Reopening Protocol for Community Gardens

Recent updates

6/30/2020: Clusters of positive cases (defined 3 or more cases in 14 days) must be reported to the Department of Public Health

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health) is calling on the public, all business owners and community organizations to support the reopening of businesses and public spaces. Through our collective Safer at Home efforts, we have successfully slowed the number of new COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations, allowing for a phased reopening of many aspects of regular life.

To aid in this transition, Public Health asks all community gardens operators to take appropriate steps to plan for reopening, in alignment with the Recovery Plan. The following issues are critical and must be addressed to ensure that workers and players reduce the risk of spread at community gardens:

- (1) Protecting and supporting employee and customer health
- (2) Ensuring appropriate physical distancing
- (3) Ensuring proper infection control
- (4) Communicating with the public
- (5) Ensuring equitable access to services

These critical areas have been incorporated into the checklist below and must be implemented as required community garden reopening protocols.

All Community Gardens must implement all applicable measures listed below and be prepared to explain why any measure that is not implemented is not applicable.

		Face coverings are required at all times.				
		Physical distancing of six (6) feet is required at all times.				
		Volunteer events, other events, and classes are not allowed.				
		Group gatherings are not allowed.				
		The number of participants in the garden at one time shall not cause any crowding and shall maintain 6 feet of distance between participants.				
		Participants bring hand sanitizer or sanitizing wipes, or a Ziplock bag with soapy water and a washcloth and wash hands before and after going to the garden.				
		Gloves are required while conducting gardening, including while handling tools and equipment.

	are of at all t Emplo	reployees who have contact with the public or other employees during their shift (s) fered, at no cost, a cloth face covering. The covering is to be worn by the employee times during the workday when in contact or likely to come into contact with others. By ees need not wear a cloth face covering when the employee is alone in a private or a walled cubicle.						
	Emplo	byees are instructed to wash their face coverings daily.						
	Emplo	byees have been reminded to adhere to personal prevention actions including:						
		Stay home when you are sick. Stay home for at least 3 days (72 hours) after recovery, which means your fever has resolved without the use of fever-reducing medications and there is improvement in your respiratory symptoms (e.g., cough, shortness of breath), AND at least 10 days have passed since your symptoms first appeared.						
		Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, use alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Wash your hands before meals, after using the restroom and after coughing and sneezing.						
		Cover your coughs and sneezes with a tissue, and then dispose of the tissue and clean your hands immediately. If you do not have a tissue, use your elbow (not						

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		your hands).
		☐ Do not touch your mouth, eyes, nose with unwashed hands.
		□ Avoid contact with people who are sick.
		 Avoid sharing items such as phones or other devices. If devices must be shared be sure to wipe them down with a disinfectant wipe before and after sharing.
		Constantly observe your work distances in relation to other staff. Always maintain the recommended minimum 6 feet separation from others unless specific work assignments require less distancing and wear a face cloth covering when working near or with others.
		 Disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces such as workstations, keyboards, telephones, handrails, machines, shared devices, and doorknobs. This should be done hourly during business hours.
		Copies of this Protocol have been distributed to all employees.
	В.	MAINTENANCE PROTOCOLS
		Group gatherings are prohibited, and benches and tables are removed or condoned off because they can't be used
		Commonly used items are sanitized regularly.
		Commonly used equipment is sanitized before and after each use.
		Participants bring their own tools as much as possible to avoid using community tools.
		Water fountains are available to fill water bottles only.
	C.	MONITORING PROTOCOLS
		Instructional and informational signage must be posted throughout the facility regarding infection control, physical distancing, and the use of face coverings.
		Facility Operator will conduct periodic visits daily to monitor that gardeners are complying with the restrictions.
		Gardeners will be asked to leave if not complying with these restrictions.
