items are planned:

- Inspection: \$300,000
 Closed Captioned Television Inspection, Root Clearing of Entire Sewer System.
- Maintenance Repairs: \$250,000

Point Repairs (i.e. sewer pipe lining, replacement) to alleviate maintenance problems at locations where maintenance problems exist or that have hydraulic deficiencies; Perform inflow/infiltration analysis to determine areas that need additional repairs to limit water infiltration into the sewer system.

- <u>System Design: \$250,000</u> Development of hydraulic models and design plans to meet capacity deficiencies and accommodate future growth.
- <u>Sewer Replacement: Cost TBD (Depending on Design Results)</u> Replacement of deteriorated sewer pipes in conjunction with street resurfacing projects and in locations to address hydraulic deficiencies.
