4) CONSIDERATION TO ADOPT A RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE FILING A GRANT APPLICATION WITH THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY REGIONAL PARK AND OPEN SPACE DISTRICT FOR MEASURE A FUNDING

City Manager Kimball responded to Councilmember questions.

Motion by Councilmember Rodriguez, seconded by Councilmember Ballin, as amended to direct staff on future grant project applications, to bring the scope of work/project to the Parks, Wellness and Recreation Commission or the City Council for consideration prior to filing the application; adopted Resolution No. 8125 authorizing the filing of a grant application to Los Angeles County Regional Park and Open Space District for Measure A funding for Projects and Programs; authorize the City Manager to accept any grant funds from ROPSD, upon award; authorize the City Manager or designee to execute all related grant documents required for receiving such grant funds pursuant to the terms and conditions of the grant; and upon full execution of all grant-related documents, authorize the City Manager to amend the revenue and expenditure budgets to appropriate the grant funds. City Manager Kimball provided an update on the small business grant program and information regarding recent changes to masking requirements. The City Council received and filed the report.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTS

8) CONSIDERATION AND DISCUSSION REGARDING A DRAFT SMOKE-FREE MULTI-UNIT HOUSING ORDINANCE

Director of Community Development Kanika Kith presented the staff report and responded to Councilmember questions.

By consensus, the City Council directed staff to bring back a proposed ordinance to a meeting in April 2022, to include the following recommendations:

- a. Existing Multi-family units that share walls, (phasing in) no smoking inside units, potentially allow designated outside smoking areas (phasing out over 3-5 years);
- b. Existing Single family detached units, only allow smoking inside unit, no smoking outside;
- c. New Single-family units prohibit smoking inside and outside;
- d. New Multi-family units potentially allow 180 day phase in educational period; and
- e. Enforcement responsibilities: Landlords will be responsible for tenant education materials.

It was noted that Vice Mayor Pacheco joined the meeting at 7:41 p.m.

9) CONSIDERATION AND DISCUSSION TO ADOPT A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE SAFE AND ACTIVE STREETS IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

Assistant to the City Manager Carlos Hernandez presented the staff report and responded to Councilmember questions.

Motion by Councilmember Ballin, seconded by Councilmember Rodriguez to adopt Resolution No. 8128 approving the Safe and Active Streets Implementation Plan. Motion carries unanimously.

City Council recessed at 8:30 p.m. and reconvened at 8:43 p.m. with Vice Mayor Pacheco re-joining the meeting at 8:48 p.m.

Director of Public Works Baumgardner reported on February 24, he was appointed to the Upper Los Angeles Rivers Tributaries Working Group.

Interim/Acting Director of Finance Garcia reported that the City received a grant to use towards applying credits to assist utility customers with water arrearage.

City Manager Kimball provided updates regarding the City's Ad hoc committee activities and spoke about the recent City Council Strategic Goals retreat meeting and that he is awaiting on a final report of the retreat meeting from the consultant, and mentioned that the discussion on the proposed parking lot 3 development will be presented at the March 21 meeting.

GENERAL CITY COUNCIL/BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS AND LIAISON UPDATES

Councilmember Rodriguez recognized staffs work and efforts to maintain a strong community engagement, and suggested that staff take public announcements on City events and activities as an opportunity to further engage residents of the community.

Councilmember Montañez spoke about the City Council Strategic Goals retreat meeting and acknowledged staffs work.

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Councilmember Ballin inquired on the process of selecting grant recipients receiving assistance with utility bill arrearages, attended the Kidney Quest Foundation's 2022 Kidney Disease Impact Conference.

Vice Mayor Pacheco express thanks to staff and colleagues and spoke about the City Council Strategic Goals retreat meeting.

Mayor Mendoza reported she participated in meetings with the Los Angeles County Sustainable round table and the League of California Cities monthly meeting.

Housing Element Annual Progress Report for Calendar Year 2021

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Receive and file the General Plan Housing Element Annual Progress Report for Calendar Year 2021; and
- b. Authorize staff to submit the Housing Element Annual Progress Report to the California Department of Housing and Community Development and the Governor's Office of Planning and Research.

BACKGROUND:

- Since 1969, the State has required all cities and counties in California to adopt a Housing Element to adequately plan to accommodate each jurisdiction's fair share of housing needs in California. The Housing Element is a chapter of the General Plan that serves as each jurisdiction's blueprint for how it plans to grow and develop during a particular "planning cycle."
- 2. The City of San Fernando is one of 197 local jurisdictions within the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG). SCAG is responsible for assigning the Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) allocation in Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, Imperial, and Ventura counties. State law requires that the Housing Element be updated every eight years, including policies and programs to meet existing and future housing needs for the City, as established by the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) and SCAG.
- 3. On January 21, 2014, the City adopted Housing Element 2014-2021 (5th Cycle) that established the City's strategy for meeting community housing needs for RHNA housing planning period 2014-2021.

- 4. On March 18, 2014, HCD certified Housing Element 2014-2021 for compliance with State housing law.
- 5. On January 1, 2018 as a result of California Senate Bill 35 (SB 35), streamlining provisions went into effect for cities that were not meeting their goals for construction of certain regional housing needs. SB 35 amended Government Code Section 65913.4 to require local jurisdictions to streamline the approval of certain housing projects by providing a ministerial approval process and removing the requirements for California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) analysis.
- 6. On March 14, 2022, the Housing Element Annual Progress Report identifying housing development in calendar year 2021 the final year of the 5th Cycle was presented to the Planning and Preservation Commission as an informational item.

ANALYSIS:

The Housing Element Annual Progress Report provides the status and progress of each jurisdiction's implementation of its housing element on an annual basis. Government Code Section 65400 establishes the requirement that each jurisdiction prepare an annual report on the status of its Housing Element for the prior calendar year, and the actions taken towards completion of the programs and status of the jurisdiction's compliance with the deadlines in its Housing Element. Each jurisdiction is required to submit an Annual Progress Report to HCD and the Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR) no later than April 1 of each year, reporting data for the prior calendar year.

The 2021 Annual Progress Report (Attachment "A") reflects the City's progress during the final year of the 5th Cycle Housing Element, RHNA planning period from January 1, 2014 to October 15, 2021. Since 2021 was the last year in the planning period, the 2021 Annual Progress Report does not cover the entire calendar year like the previous years (2015 to 2020). Therefore, the number of housing units presented in the Annual Progress Report is less than the prior years because it only covers data from January 1, 2021 to October 15, 2021.

In 2021, the City received 106 planning applications for new housing units. As shown in Table 1 below, the City approved 108 new housing units (including two applications from the prior year), issued 45 building permits, and issued 16 certificates of occupancy¹. Since the 5th Cycle ended on October 15, 2021, only 33 out of 45 building permit issued are counted for 2021. The remaining 12 building permit issued will be counted for the next RHNA cycle (6th Cycle).

¹ A certificate of occupancy is issued when a new unit completes construction and passes final inspection by the City.

As presented in Table 2 below, the City was allocated a total RHNA of 217 units for the 5th Cycle planning period. During planning period, the City issued a total of 401 residential building permits. However, under Senate Bill 35 (SB 35) cities must meet the proportionate share of the RHNA for each of the four income levels (very low, low, moderate, and above moderate). The City exceeded the low and moderate income levels, but fell short in the very low and above moderate income level categories.

The City will need to maintain zoning that makes sites available for a mix of single-family, multifamily and mixed-use housing, supported by a variety of programs to enhance affordability, to accommodate remaining RHNA targets. The City continues to actively implement the policies of the General Plan including the goals, policies and programs of the Housing Element. Furthermore, both the adoption of the San Fernando Corridors Specific Plan (SP-5) in December 2017, and the recent state legislation mandating jurisdictions to allow for Junior ADU's (JADU)², will continue to foster housing and address the "Very-Low Income Housing" RHNA allocation target.

Moving forward, HCD has set an ambitious housing production goal for the upcoming 6th Cycle by both HCD and SCAG. These goals represent a 325 percent increase in the SCAG region, and an increase of 827 percent locally for the City. On October 26, 2020, staff submitted an appeal request to SCAG seeking a reduction in its allocation. Staff cited local planning factors, changed circumstances and a disproportionate allocation compared to the rest of the region. Ultimately, the City's appeal was denied and the City was provided a final allocation of 1,795 units.

The Housing Element for the 6th Cycle is being revised to address comments from HCD. Staff anticipates presenting a revised Housing Element to the Planning and Preservation Commission for recommendation to the City Council in April 2022, then for City Council adoption in May 2022 or June 2022. This timeline depends on the coordination with HCD.

² A Junior ADU allows for a portion of an existing primary dwelling to be converted to an additional dwelling unit, up to a maximum of 500 square feet.

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BUDGET IMPACT:

Preparation of the Housing Element Annual Progress Report is included in the annual work program for the Community Development Department. Therefore, funding for the effort is included in the Fiscal Year 2021-2022 Adopted Budget.

CONCLUSION:

Staff recommends that the City Council (1) receive and file the Housing Element Annual Progress Report for Calendar Year 2021; and (2) authorize staff to submit the Housing Element Annual Progress Report to HCD and OPR.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Approve the Co-Sponsorship of the Valley Economic Alliance (VEA) Housing Crisis Awareness Campaign;
- b. Approve the use of the City seal on the print material and social media pursuant to City Council Resolution No. 6904; and
- c. Authorize the participation in, and use of the City seal for, the VEA Housing Crisis Awareness Campaign, with City Manager approval.

BACKGROUND:

- 1. In spring 2021, VEA's Livable and Sustainable Communities Committee organized a marketing campaign to raise awareness of housing shortage, the needs for more housing in the San Fernando Valley region, and how residents can play an important role by voicing support for the development workforce housing.
- 2. In summer 2021, VEA partnered with the Southland Regional Association of Realtors, who conducted a phone survey of residents to ascertain public opinion about the region's housing needs. Results from the survey indicated that many respondents were aware of the rising cost of housing, but not aware that increasing the supply of housing could help.
- 3. In fall 2021, VEA launched the "Housing Crisis Awareness Campaign" that included paid and social media posts, emails, media outreach, and newspaper advertising.
- 4. In early 2022, VEA reached out to the City Manager to invite the City to become a partner in the campaign by sharing social media messaging and installing street banners along major

transportation corridors to strengthen the reach of the campaign in the City and demonstrate the City's leadership in addressing the need for housing.

ANALYSIS:

The Valley Economic Alliance (VEA) is a non-profit strategic private-public organization consisting of businesses, government, education, and community organizations in the San Fernando Valley. Since its establishment in 1995, the VEA has worked to advance its mission through four initiative areas: Economic Development, Education and Workforce Development, Livable and Sustainable Communities, and Marketing the Valley. The City of San Fernando is one of five member cities (Burbank, Calabasas, Glendale, Los Angeles, and San Fernando) of the VEA.

The committee for Livable and Sustainable Communities organized and launched a "Housing Crisis Awareness Campaign" in 2021. The purpose of the campaign is to raise awareness of housing shortage and the needs for more affordable housing in San Fernando Valley area. The campaign promotes the following seven reasons to support more housing:

- 1. Housing Creates Healthier Communities.
- 2. Housing Can Increase Property Values.
- 3. Housing Creates a Better Start for Kids.
- 4. Housing Creates Jobs.
- 5. Housing Reduces Traffic Congestion and Creates a Cleaner Environment.
- 6. Housing Creates More Equitable Neighborhoods.
- 7. Housing Keeps Teachers and Public Safety Officers Close to Our Neighborhoods.

This campaign supports one of the goals of the State Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) and the City's Housing Element for promoting an awareness for the needs of more affordable housing units in the City. This campaign is one pathway to inform the community of the benefits of having affordable housings in their communities, such as helping teachers and public safety officers stay close to their jobs, creating more equitable neighborhoods, and other benefits. Collaboration with the VEA on this campaign is favorable to HCD as it shows that the City is supporting affordable housing.

The co-sponsorship request includes the City co-branding with the VEA on street banners in the City and promoting the campaign in City's social media (see Attachment "A" for sample social media materials). The City would be acknowledged on campaign materials including, but not limited to, placing the City seal on the street banners themselves. Banners will be printed at a local printer in the City and will be displayed on street poles and bus stops along San Fernando Blvd., Truman St., and Maclay Ave. Other sponsors include the Southern California Association of Realtors, TheZoo360 (provided campaign logo and banner design services), and Union Bank. Additional details about the campaign can be found in a Presentation prepared by the VEA

(Attachment "B") and at www.TheValley.net/Housing. A full list of recognition and benefits will be provided upon request.

BUDGET IMPACT:

There is no cost associated with co-sponsoring the campaign. The cost of printing and displaying the banners are included in the Community Development Department and Public Works Department Fiscal Year 2021-2022 budget. Staff anticipates printing 10 banners to display on street poles and no more than 10 to display at bus stops. The cost for printing the banners will be approximately \$800, which can be funded from the advertising account (Account No. 001-150-0000-4230) of the Community Development Department as part of the City's efforts to promote housing through the City's Housing Element.

CONCLUSION:

Staff is requesting that the City Council (1) approve the co-sponsorship of the VEA Housing Crisis Awareness Campaign; (2) approve the use of the City seal on the print material and social media; and (3) authorize the participation in, and use of the City seal for, the VEA Housing Crisis Awareness Campaign, with City Manager approval.



 WHEREAS THE CURRENT RATE IS 16-20K/YR)

Every city in California is required periodically to update its "housing element" plan. The Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) has determined that the City of LA needs to build 455,000 new units in the next eight years to meet the demand. SCAG has also deermined that the County of LA needs to build more than 800,000 units throughout the County's 88 cities and unincorporated areas by 2029.

WHY THE BACKLOG?

The slow rate of housing development is attributable in large part to reasons such as:

Scarcity of land * High cost of labor * CEQA and other regulatory compliance * Complex financing * Focus on single-family housing * NIMBYs

Many local residents are unaware of the need for additional housing and how it can relieve upward pressure on home prices. Unfortunately, the "NIMBY' ("not in my backyard") residents often oppose housing development, perhaps not realizing that this can impede the development of workforce housing for teachers, supportive housing for the homeless, transit-oriented condos and apartments, and more.







RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Authorize a Purchase Order in an amount not to exceed \$114,136.89, with Downtown Ford Sales, for the purchase of a 2023 Ford F650 Regular Cab Dump Truck with gasoline engine under the State of California Cooperative Purchasing Contract 1-18-23-10A; and
- b. Adopt Resolution No. 8131 (Attachment "A") to transfer and appropriate \$125,000 into the Equipment/Vehicle Maintenance and Replacement Fund to pay for the purchase of a 2023 Ford F650 Regular Cab Dump Truck from Downtown Ford Sales; and
- c. Authorize City Manager to execute the Purchase Order and all related documents.

BACKGROUND:

- 1. In March 1978, the City purchased a Ford F600 gas powered truck with a dump body for use in the Public Works Department.
- 2. On June 19, 2021, the City Council included funding for the replacement of the aging Ford F600 as an enhancement in the Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-2022 Adopted Budget.
- 3. In January 2022, staff obtained bids for a 2023 Ford F650 Regular Cab Dump Truck with a gasoline engine and automatic transmission via the State of California Contract Cooperative Contract (Attachment "B") and Sourcewell (Nationwide) Cooperative Purchasing Contract (Attachment "C") to replace its current Ford F-600 dump truck.

ANALYSIS:

The current Ford F600 Dump Truck is a versatile piece of heavy equipment that has been used for the past 44 years by the Public Works Operations Division in regular support of work on the City's streets, trees, facilities, and sewers. It is routinely used for the transport and removal of excavated materials, tree limbs, gravel, sand, street paving materials, pipe, and illegally-dumped items.

Despite the vehicle being well beyond its useful life (see photo, Attachment "D"), the City has managed to keep it operational and has used it for larger projects that require transport of significant amounts of material around the City for public works projects. However, for safety and efficiency of work, the City is at the point of replacing it so that there is a reliable piece of machinery on all of public works projects. Many of the replacement parts for repairs on the truck are no longer available.

The new vehicle, a Ford F650 (see photo, Attachment "E"), will be similar in specifications to the old truck, but it comes equipped with more safety features such as back-up alarms, safety lighting, improved suspension system, and more advanced breaks for safer operation of the truck. From an environmental standpoint, the engine will provide improved fuel efficiency and reduced emissions.

Procurement through the Statewide Contract.

Section 2-802 of the City's Purchasing Ordinance authorizes meeting competitive bid requirements through the purchase of equipment from cooperative purchase contracts obtained through a competitive bidding process prepared by and awarded by another local, state or federal government agency. The proposed purchase meets the purchasing requirements of Section 2-802.

California's Statewide Cooperative Contract provides state and local government agencies within the State of California with a specialized procurement process for obtaining specific products and services. This program ensures that purchasing agencies are given the option to choose the service that best meets their specific business needs, while maintaining an easy-to-use, cost-effective government procurement plan.

The State's Cooperative has a competitively bid contract with Downtown Ford Sales for equipment that is available for purchase by local government agencies (California state contract No. 1-18-23-10A). Public Works staff also obtained a bid from a contractor that provides nationwide cooperative pricing through Sourcewell (Attachment "B"). In this case, the statewide pricing through Downtown Ford Sales was the lowest bid – \$12,767 lower than the nationwide Sourcewell pricing.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The purchase of the 2023 Ford F650 Regular Cab Dump Truck was approved as an enhancement in the FY 2021-2022 budget and \$125,000 was appropriated in the General Fund in the Public Works division in account 001-310-0000-4500 (Capital Equipment). The proposed Budget Resolution will allow staff to transfer and appropriate the funds in the Equipment/Vehicle Maintenance and Replacement Fund and will give staff the authority to make the purchase from the proper fund.

CONCLUSION:

Staff recommends the City Council authorize a Purchase Order with Downtown (Sacramento) Ford Sales in an amount not to exceed \$114,136.89 based on Section 2-802 of the City's Purchasing Ordinance 1653 allowing purchasing of equipment through cooperative purchasing agreements.

Quality Program Grant Funds for the San Fernando Pacoima Wash Bike Path

Project

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Adopt Resolution No. 8130 (Attachment "A") appropriating \$1,513,000 in Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) Program Funds for the San Fernando Pacoima Wash Bike Path Project into the Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-2022 adopted budget; and
- b. Authorize the City Manager to execute all related documents to accept the grant funds and make non-substantive changes, if necessary.

BACKGROUND:

- 1. In 2007, the City was awarded \$1,513,000 in grant funding from the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (METRO) Call for Projects to fund the Pacoima Wash Bike Path Project.
- 2. In February 2014, METRO rescinded the \$1,513,000 grant award due to the changes in Federal Government rules for funding substantial bicycle and pedestrian projects. The rule change focused on allocating federal funds to county-level transportation agencies, like METRO, for an increased number of small projects instead of funding larger projects like the Pacoima Wash Bike Path Project. Going forward more substantial projects would be funded through state-level grant programs, like the Caltrans Active Transportation Program (ATP).
- 3. On March 17, 2014, the City Council approved the preparation and submittal of an ATP grant application to replace the \$1,513,000 in funds rescinded by METRO. The City was not successful in this grant application.

4. On August 26, 2016, the METRO Board approved an allocation of \$1,513,000 in CMAQ funding to replace grant funding that was rescinded in 2014.

5. On April 15, 2021, the City executed a Letter of Agreement (Attachment "B") with METRO to accept \$1,513,000 in CMAQ funds to replace the funding that was originally approved by METRO in 2007 and rescinded in 2014.

ANALYSIS:

The Pacoima Wash is a tributary of the Los Angeles River running from Angeles National Forest in the north to the Tujunga Wash in the south. The channelized tributary currently divides neighborhoods creating the potential for unsafe trespassing across the 65-foot channel and forcing pedestrians and bicyclists onto highly traveled roadways with Class II (standard bike lanes), Class III (shared-road bike routes), or no bicycle facilities or sidewalks. In FY 2003-2004, California State Polytechnic University, Pomona's Department of Landscape Architecture prepared the Pacoima Wash Greenway Master Plan. Following this plan, the City partnered with the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority (MRCA) for design support on the portion of the project going through San Fernando. MRCA utilized Surface Transportation Project funds for the development of the engineering and construction plans.

Project Description.

The MRCA conducted design concept, environmental review, and permitting for the Pacoima Wash Bike Path Project that would be a 3.25-mile long Class 1 bikeway stretching from the Lopez Earthen Dam and Debris Basin to the existing pedestrian and bicycle bridge at Haddon Ave. The portion of the project within the City limits would be construction of a 12-foot wide, 1.34-mile long Class I Bicycle/Pedestrian Path along the Pacoima Wash from the southern end of Pacoima Wash Natural Park at Eighth Street to Fourth Street. A prefabricated pedestrian bridge connecting communities from opposite sides of the Pacoima Wash will be installed from the southern end of the natural park, across the wash, and finally connecting to the new bike path to the east of the wash at Eighth Street. The project also includes: at-grade crossings at Fifth Street, Fourth Street, and Glenoaks Boulevard; six community access points; lighting, fencing, signing and striping as wayfinding tools.

Project Status.

The Project is set to release construction bid documents during May 2022 with the resulting award of a construction contract during June 2022. Staff estimates that construction will begin in the summer 2022.

CALL FOR PROJECTS LETTER OF AGREEMENT

PART I SPECIFIC TERMS OF THE LOA

- 1. Title of the Project (the "Project"): San Fernando Pacoima Wash Bike Path LACMTA Call for Projects ID# F1505, FTIP# LAF1505.
- Amount of Funds Programmed (the "Funds"): LACMTA Board of Directors' action of September 27, 2007, originally programmed \$1,513,000 (the "Funds") to Project Sponsor for the Project. The Project Sponsor was later required to apply for the State Active Transportation Program, but was not awarded funds. LACMTA Board of Directors' action on August 25, 2016 then reprogrammed the Funds over one year, Fiscal Year (FY) 2018-19.
- 3. The Funding Agency for this Project (the "Agency") is CALTRANS. The Programming Agency for this Project is LACMTA.
- 4. The "Project Funding" documents all sources of funds programmed for the Project as approved by LACMTA and is attached as Attachment A. The Project Funding includes the total programmed budget for the Project, including the Funds programmed by LACMTA and the Project Sponsor Funding Commitment (local match). The Project Funding also includes the fiscal years in which all the funds for the Project are programmed.
- 5. Project Sponsor shall complete the Project as described in the Scope of Work. The "Scope of Work" for the Project is attached to this LOA as <u>Attachment B</u>. The Scope of Work includes a general description of the Project and a detailed description of the work to be completed. The Scope of Work also includes a set schedule including Project milestones consistent with the lapsing policy described in Part II below. Work shall be delivered in accordance with that schedule unless otherwise agreed to by the parties in writing.
- 6. <u>Attachment C</u> the Reporting Guidelines; Project Sponsor shall complete the "Quarterly Progress Report." The Quarterly Progress Report is attached to this LOA as Attachment C1 in accordance with Attachment C Reporting Guidelines.
- 7. The "FTIP PROJECT SHEET" is attached as <u>Attachment D</u> and is required to ensure that the Project is programmed correctly in the most up-to-date FTIP document. The FTIP PROJECT SHEET can be found in ProgamMetro FTIP database under the reports section at https://programmetro.ecointeractive.com. All projects that receive funding through the LACMTA Call for Projects must be programmed into the FTIP which includes locally funded regionally significant projects for information and air quality modeling purposes. Project Sponsor shall review the Project in ProgramMetro each

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year and update or correct the Project as necessary during a scheduled FTIP amendment or adoption. Project Sponsor will be notified of amendments and adoptions to the FTIP via e-mail. Changes to the FTIP through ProgramMetro should be made as soon as possible after Project Sponsor is aware of any changes to the Project, but no later than October 1 of the year the change or update is effective. Should Project Sponsor fail to meet this date, it may affect Project Sponsor's ability to access funding, delay the Project and may ultimately result in the Funds being lapsed.

- 8. <u>Attachment E</u> Caltrans Document List, are attached to this LOA as Attachment E for reference purposes only and however a more current listing may be found on http://www.dot.ca.gov/hq/LocalPrograms/ or http://www.dot.ca.gov/hq/LocalPrograms/public.htm
- 9. <u>Attachment F</u> Special Conditions by the Metro Board of Directors or the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) is attached as Attachment F.
- 10. An executed "Project Readiness Certification" is attached as <u>Attachment G</u>, which is evidence that Project Sponsor can appropriately fund and staff the Project so that the Project can be completed in a timely manner.
- 11. Prior to the obligation of the Funds, no material changes to the Project Funding or the Scope of Work shall be funded or allowed without prior written approval of LACMTA and Project Sponsor. Such prior approval shall be evidenced by an amendment to this LOA, approved and signed by the LACMTA Chief Executive Officer or his designee and Project Sponsor. After the Funds have been obligated, no material changes will be allowed.

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<u>PART II</u> GENERAL TERMS OF THE LOA

1. PAYMENT OF FUNDS: Project Sponsor understands and agrees that LACMTA provides no Funds under this LOA and LACMTA shall have no responsibility or obligation to provide any Funds for the Project. Project Sponsor shall receive the Funds directly from the Agency pursuant to a separate agreement with the Agency. Project Sponsor shall submit to the Agency the appropriate invoices in the form, manner, and schedule specified by the applicable requirements of the Agency. Project Sponsor cannot be reimbursed for any cost incurred without prior authorization from the Agency. Project Sponsor shall be subject to, and comply with, all applicable requirements of the Agency and of LACMTA as required by LACMTA to fulfill its responsibilities as the programming agency. The allowability of expenditures, the cost reimbursement schedule, eligibility issues, resolution of disputes, and all other issues relating to this LOA shall be subject to the rules, regulations, and requirements of the Agency and LACMTA as the programming agency.

2. TERM:

- 2.1 The term of this LOA shall commence upon the date of this LOA, and shall terminate upon completion of the Scope of Work and LACMTA's receipt of Caltrans' final voucher paid for the Project.
- 2.2 Prior to the obligation of the Funds, should LACMTA determine there are insufficient Funds available for the Project, LACMTA may terminate this LOA by giving written notice to Project Sponsor at least thirty (30) days in advance of the effective date of such termination.

3. <u>USE OF FUNDS:</u>

- 3.1 Project Sponsor shall utilize the Funds to complete the Project as described in the Scope of Work and as approved by LACMTA and in accordance with the applicable requirements of the Agency.
- 3.2 The Funds, as programmed under this LOA, can only be used towards the completion of the Scope of Work originally adopted by LACMTA unless modified by an amendment to this LOA. Project Sponsor shall also be subject to and comply with all applicable requirements of the Agency administering this Project.

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4. REPORTING AND AUDIT REQUIREMENTS:

- 4.1 Project Sponsor shall be subject to and comply with all applicable requirements of the Agency regarding Project reporting and audit requirements. *Project Sponsor shall use the Federal Transportation Improvement Program ("FTIP") No., Expenditure Authorization ("EA") No., and LACMTA Call for Projects Project ID# on all correspondence.*
- 4.2 Since the Project is funded exclusively with Federal funds and contains no LACMTA local funding, LACMTA has no audit responsibilities for this Project. Project Sponsor shall comply with all Agency compliance, pre-award and performance audit requirements as deemed necessary to assure that funding expenditures conform to all applicable Project funding guidelines, laws and regulations. LACMTA, as the programming agency, shall have the right, at its sole discretion, to audit the Project for compliance with the terms of this LOA and to assure that funding expenditures conform to the terms of this LOA. LACMTA shall have the same audit rights as the Agency to audit the Project.
- 4.3 Project Sponsor shall submit the Quarterly Progress Report within 60 days after the close of each quarter on the last day of the months November, February, May and August. Annually with the 4th quarter Progress Report, Project Sponsor also shall submit photos of key components and milestones demonstrating Project progress or completion.

5. EXPENDITURE AND DISPOSITION OF FUNDS:

- 5.1 The expenditure and disposition of the Funds by Project Sponsor shall be subject to and in accordance with the terms and conditions of this LOA and the applicable requirements of the Agency. Project Sponsor shall not utilize the Funds in any other way or on any project other than that specified in this LOA and the applicable requirements of the Agency.
- 5.2 Project Sponsor shall be responsible for any and all cost overruns for the Project.
- 5.3 Project Sponsor shall be eligible for the Funds up to the programmed amount specified in Part I, Section 2 of this LOA subject to the terms and conditions contained herein and in all applicable requirements of the Agency.
- 5.4 Subject to the requirements and regulations of the Agency, and to the extent allowed by the Agency, any underruns to the funds shown in Attachment A shall be apportioned between LACMTA and Project Sponsor in the same proportion as the Sources of Funds from each party to this LOA as specified in Attachment A to this LOA. Upon completion of the Project described in the Scope of Work and subject to the requirements and regulations of the Agency, and to the extent allowed by the Agency, any unused obligation of the Funds shall revert back to LACMTA for future programming at LACMTA's discretion.
 - 5.5 The programming of the Funds does not imply nor obligate any future

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funding commitment on the part of LACMTA or the Agency.

6. <u>TIMELY USE OF FUNDS / REPROGRAMMING OF FUNDS:</u>

- 6.1 Project Sponsor must demonstrate timely use of the Funds by:
 - (i) executing this LOA within ninety (90) days of receiving formal transmittal of the LOA from LACMTA, or by December 31 of the first Fiscal Year in which the Funds are programmed, whichever date is later; and
 - (ii) obligating the Funds programmed under this LOA for allowable costs within 36 months from July 1 of the first Fiscal Year in which the Funds are programmed. All Funds programmed for FY 2018-19 are subject to lapse on June 30, 2021.

If Project Sponsor fails to meet any of the above conditions, the Project shall be considered lapsed and will be submitted to the LACMTA Board of Directors for deobligation.

- 6.2 Project Sponsor must demonstrate evidence of timely use and obligation of Funds programmed for the Project within the time period described in Part II, Section 6.1 of this LOA. Evidence of timely obligation will be either an executed "Authorization To Proceed" document (Caltrans Version E-76).
- 6.3 In the event this LOA is not executed and/or evidence of timely obligation of Funds is not provided as described in Part II, Sections 6.1 and 6.2 of this LOA, the Project will be reevaluated by LACMTA as part of the annual Call for Projects Recertification/Deobligation process and the Funds may be deobligated and reprogrammed to another project by the LACMTA Board of Directors. If Project Sponsor does not complete one element of the Project, as described in the FTIP Sheet, due to all or a portion of the Funds lapsing, the entire Project may be subject to deobligation at LACMTA's sole discretion. In the event the Funds are reprogrammed, this LOA shall automatically terminate without further action by either party.

7. SOURCES AND DISPOSITION OF FUNDS:

- 7.1 The obligation for LACMTA to program the Funds for the Project is subject to sufficient Funds being made available for the Project by the LACMTA Board of Directors, the United States Government or the State of California, as applicable. If such Funds are not made available for the Project, this LOA shall be void and have no further force and effect, and LACMTA shall have no obligation to program the Funds for the Project, unless otherwise agreed to in writing by LACMTA.
- 7.2 Project Sponsor shall fully fund and contribute the Project Sponsor Funding Commitment, as identified in the Project Funding (<u>Attachment A</u>), towards the cost of the Project. If the Funds identified in <u>Attachment A</u> are insufficient to complete the

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Project, Project Sponsor agrees to secure and provide such additional non-LACMTA programmed funds necessary to complete the Project.

8. COMMUNICATIONS:

- 8.1 Project Sponsor shall ensure that all Communication Materials contain recognition of LACMTA's contribution to the Project as more particularly set forth in "Funding Recipient Communications Guidelines" available at http://metro.net/partners-civic. The Funding Recipient Communications Guidelines may be changed from time to time during the course of this Agreement. Project Sponsor shall be responsible for complying with the latest Funding Recipient Communications Guidelines during the term of this Agreement, unless otherwise specifically authorized in writing by the LACMTA Chief Communications Officer.
- 8.2 For purposes of this Agreement, "Communications Materials" include, but are not limited to, press events, public and external newsletters, printed materials, advertising, websites radio and public service announcements, electronic media, and construction site signage. A more detailed definition of "Communications Materials" is found in the Funding Recipient Communications Guidelines.
- 8.3 The Metro logo is a trademarked item that shall be reproduced and displayed in accordance with specific graphic guidelines. The preferred logo lock-up for Funding Recipients to use is included in the Funding Recipient Communications Guidelines.
- 8.4 Project Sponsor shall ensure that any subcontractor, including, but not limited to, public relations, public affairs, and/or marketing firms hired to produce Project Communications Materials for public and external purposes will comply with the requirements contained in this Section.
- 8.5 The LACMTA Project Manager shall be responsible for monitoring Project Sponsor's compliance with the terms and conditions of this Section. Project Sponsor's failure to comply with the terms of this Section shall be deemed a default hereunder and LACMTA shall have all rights and remedies set forth herein.

9. OTHER TERMS AND CONDITIONS:

- 9.1 This LOA, along with the applicable requirements of the Agency, constitutes the entire understanding between the parties, with respect to the subject matter herein. The LOA shall not be amended, nor any provisions or breach hereof waived, except in writing signed by the parties who agreed to the original LOA or the same level of authority.
- 9.2 In the event that there is any legal court (e.g. Superior Court of the State of California, County of Los Angeles, or the U.S. District Court for the Central District of California) proceeding between the parties to enforce or interpret this LOA, or the applicable requirements of the Agency, to protect or establish any rights or remedies hereunder, the

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prevailing party shall be entitled to its costs and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees.

- 9.3 Neither LACMTA nor any officer or employee thereof shall be responsible for any damage or liability occurring by reason of anything done or committed to be done by Project Sponsor under or in connection with any work performed by and or service provided by Project Sponsor, its officers, agents, employees, contractors and subcontractors under this LOA. Project Sponsor shall fully indemnify, defend and hold LACMTA, and its subsidiaries and their respective officers, agents and employees harmless from and against any liability and expenses, including without limitation, defense costs, any costs or liability on account of bodily injury, death or personal injury of any person or for damage to or loss of risk of property, any environmental obligation, any legal fees and any claims for damages of any nature whatsoever arising out of the Project, including, without limitation: (i) use of the Funds by Project Sponsor, or its officers, agents, employees, contractors or subcontractors; (ii) breach of Project Sponsor's obligations under this LOA; or (iii) any act or omission of Project Sponsor, or its officers, agents, employees, contractors in the performance of the work or the provision of the services in connection with the Project, including, without limitation, the Scope of Work, described in this LOA.
- 9.4 Neither party hereto shall be considered in default in the performance of its obligations hereunder to the extent that the performance of any such obligation is prevented or delayed by unforeseen causes including acts of God, acts of a public enemy, and government acts beyond the control and without fault or negligence of the affected party. Each party hereto shall give notice promptly to the other of the nature and extent of any such circumstances claimed to delay, hinder, or prevent performance of any obligations under this LOA.
- 9.5 Project Sponsor shall comply with and insure that work performed under this LOA is done in compliance with Federal Agency Regulations (FAR), Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local laws, statutes, ordinances, rules, regulations, and procedural requirements and the applicable requirements and regulations of the Agency and LACMTA.
- 9.6 Project Sponsor shall not assign this LOA, or any part thereof, without written consent and prior approval of the LACMTA Chief Executive Officer or his designee, and any assignment without said consent shall be void and unenforceable.
- 9.7 This LOA shall be governed by California law. If any provision of this LOA is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall nevertheless continue in full force without being impaired or invalidated in any way.
- 9.8 The terms of this LOA shall inure to the benefit of, and shall be binding upon, each of the parties and their respective successors and assigns.
- 9.9 If any software/Intelligent Transportation Systems ("ITS") is developed with the Funds and if Project Sponsor ceases to use the software/ITS for public purposes or Project Sponsor sells, conveys, licenses or otherwise transfers the software/ITS, LACMTA

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shall be entitled to a refund or credit, at LACMTA's sole option, equivalent to the amount of the Funds spent developing the software/ITS. Such refund or credit shall not be required, subject to LACMTA approval of the intended use, if Project Sponsor reinvests the proceeds of such sale, conveyance, license or transfer into the Project to offset operating or systems management costs.

- 9.10 If the Project requires the implementation of an Intelligent Transportation Systems ("ITS") project, GRANTEE shall ensure the Project is consistent with the Regional ITS Architecture.

Project Sponsor attests to no organizational or personal conflicts of interest and agrees to notify LACMTA immediately in the event that a conflict, or the appearance thereof, arises. Project Sponsor shall not represent itself as an agent or employee of LACMTA and shall have no powers to bind LACMTA in contract or otherwise.
- 9.15 Project Sponsor shall notify LACMTA in advance of any key Project staffing changes.



RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council receive and file an update related to the City's COVID-19 efforts, including, but not limited to the City's COVID-19 planning, response, enforcement; education and outreach efforts; financial assistance programs and the pursuit of funding opportunities; COVID-19 related policy initiatives; and related recommendations, as appropriate.

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS:

This report is meant to provide City Council and the public the opportunity to review all items related to the City's response efforts and policy initiatives related to the COVID-19 pandemic, including, but not limited to, financial hardship programs and other potential stimulus funding.

Staff Updates.

Small Business Grant Program.

The San Fernando Small Business Grant Program was offered to local businesses that have been economically impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Through the Los Angeles County Development Authority (LACDA), the City is providing grants of \$10,000 to businesses that provide goods or services to local residents in the San Fernando community.

Eligible businesses may submitted intake forms during the five-day application period (February 28, 2022 through March 4, 2022). The timeline for the Small Business Grant Program is outlined in the table below:

A total of 257 businesses applied for the San Fernando Small Business Grant Program during the intake period. Of the 257 business, 19 were not located in the City, 12 did not have an active business license, and 27 were delinquent on their business license fees. On March 9, 2022, LACDA conducted the lottery to select businesses and is currently determining eligibility for the selected businesses.

<u>Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (LACDPH) A Safer Return Together at Work and in the Community Beyond the Blueprint for a Safer Economy.</u>

Since reopening on June 15, 2021, LACDPH has updated the Health Officer Order ("Order") on July 16, 2021, July 22, 2021, July 30, 2021, August 23, 2021, September 17, 2021, September 28, 2021, December 16, 2021, December 31, 2021, January 5, 2022, January 10, 2022, February 15, 2022, February 23, 2022, and most recently on March 3, 2022.

The current Health Officer Order, issued on March 3, 2022, implements the following:

- Aligns with the February 28, 2022 State Public Health Officer Guidance on masking.
- After March 11, 2022, the universal masking requirement of K-12 schools and childcare settings will terminate. Both CDPH and LACDPH continue to strongly recommend that individuals in these settings continue to mask while indoors until transmission rates are much lower.
- Masks continue to be required for indoor settings with higher risks for transmission: Public Transit, Transportation Hubs, all Healthcare Settings, including Long Term Care and Adult and Senior Care Facilities, Correctional Facilities and Detention Centers, Homeless Shelters, and Emergency Shelters.
- Masks are strongly recommended, but not required, for all persons, regardless of vaccine status, in other indoor public settings and businesses. Well-fitting medical masks or respirators (e.g., N95s, KN95s, and KF94s) are highly recommended.
- In settings where masks are strongly recommended, businesses, venue operators, and hosts may choose to require masking, regardless of vaccination status, by patrons, visitors, attendees, and workers as a strategy to reduce the risk of transmission at their sites(s).
- Pre-entry vaccination or recent negative test verification for attendees is recommended, but not required, for Outdoor Mega Event operators.


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- Pre-entry vaccination verification or recent negative test verification for patrons and employees is recommended, but not required, for Bars, Breweries, Wineries, Distilleries, Nightclubs and Lounges.
- Employers are required to offer medical grade masks and respirators to employees who work indoors and in contact with other workers, customers, or members of the public in settings where there is optional masking.
- In settings where pre-entry verification of vaccination or a negative COVID-19 viral test result
 is not required, businesses, venue operators, and hosts may choose to require pre-entry
 verification of COVID-19 vaccination, pre-entry verification of a negative COVID-19 viral test
 result, or both as an additional, important strategy to reduce transmission at their site(s),
 regardless of masking.
- As a reminder, no person can be prevented from wearing a mask as a condition of participatin in an activity or entry into a business.
- Local government entities and businesses may continue to have additional and more protective infection control requirements.



As of March 14, 2022, the City of San Fernando has experienced a total of 10,376 cases of COVID-19 and a total of 80 residents have lost their lives to the pandemic.


Since May 13, 2021, all California residents age 12 and older have been eligible to be vaccinated. On November 3, 2021, children ages five and older became eligible to receive the Pfizer vaccination.

On August 14, 2021 and October 21, 2021, a third (booster) dose of the Pfizer, Moderna and Johnson & Johnson vaccines, respectively, became available to residents.

Per data provided by LACDPH as of March 10, 2022: 17,673 (74.8%) of San Fernando residents over the age of five and 2,429 (94.4%) of San Fernando residents over the age of 65 are fully vaccinated.

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Notes:

- The dashed line is a linear trend projected into the future, based off of the last complete week of data. Data shown are binned by their weekly totals.
- For the "Received 1+ Dose" chart, cumulative totals are given for the number of people in a button-selected age group (5+, 12+, 5-11, 12-17, 65+) vaccinated with at least 1 dose divided by the relevant age group population. For the "Fully Vaccinated" chart, cumulative totals indicate the number of people in the button-selected age group who have completed a vaccination series (e.g. second dose for Pfizer/Moderna, first dose for J&U) divided by the relevant age group population. For the "Received 1+ additional dose" charts, cumulative totals refer to the number of people in a button-selected age group who, by that date, received 1+ additional dose following their full vaccination, divided by the relevant age group population.
- Each community past projection line shows the vaccination rate for a previous week. Past projections are not shown for ages 5-11
 vaccinations at this time.
- 5-11 year old additional doses may be highly variable due to on-going record clean ups conducted by the State in CAIR notably when a new eligibility group has been added.

San Fernando Recreation Park Vaccination and Testing Site.

In cooperation with CORE, the City is able to offer a small-scale COVID-19 mobile unit at San Fernando Recreation Park. Although the site is significantly scaled down from the Supersite the closed in July 2021, there is more flexibility to change days and hours of service as needed, and there is a much smaller impact on the surrounding neighborhood and park services. An additional service that CORE is providing to the community at this mobile site is information related to eligibility for public assistance programs and health screenings (i.e., CalFresh/SNAP, WIC, Medi-Cal, LIHEAP, and General Relief).

The San Fernando Recreation Park site is currently open Monday through Saturday from 8 am to 4 pm. No appointment is necessary for any of the services below. The daily schedule is as follows:

- Testing Monday through Saturday, 8 am to 4 pm
- Vaccine (Pfizer), including Booster Dose for eligible residents Tuesday, Wednesday,
 Friday, and Saturday, 8 am to 4 pm

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- Public Assistance Program Information Monday through Saturday, 8 am to 4 pm
- Wellness Checks Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday, 8 am to 4 pm

COVID-19 Relief Programs.

City Facilities Reopening.

Effective, January 3, 2022, City Hall reopened to the public with normal hours (i.e., Monday through Thursday, 7:30 am to 5:30 pm; Friday, 8 am to 5 pm).

All visitors to City Hall and the San Fernando Police Department must comply with the current health officer orders and posted notices.

Limited recreation programming and services have resumed at most of the City parks with the condition that the County of Los Angeles Protocols for Organized Activities are implemented. Las Palmas Park and Recreation Park are currently offering limited indoor recreational programs and services. LiveSan services and the Court Commitment Program have both resumed at the Police Department. Customers are urged to contact the Police Department at (818) 898-1267 or Police@sfcity.org prior to visiting to check on availability of services.

BUDGET IMPACT:

American Rescue Plan Act.

On March 12, 2021, President Biden signed the American Rescue Plan Act into law which provides fiscal stimulus funding paid directly to state and local governments. The City's total allocation is approximately \$5.8 million, which is being distributed in two equal installments of \$2.9 million in July 2021 and July 2022. City Council will be considering appropriation of these funds through separate City Council action items.

Prior Coronavirus Relief Funds.

The City received \$311, 234 from the Coronavirus Relief Funds (CRF) through the CARES Act. City Council appropriated these funds to reimburse the City for COVID-19 response costs in FY 2020-2021.

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Community Development Block Grant Funds.

In FY 2020-2021, the City received \$136,000 in special CDBG Coronavirus (CV) funds that were used to fund a residential food distribution program and small business PPE program. In addition, in FY 2021-2022, the City allocated \$219,128 in CDBG funds for a Business Assistance Program to participate in the LACDA small business grant program to quickly roll out the grant opportunity to San Fernando businesses.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Conduct a Public Hearing; and
- b. Pending public testimony, conduct a second reading to adopt Ordinance No. 1708, in title only, (Attachment "A"), "An Ordinance of the City of San Fernando, California, amending Articles I, II, III, IV, V, IX, and X of Chapter 18 of the San Fernando Municipal Code adopting by reference Division II of Chapter 1 of the 2019 Edition of the California Building Code, which is codified in Part 2 of Title 24 of The California Code of Regulations; the 2020 Edition of the City of Los Angeles Building Code, as in effect December 27, 2019; the 2020 Edition of the City of Los Angeles Electrical Code, as in effect December 27, 2019; the 2020 Edition of the City of Los Angeles Mechanical Code, as in effect December 27, 2019; the 2020 Edition of the City of Los Angeles Plumbing Code, as in effect December 27, 2019; the 2020 Edition of the City of Los Angeles Residential Code, as in effect December 27, 2019; and the 2020 Edition of the City Of Los Angeles Green Building Code, as in effect December 27, 2019, which are codified in Articles 1, 1.5, 3, 4, 5 and 9 of Chapter IX of The City of Los Angeles Municipal Code, including appendices, amendments, additions, and deletions thereto; amending Article II of Chapter 38 of the San Fernando Municipal Code, adopting by reference the City of Los Angeles Fire Code, as in effect May 24, 2020, which is codified in Article 7 of Chapter V of The City of Los Angeles Municipal Code, including appendices, amendments, additions and deletions thereto."

BACKGROUND:

1. The City of San Fernando adopts, by reference, the City of Los Angeles's Building and Fire Codes, which is one of the requirements of the City's fire suppression service contract with the Los Angeles Fire Department.

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- 2. On June 4, 2012, the City Council adopted the 2008 Edition of the City of Los Angeles Elevator Safety Orders of Title 8 and the 2007 Edition of Part 7 of Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations as part of its elevator code. The Elevator Code has not changed since that time.
- 3. On October 15, 2018, the City Council adopted the 2016 Edition of California Building Code with the City of Los Angeles's amendments.
- 4. On July 1, 2019, the California Building Standards Commission published the new California Building Standards Code, which became effective for all cities on January 1, 2020.
- 5. On December 11, 2019, the City of Los Angeles adopted by reference certain portions of the 2018 International Building Code and the 2019 California Building Code, with local amendments (City of Los Angeles Ordinance No. 186488), which became effective on December 27, 2019, and included adopting the following codes:
 - a. Building Code
 - b. Electrical Code
 - c. Plumbing Code
 - d. Mechanical Code
 - e. Green Building Code
 - f. Residential Code
- 6. On May 5, 2020, the City of Los Angeles adopted the 2019 California Fire Code, with local amendments (City of Los Angeles Ordinance No. 186616), which became effective on May 24, 2020.
- 7. On February 22, 2022, the City Council considered and introduced for first reading Ordinance No. 1708 to adopt by reference the 2019 California Building Codes for the City's Administrative Code, and the 2020 Los Angeles Building and Fire Codes for the City's Building and Fire Codes.
- 8. On March 3 and 10, 2022, a Public Hearing notice was published in the *San Fernando Valley Sun* newspaper notify the public of the proposed adoption of Ordinance No. 1708. Pursuant to Government Code Section 50022.3, the notice of Public Hearing must be published once a week for two successive weeks, with at least five days intervening between the respective publications dates.

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ANALYSIS:

The California Building Standards Commission (the CBSC) is responsible for building codes used for the construction of buildings within the State. The International Building Code is the uniform code referenced and adopted by California. Approximately every three years, a new version of the International Building Code is published by the International Code Council (ICC). The CSBC makes amendments to the International Building Code and publishes the California Building Codes.

The California Building Codes are required to be adopted by every city within the State. Pursuant to Health & Safety Code Sections 17958.5 and 18941.5, any city may establish more restrictive building standards than those in the California Building Codes if a city finds that the more stringent standard or "local amendment" is necessary because of local climatic, geological or topographical conditions. If a city fails to adopt its own more restrictive standards, the codes published by the state become the city's codes.

Through the Fire and Emergency Services Agreement with the City of Los Angeles Fire Department, the City obtains certain fire plan check services and fire inspection services and is required to adopt the Los Angeles Fire Code and building regulations, including the Los Angeles Building, Residential, Elevator, Electrical, Plumbing, Mechanical and Green Building Codes.

The Proposed Ordinance has been prepared to adopt by reference the following:

- 1. Division II of Chapter 1 of the California Building Code as the City's administrative code;
- 2. The 2019 Edition of the California Building, Residential, Electrical, Mechanical, Plumbing and Green Building Standards Codes, with local City of Los Angeles amendments; and
- 3. The 2019 Edition of the California Fire Code, with local City of Los Angeles amendments.

Adoption of Division II of Chapter 1 of the California Building Code as the City's Administrative Code.

The City's administrative code governs the administration and enforcement, including inspections and permits, of the City's building, electrical, mechanical, plumbing, housing and dangerous buildings codes. To improve the effectiveness with which the City administers its building regulations, staff is proposing to adopt by reference the administrative provisions of the 2019 Edition of the California Building Code (Division II of Chapter 1) as the City's administrative code with no local City of Los Angeles amendments. Chapter 1, Div. II is not adopted by the State Building Standards Commission as part of the State's Code and is therefore up to the City to adopt.

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Adoption of the 2019 Editions of the California Building, Residential, Electrical, Mechanical, Plumbing and Green Building Standards Codes, with Local City of Los Angeles Amendments.

The City obtains fire plan check and inspection services from the Los Angeles Fire Department. As part of the City's services agreement with Los Angeles, the City is required to adopt Los Angeles's building regulations, including Los Angeles's building, residential, elevator, electrical, plumbing, mechanical and green building codes. Consequently, the City is required to adopt the latest editions of the California Building Standards Codes with the City of Los Angeles's amendments. Los Angeles has made a variety of amendments to the California Building, Residential, Electrical, Mechanical, Plumbing and Green Building Standards Codes as authorized by state law. The City has, in turn, routinely adopted Los Angeles's amendments to the California Building Standards Codes. This process is being followed again this year. Please note that the City of Los Angeles's Elevator Code, which the City previously adopted, has not since been amended by City of Los Angeles, and thus no new adoption is necessary at this time.

Some of the more notable provisions of the City of Los Angeles's Amendments address structural provisions for:

- Seismic design and anchorage of components
- Grading provisions
- Maintenance, re-use and occupancy change requirements for existing buildings
- Earthquake hazard mitigation in existing buildings
- Voluntary residential retrofits

Adoption of City of Los Angeles Fire Code.

The City currently contracts with the City of Los Angeles Fire Department for Fire Protection and Emergency Medical Services. Per this Agreement, the City is required to adopt the City Los Angeles building codes inclusive of any updates of Los Angeles Fire Code. The City has historically adopted the City of Los Angeles Codes with Los Angeles's local amendments in order to establish a uniformity of standards. This serves to minimize conflict and confusion in addressing the community's needs including, but not limited to, fire plan check review, fire inspections, and fire suppression services.

The City's Fire Code provides amendments consistent with how the Los Angeles Fire Department enforces site design, site access, smoke control provisions, water availability and building access. Some of the notable Fire Code categories of amendments are:

- Hazmat chemical storage and handling
- Occupant protection provisions for enforcement tool
- Fire alarm and sprinkler amendments
- Hydrant and water supply requirements
- Administrative amendments for enforcement
- Smoke control and fire assembly amendments

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City Council Meeting.

On February 22, 2022, the City Council received a presentation for the proposed adoption reference of the 2019 California Building Codes for the City's Administrative Code, and the 2020 Los Angeles Building and Fire Codes for the City's Building and Fire Codes. The City Council considered the proposed adoption, introduced the ordinance for first reading, scheduled a public hearing for adoption of the ordinance for March 21, 2022, and directed staff to publish the notices of public hearing pursuant to Government Code Section 50022.3.

Environmental Review.

The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) does not apply to continuing administrative activities or organizational activities of government that will not result in specific direct or indirect physical changes in the environment, or to the creation of government funding mechanisms or other governmental fiscal activities that do not result in potential environmental impacts. Public Resources Code Section 21065 and State CEQA Guidelines Sections 15378(b)(2) and (b)(5). The draft ordinance makes various technical changes to the existing regulations in the form of local administrative, climate, geologic or topographical changes. On that basis, the draft ordinance is not subject to CEQA.

BUDGET IMPACT:

Preparation of the proposed Ordinance for amendment of the City's codes are included in the annual work program for the Community Development Department and City Manager's Office, respectively. Therefore, funding for both efforts is included in the Fiscal Year 2021-2022 Adopted Budget.

CONCLUSION:

It is recommended that the City Council approve (a) conducting a public hearing to consider adoption of Ordinance No. 1708; and (b) conduct a second reading, in title only, of Ordinance No. 1708.

ORDINANCE NO. 1708

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING ARTICLES I, II, III, IV, V, IX, AND X OF CHAPTER 18 OF THE SAN FERNANDO MUNICIPAL CODE ADOPTING BY REFERENCE DIVISION II OF CHAPTER 1 OF THE 2019 EDITION OF THE CALIFORNIA BUILDING CODE, WHICH IS CODIFIED IN PART 2 OF TITLE 24 OF THE CALIFORNIA CODE OF REGULATIONS; THE 2020 EDITION OF THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES BUILDING CODE, AS IN EFFECT DECEMBER 27, 2019; THE 2020 EDITION OF THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES ELECTRICAL CODE, AS IN EFFECT DECEMBER 27, 2019; THE 2020 EDITION OF THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES MECHANICAL CODE, AS IN EFFECT DECEMBER 27, 2019; THE 2020 EDITION OF THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES PLUMBING CODE, AS IN EFFECT DECEMBER 27, 2019; THE 2020 EDITION OF THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES RESIDENTIAL CODE, AS IN EFFECT DECEMBER 27, 2019; AND THE 2020 EDITION OF THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES GREEN BUILDING CODE, AS IN EFFECT DECEMBER 27, 2019, WHICH ARE CODIFIED IN ARTICLES 1, 1.5, 3, 4, 5 AND 9 OF CHAPTER IX OF THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES MUNICIPAL CODE, INCLUDING APPENDICES, AMENDMENTS, ADDITIONS, AND DELETIONS THERETO; AMENDING ARTICLE II OF CHAPTER 38 OF THE SAN FERNANDO MUNICIPAL CODE, ADOPTING BY REFERENCE THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES FIRE CODE, AS IN EFFECT MAY 24, 2020, WHICH IS CODIFIED IN ARTICLE 7 OF CHAPTER V OF THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES MUNICIPAL CODE, INCLUDING APPENDICES, AMENDMENTS, ADDITIONS AND **DELETIONS THERETO**

WHEREAS, California Government Code Section 50022.1 et seq. authorizes the adoption by reference of the Codes specified in the title of the Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, at least one copy of each of said Codes certified as full, true and correct by the City Clerk of the City of San Fernando ("City") have been filed in the Office of the City Clerk in and posted electronically on the City's website accordance with the provisions of Government Code Section 50022.6; and

WHEREAS, California Health & Safety Code Sections 17958.5 and 18941.5 authorize cities and counties to make changes or modifications in the requirements contained in the provisions published in the California Building Standards Code and the other regulations adopted pursuant to Section 17922, as it determines, pursuant to the provisions of Section 17958.7, are reasonably necessary because of local climatic, geological, or topographical conditions; and

WHEREAS, except as noted below, the City desires to adopt by reference Division II of Chapter 1 of the 2019 edition of the California Building Code, which is codified in Part 2 of Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations; the 2020 edition of the City of Los Angeles Building Code,

the 2020 edition of the City of Los Angeles Electrical Code, the 2020 edition of the City of Los Angeles Mechanical Code, the 2020 edition of the City of Los Angeles Plumbing Code, the 2020 edition of the City of Los Angeles Residential Code, the 2020 edition of the City of Los Angeles Green Building Code, including appendices, amendments, additions and deletions thereto; and the City of Los Angeles Fire Code, including appendices, amendments, additions and deletions thereto, subject to amendments that are reasonably necessary because of local climatic, geologic and/or topographic conditions; and

WHEREAS, no additional findings of reasonable necessity on the basis of local climatic, geologic or topographic conditions are necessary for the City's amendments to Codes specified in the title of the Ordinance because the proposed amendments to said Codes are for administrative clarification, and do not modify a building standard pursuant to California Health & Safety Code Sections 17958.5 and 18941.5; and

WHEREAS, a duly noticed public hearing, as required by California Government Code Section 50022.3, has been conducted and concluded prior to the adoption of this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the City published notice of the aforementioned public hearing pursuant to California Government Code Section 6066; and

WHEREAS, all legal prerequisites relating to the adoption of this Ordinance have occurred.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The recitals above are true and correct and incorporated herein by reference.

SECTION 2. Section 18-1 ("Adoption of Administrative Code") of Article I ("In General") of Chapter 18 ("Buildings and Building Regulations") of the San Fernando Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 18-1. Adoption of Administrative Code.

(a) Division II of Chapter 1 of the California Building Code, 2019 Edition (Part 2 of Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations), based on the 2018 International Building Code as published by the International Code Council, is adopted by reference, and may be referred to as the "administrative code" of the City, subject to the amendments set forth in this article. The administrative code shall govern the administration and enforcement, including inspections and permits, of the codes adopted in this chapter. One copy of Division II of Chapter 1 of the 2019 edition of the California Building Code has been deposited in the Office of the City Clerk and shall at all times be maintained in the City Clerk's office for use and examination by the public.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any person to violate any provision or fail to comply with any of the requirements of the administrative code. It shall also be unlawful for any person to construct, alter, move, enlarge, replace, repair, equip, use, occupy, locate, maintain, remove or demolish any building or structure in the City, or any appurtenances connected or attached to such buildings or structures, or cause the same to be done, contrary to or in violation of any provision of the administrative code."

SECTION 3. Section 18-2 ("Administrative Code amended") of Article I ("In General") of Chapter 18 ("Buildings and Building Regulations") of the San Fernando Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 18-2. Administrative code amended.

- (a) Notwithstanding the provisions of section 18-1, section 103.1 of the 2019 edition of the California Building Code ("Creation of Enforcement Agency") is amended to read:
 - **103.1 Creation of enforcement agency.** The Division of Building and Safety is hereby created and the official in charge thereof shall be known as the *Building Official*.
- (b) Notwithstanding the provisions of section 18-1, Exemption No. 2 to section 105.2 of the 2019 edition of the California Building Code ("Work exempt from permit") is deleted.
- (c) Notwithstanding the provisions of section 18-1, Exemption No. 9 to section 105.2 of the 2019 edition of the California Building Code ("Work exempt from permit") is amended to read:
 - 9. Prefabricated swimming pool accessory to a Group R-3 occupancy that are less than 18 inches (457 mm) deep, do not exceed 5,000 gallons (18,925 L) and are installed entirely above ground.
- (d) Notwithstanding the provisions of section 18-1, Exemption No. 14 to section 105.2 of the 2019 edition of the California Building Code ("Work exempt from permit") is added to read:
 - 14. Decks not exceeding 200 square feet (18.58 m²) in area that are not more than 30 inches (762 mm) above grade at any point, are not attached to a dwelling and do not serve the exit door required by the 2019 edition of the California Residential Code Section R311.4.
- (e) Notwithstanding the provisions of section 18-1, section 113.1 of the 2019 edition of the California Building Code ("General") is amended to read:
 - **113.1 General.** In order to hear and decide appeals of orders, decisions or determinations made by the Building Official relative to the application and interpretation of the building, residential building, electrical, mechanical, plumbing and green building codes, there shall

be and is hereby created a board of appeals. The board of appeals shall be the City Council of the City."

Section 18-31 ("Adoption of the City of Los Angeles Building Code") of Article II ("Building Code") of Chapter 18 ("Buildings and Building Regulations") of the San Fernando Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 18-31. Adoption of the City of Los Angeles Building Code.

- (a) The 2020 edition of the City of Los Angeles Building Code, excluding Sections 91.102-91.105, 91.106.2(13), 91.107-91.109 and 91.111, as amended, and in effect December 30, 2019, which code adopts and amends the 2018 International Building Code and the 2019 edition of the California Building Code, is adopted by reference, and shall be referred to as the "building code" of the City, subject to the amendments set forth in this article.
- (b) In the event of any conflict between provisions of the 2019 edition of the California Building Code, the 2020 edition of the City of Los Angeles Building Code, as amended, and in effect December 27, 2019, or any amendment to the building code contained in this Code, the provision contained in the later listed document shall control.
- (c) One copy of the 2020 edition of the City of Los Angeles Building Code, as amended and in effect December 27, 2019, has been deposited in the Office of the City Clerk and shall at all times be maintained in the City Clerk's office for use and examination by the public.
- (d) It shall be unlawful for any person to violate any provision or fail to comply with any of the requirements of the building code. SECTION 29. All of the amendments to the 2019 edition of the California Building Code and Fire Code made by the City of Los Angeles in its 2020 edition of the City of Los Angeles Building Code, and adopted by the City of San Fernando in this Ordinance, are based on the findings made by the City of Los Angeles in Ordinance No. 186488 (Building) and 186616 (Fire) of the City Council of the City of Los Angeles, which is adopted by reference in this Ordinance, including, but not limited to, the findings that the amendments set forth in this Ordinance are reasonably necessary due to the following local climatic, geological and/or topographical conditions:

Climatic:

- 1. The City of San Fernando has climatic conditions which subject it to a mild winter to an extremely hot summer desert-like climate and hot, dry (Santa Ana) winds that make the temperature rise and the humidity drop, increasing the fire danger to all exposed combustible materials.
- 2. Widespread fires caused by either earthquakes or brush fires would limit the capabilities of the City of Los Angeles Fire Department to effectively respond to all the fires.
- 3. Quick response to fires by the City of Los Angeles Fire Department will reduce the amount of damage to buildings and increase the number of lives saved.

Geological:

- 1. The City of San Fernando is located in a high seismic activity zone, which is considered by experts to be the most seismically active of the four seismic zones in the world.
- 2. Seismic experts predict a massive earthquake on one of these faults within the next 30 years and several earthquakes similar in intensity to the Northridge Earthquake during the same period.
- 3. Massive earthquakes pose unusual and extraordinary stresses on buildings and structures requiring more stringent building regulations than would otherwise be required;
- 4. A major earthquake would break water lines making fire-fighting more difficult and would break gas lines and electric lines, making a high risk of fires breaking out in all areas of the City.

Topographical:

- 1. The City of San Fernando is situated in a coastal region of hills and mountains containing dry wild native brush and other native and non-native vegetation.
- 2. This region of flat land and hillside areas creates a natural basin, which has high strong winds alongside foothills and other areas of the City.
- 3. Widespread fires caused by either earthquakes or brush fires would impact the capabilities of the City of Los Angeles Fire Department to effectively respond to all the fires.
- 4. The highly concentrated area of buildings, traffic congestion and possible gridlock may jeopardize the quick response to fires by the City of Los Angeles Fire Department that could reduce the amount of damage to buildings and increase the number of lives saved.

All of the amendments to the 2019 edition of the California Fire Code made by the City of Los Angeles in its 2020 edition of the City of Los Angeles Fire Code, and adopted by the City of San Fernando in this Ordinance, are based on the findings made by the City of Los Angeles in Ordinance No. 186488 and 186616 of the City Council of the City of Los Angeles, which are adopted by reference in this Ordinance, including, but not limited to, the findings that the amendments set forth in this Ordinance are reasonably necessary due to the local climatic, geological and/or topographical conditions characterized by hot, dry summers and the high potential for seismic activity which make structures particularly vulnerable to rapidly spreading fires and structural damage.

No additional findings of reasonable necessity on the basis of local climatic, geologic or topographic conditions are necessary for the City's amendments to Codes specified in the title of the Ordinance because the proposed amendments to said Codes are for administrative clarification, and do not modify a building standard pursuant to California Health & Safety Code Sections 17958.5 and 18941.5

SECTION 30. This Ordinance is exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") pursuant to State CEQA Guidelines, as it is not a "project" and has no potential to result in a direct or reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change to the environment. 14 Cal. Code Regs. § 15378(a). Further, this Ordinance is exempt from CEQA as there is no possibility that this Ordinance or its implementation would have a significant negative effect on the environment. 14 Cal. Code Regs. § 15061(b)(3).

SECTION 31. The adoption of this Ordinance or any amendment to any existing ordinance of this City shall not in any manner affect the prosecution for violations of ordinances committed prior to the effective date of this Ordinance.

SECTION 32. If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase in this ordinance or any part thereof is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid or ineffective by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity or effectiveness of the remaining portions of this ordinance or any part thereof. The City Council hereby declares that is would have passed each section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more subsections, subdivisions, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases be declared unconstitutional, or invalid, or ineffective.

SECTION 33. The Building Official is hereby authorized and directed to transmit a copy of this ordinance to the California Building Standards Commission as required by California Health and Safety Code Section 17958.7.

SECTION 34. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this Ordinance and shall cause this Ordinance to be published or posted as required by law. This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days after adoption.

Grant Funds to Repay the Revolving Fund

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- a. Conduct a Public Hearing;
- b. Pending public testimony, authorize a drawdown of \$200,000 from the Los Angeles County Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Revolving Grant Fund to allocate toward the City's Small Business Grant Program (Attachment "A");
- c. Approve the allocation of \$200,000 of the City's Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-2023 Community Development Block Grant funds to repay the Revolving Grant Fund; and
- d. Authorize the City Manager, or designee, to submit documentation conveying the City Council's approval to the Los Angeles County Community Development Authority (LACDA).

BACKGROUND:

- 1. On March 1, 2021, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 8060 approving the allocation of CDBG Funds for FY 2021-2022 toward the Business Assistance Program (\$183,925) and Water Bill Assistance Program (\$45,980).
- 2. In January 2022, the City received the projected FY 2022-2023 CDBG allocation from LACDA, which is \$225,000.
- 3. On January 18, 2022, the City Council approved reallocating unspent CDBG Funds for Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-2022 to the Business Assistance Program and participate in the LACDA's Small Business Grant Program that provides \$10,000 grants to eligible small businesses in San Fernando. The total amount of funding reallocated to this program was \$219,128 to fund approximately 21 grants.

- 4. On February 28 March 4, 2022, LACDA received more than 235 intake forms from San Fernando businesses for the Small Business Grant Program.
- 5. On March 3, 2022, staff was notified that LACDA does not have plans to administer another round of Small Business Grants; however, there was an opportunity to drawdown from LACDA's Revolving Loan Fund to access the City's FY 2022-2023 CDBG allocation now to increase the amount of funding available through the current Small Business Grant Program (Attachment "B").
- 6. On March 8, 2022, the COVID-19 Relief Program Ad Hoc (Pacheco, Rodriguez) met to discuss the FY 2022-2023 CDBG allocation and developed a consensus recommendation to City Council to authorize \$200,000 from FY 2022-2023 CDBG allocation toward the current Small Business Grant Program.

ANALYSIS:

The federal CDBG Program supports community development activities to build stronger and more resilient communities. To support community development, activities are identified through an ongoing process. Activities may address needs such as infrastructure, economic development projects, public facilities installation, community centers, housing rehabilitation, public services, clearance/acquisition, microenterprise assistance, code enforcement, homeowner assistance, etc.

Based on the current funding for the Small Business Grant program approved by City Council in January 2022, the City only has funding to provide \$10,000 grants to approximately 10% of the businesses that completed an intake form. Due to the large demand for the program, staff contacted LACDA to inquire about the opportunity to increase the amount of CDBG funding available for the Small Business Grant program.

LACDA staff indicated that there are not currently plans for LACDA to administer another round of Small Business Grants. However, LACDA indicated that San Fernando may participate in the Revolving Grant Fund Program (Attachment "B") to essentially access a portion of the City's FY 2022-2023 CDBG allocation now and increase the amount of funding available for the Small Business Grant Program. To participate in the program, an application to participate in the program needed to be submitted by March 16, 2022.

Staff met with the CDBG Ad Hoc (Vice Mayor Pacheco and Councilmember Rodriguez) on March 8, 2022 to discuss the option of accessing LACDA Revolving Grand Funds to increase CDBG funding for the current Small Business Grant Program. There are several advantages of participating in the LACDA Small Business Grant Program, including:

- 1. The administrative costs of participating in the County program are divided among multiple participating cities, which creates administrative cost savings through economies of scale and leaves more funding available for grants;
- 2. The funds will be distributed to businesses within the next 30 days vs. six-plus months if the City develops and administers its own program; and
- 3. Using more restrictive CDBG funds for this Small Business grant program will allow the City to use less restrictive ARPA funds for other projects/programs.

There was consensus among the Ad Hoc Committee members that it would be in the best interest of the City to allocate \$200,000 of the City's 2022-2023 CDBG funds toward the current Small Business Grant program now, which will increase the number of grants available to San Fernando businesses from 21 to approximately 40. Staff agreed with the Ad Hoc Committee's assessment that it is in the City's best interest to increase CDBG funding for this grant program and moved forward with submitting the Revolving Grant Fund Application (Attachment "A").

Additionally, the Ad Hoc Committee is recommending that the remaining FY 2022-2023 CDBG funds (approximately \$25,000) be allocated toward Recreation Program Scholarship Funding to significantly decrease the cost for San Fernando residents participating in Recreation programming. However, there is a 30-day notice posting requirement for this program, so it will be presented to City Council for review and approval at the regular City Council meeting scheduled for April 4, 2022.

Procedure.

In order to receive federal CDBG funds through LACDA and participate in the Revolving Grant Fund, the City must determine its intended allocations of available CDBG funds for the upcoming fiscal year, provide an opportunity for public input and comment on such proposed uses, and submit an adopted City Council Resolution or approved City Council meeting minutes to LACDA conveying the City's intended allocations. This Public Hearing has been noticed by posting in the City Hall bulletin board (see Attachment "C").

BUDGET IMPACT:

The City receives an annual CDBG allocation, which is projected to be \$225,000 in FY 2022-2023. CDBG funds must be used to serve low- and moderate-income area of the community and assist with economic recovery. The proposed appropriation of \$200,000 from the City's FY 2022-2023 CDBG allocation to participate in the Revolving Grant Program will allow the City to access next fiscal year's CDBG funds now to better meet the significant need for Small Business Grants now.

CONCLUSION:

Staff recommends that the City Council authorize a drawdown of \$200,000 from the LACDA Revolving Grant Fund to allocate toward the City's Small Business Grant Program (Attachment "A") and approve the allocation of \$200,000 of the City's Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-2023 Community Development Block Grant funds to repay the Revolving Grant Fund.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) REVOLVING GRANT FUND GUIDELINES

1.0 PURPOSE

The purpose of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Revolving Grant Fund (Grant Fund) is to transfer additional CDBG funds to participating cities. These funds will be returned to the Grant Fund through future annual allocations received by recipient cities.

2.0 EFFECTIVE DATE

These guidelines are effective January 1, 2018.

3.0 FUNDING

Funding for the Grant Fund is to be provided through CDBG funds. The Grant Fund will be replenished with funds recaptured or transferred from participating cities.

4.0 TRANSFER OF UNALLOCATED CITY FUNDS TO THE GRANT FUND

- Cities may transfer unallocated funds to the Grant Fund upon completion of a Grant Fund Transfer Agreement (GFTA) (Attachment I). Funds may be held in the Grant Fund for up to three (3) years. The GFTA will specify the amount of CDBG funds to be transferred from the City to the Grant Fund.
- Cities should be aware that these funds will be used for grant requests, on a firstcome, first-served basis, and that the Community Development Division-Grants Management Unit (CDD-GMU) will determine their availability when the transferring City requests the funds in the future.
- Cities must wait at least one (1) year before requesting return of the funds. If the CDBG Program is terminated, these funds may not be returned to the transferring City.

5.0 GRANT FUND CRITERIA

Cities may apply to receive grant funds under the following conditions:

 Preference will be given to cities that have demonstrated good performance in expending funds and in administering their CDBG Program. A City shall have met its drawdown requirement for at least the last two (2) consecutive years, exclusive of transfers to the Grant Fund by a City to meet their drawdown.

- 2. A City may borrow up to twice its annual allocation, or a minimum of \$25,000, whichever is greater.
- 3. No interest will be charged on grant funds.
- 4. Eligible projects include, but not limited to, the following: construction, rehabilitation (loans or grants), code enforcement, and special economic development (loans or grants) activities. Grant funds will not be available for public service or planning projects.
- 5. The grant application (Attachment II) will be limited to two (2) pages and will be reviewed on a first-come, first-served basis. Cities may submit applications for more than one (1) project, however, they must identify a priority project. In the case of multiple submissions, only one (1) project will be funded. Applications should explain how the project would benefit from the requested additional funds (reduced waiting list, addition of a project component, etc.). Under no circumstances shall projects exceed three (3) years. If funds will be used for a new project, a quarterly expenditure and milestone plan must accompany the application.
- Cities cannot borrow additional CDBG funds until outstanding grants have been paid.

6.0 GRANT APPLICATION PROCESSING

- 1. Grant applications (Attachment II) are to be submitted to Raymond White, Analyst, by e-mail, at Raymond.white@lacdc.org.
- 2. Once an application is received, it will be reviewed by the CDD-GMU management team, with input from the City's Program Manager, the CDD-GMU Budget Analyst, and the City's Reporting Specialist. The City will be notified within 30 days of the acceptance/rejection of its application.
- 3. Grants will continue to be made available until funds are exhausted; Cities will be notified when funds are no longer accessible.
- Cities will also be notified of the estimated amount available after fiscal year closeout.
- 5. Questions may be directed to Mr. White at the above e-mail address or at (626) 586-1756.

7.0 GRANT IMPLEMENTATION

Once an application is approved, the City will be notified by email. The following activities will be required:

- A reimbursable contract amendment (RCA) will be developed for approval by the City and the Community Development Commission (Commission).
- 2. After the RCA is fully executed, the funds will be transferred from the Grant Fund pool to the City's funding pool.
- 3. Grant funds will be included in the City's drawdown requirement calculation.

8.0 REPAYMENT

- 1. Cities that borrow from the Grant Fund may pledge their entire future CDBG allocation toward repayment, depending on the amount borrowed. Grant amounts of \$75,000 or greater may be repaid over a three-year period. A City's annual allocation (or funds returned by closed projects) will be used to repay an outstanding grant. If the grant exceeds a City's annual allocation, the CDBG funds received in subsequent years will be used for repayment until the grant is repaid.
- 2. The following paragraph will be added to the annual reimbursable contract:
 - The <Spell Out Dollar Amount> dollars (<Repayment Amount> set aside for the Revolving Grant Fund repayment will automatically be drawn down by the Commission annually, with no further notice to the Operating Agency, until fully repaid. Any remaining balance after the Revolving Grant Fund repayment will be available for programming and reimbursement.
- A reimbursable contract amendment will be developed for approval by the City and the Commission implementing the transfer of a City's allocation to the Grant Fund (See Attachment III).
- Cities must remain part of the Los Angeles Urban County Program until the grant is repaid.
- 5. If the CDBG Program is terminated, outstanding grant amounts will be forgiven.

BACKGROUND:

- 1. On March 4, 2019, Kosmont Companies, the City's economic development consultant, presented its Downtown San Fernando Economic Development and Asset Analysis in an informational City Council study session. Subsequently, the City Council directed staff to designate the City-owned Parking Lot No. 3 site as a potential development opportunity site.
- On September 24, 2019, the City hosted a Downtown Opportunity Site Community Meeting.
 Feedback from the Community Meeting and related online survey are summarized in a
 Memorandum that is available on the City of San Fernando website at SFCITY.ORG/Economic-Development.
- On December 19, 2019, the City issued a Request for Developer Qualifications ("RFQ") for Parking Lot No. 3 Mixed/Blended-Use Development Opportunity – 1.44 Acres on San Fernando Mission Blvd. and Celis St. to over 200 entertainment and mixed/blended-use developers (available on the City of San Fernando website at SFCITY.ORG/Economic-Development).

- 4. On January 31, 2020, the City received a response to the RFQ from a development team led by Azure, a real estate development corporation, based in Commerce, CA, which was vetted and determined to be a responsible developer that met the qualifications in the RFQ.
- 5. On July 20, 2020, the City Council approved an Exclusive Negotiation Agreement (ENA) (Contract No. 1959) with Azure Development, Inc., for a one-year term, with two six-month options to extend for the purpose of conducting a project feasibility study, and, if feasible, to negotiate a development agreement for the Parking Lot No. 3 opportunity site.
- 6. On February 1, 2021, the City Council received a presentation from Azure regarding the Draft Community Outreach Plan and provided direction.
- 7. In May 2021, Azure began community outreach efforts, which concluded in July 2021.
- 8. On August 16, 2021, the City Council received a presentation summarizing the community outreach responses and the resulting development options from Azure, which included: 1) maximizing housing on the Site, 2) providing a moderate mix of housing and commercial on the Site, and 3) maximizing commercial space on the Site. The City Council directed staff to work with Azure to provide a more detailed development plan and financial feasibility study for each of the three options. The City Council also directed staff to work with Azure to seek additional community input before moving forward on selecting one of the three options.

ANALYSIS:

Overview of the Development Opportunity Site.

Parking Lot No. 3 is an approximately 1.44-acre site owned by the City that is bounded by San Fernando Mission Boulevard to the northwest, Celis St. to the northeast, Pico St. to the southwest, and a set of commercial buildings fronting Maclay Ave. to the southeast. The site lies within the Downtown Residential overlay of the Downtown District of the Corridors Specific Plan ("SP-5") area zone.

While the site is currently being used as a 144-space public parking lot, the City has been interested in redeveloping the surface parking lot through a public-private partnership. As noted in SP-5, "The Downtown District is established for the purpose of creating a lively, mixed-use, transit-oriented 'center of the city' where the community of San Fernando comes together." Accordingly, the City pursued a catalytic blended-use project that develops connections with the main-street shops of the San Fernando Mall along with existing and future transit lines. Through the RFQ process, the City sought a blended-use developer to evaluate development of the site to achieve goals of the Downtown District.

Terms of Exclusive Negotiation Agreement (ENA).

The City and Azure entered into an ENA to establish a specific limited period of time to negotiate regarding the terms of the development of the project on the site. The ENA period requires time to perform project shaping and due diligence work, study feasibility of the project, conduct community outreach and collect community input, and, if feasible, negotiate terms for a binding development agreement for a project to move forward.

City Council Meeting, August 2021.

On August 16, 2021, Azure provided a presentation on the results of the community outreach effort and three development options to the City Council. Azure explained that community outreach efforts involved the following:

- Meeting with stakeholders (San Fernando Chamber of Commerce, Fernandeño Tataviam Band of Mission Indians, Schools, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and other interested community members)
- Meeting with City Departments
- Walking the community twice and collecting 828 surveys (15 mins to complete each).
- Walking through downtown and speaking to business owners.

Based on community input, Azure introduced the project name as "Cielo," increased the proposed size of the commercial component in the mixed-use options to have restaurant and a small format theater fronting San Fernando Mission Blvd, and included a "Tataviam garden" with a water feature.

Three development options were presented to the City Council for consideration and direction in August 2021, as follows:

Option No. 1: A traditional mixed-used project that maximizes housing (47 housing units), commercial/retail space, a small-format theater, and a modest garden area and open space.

Option No. 2: A smaller mixed-use project with modest housing (26 housing units), slightly reduced commercial/retail space (from Option No. 1), a small-format theater, a senior health and wellness center, and increased garden area and open space.

Option No. 3: An all-commercial option, with a small-format theater, restaurant, retail, and open space, with no residential component.

The City Council reviewed the information and requested a financial feasibility study for all three options. All four Councilmembers at the meeting were supportive of having a larger commercial component, with a small-format theater and public open spaces. Three Councilmembers were

supportive of a mixed-used involving both housing and commercial uses (these were reflected in Options 1 and 2 from that meeting), and one Councilmember was supportive of the all commercial option (this was reflected in Option 3 from that meeting). For the mixed-use options, the City Council stated it would like to explore the possibility of restricting housing availability to those who currently work or live in San Fernando. The City Council also indicated that it would like to see more community outreach before moving forward with selecting one of the three options.

Development Options.

Since City Council's review and input, Azure has designed/refined three development options to address the comments received from the community outreach and City Council meeting in August 2021.

Option 1 – Mixed-Use with 47 Housing Unit

Proposed Option 1 is a mixed-use development with 47 housing units and approximately 14,100 square feet (sq. ft.) of commercial space designed for a food hall (also referred to as public market) and a small-format theater with approximately a 100-seat capacity. These commercial spaces will front San Fernando Mission Blvd. and Celis St. Approximately 3,835 sq. ft. of public open space will be located at the corner of the commercial frontage (San Fernando Mission Blvd. and Celis St.). Additionally, approximately 6,000 sq. ft. of open space will be provided for residential amenities, which will only be available to the residents and their guests. Private open spaces such as private patios, decks, and balconies will also be provided to residential units, which will total approximately 3,525 sq. ft.

All 47 housing units will be available to low-income and moderate-income households, which qualifies this option as an affordable housing project under the State Density Bonus law. This option proposes 15 units (32% of total units) restricted to low-income households and 32 units (68% of total units) restricted to moderate-income households. Based on the 32% of total units restricted for low-income households, this option qualifies for three "incentives or concessions" that could be used to deviate from development standards (e.g., height, setbacks, open space, etc.) in Specific Plan 5 (SP 5). Also, this development option can only be required to meet the residential parking standards under state law, which is 0.5 space per unit, because the site is located within ½ mile to a major transit stop. Azure is not requesting a density increase. But, could request the incentives or concessions and State law parking standards.

The incentives or concessions allows Azure to design a two-level parking structure because one of the three incentives or concessions can be used to waive the a development standard in SP 5 that requires a ground floor height of 18 feet minimum. A two-level parking structure will accommodate 342 parking spaces, which will replace the existing 144 public parking spaces, meet the parking requirement under SP 5 for both commercial and residential, and have an extra 37 parking spaces for public use. Under SP 5, this option is required to provide 58 spaces for commercial parking and 103 spaces for residential parking. However, under State Density Bonus

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law, this option is only required to provide a total of 24 parking spaces for the residential component, which is 79 spaces less than what is required under SP 5.

Option 2 – Mixed-Use with 26 Housing Unit

Option 2 is a mixed-use development with 26 housing units and approximately 12,325 sq. ft. of commercial spaces designed for a food hall, a small-format theater with approximately a 100-seat capacity, a beer garden, and a wellness center. The commercial spaces will front on all three public street surrounding the project site (San Fernando Mission Blvd., Celis St., and Pico St.) A courtyard design of approximately 5,615 sq. ft. of open space for public use will be provided in the center of the commercial component. Approximately 17,000 sq. ft. of open space will provided for the residential amenities, plus a total of 1,950 sq. ft. private open space (e.g., decks, patios, balconies).

Just as with Option 1, this Option 2 qualifies as an affordable housing project and is entitled to the same amount of incentives/concessions and parking allowed under the State Density Bonus law. This option will provide a total of 26 affordable housing units with 10 units (38%) restricted to low-income households and 16 units (62%) restricted to moderate-income households.

A two-level parking structure will accommodate 260 parking spaces, which will replace the existing 144 public parking spaces, plus 58 spaces for commercial parking and 57 spaces for residential parking which are required by SP 5, plus one extra public parking space. Under State Density Bonus law, this option is only required to provide a total of 13 parking spaces for residential use, which is 44 spaces less than what is required under SP 5.

Option 3 – All Commercial

Option 3 is an all commercial development with no residential component. Approximately 12,800 sq. ft. of commercial space will be used for a food hall, a small-format theater with an approximate 100-seat capacity, a beer garden, a wellness center, and a social service center. The commercial uses will front on all three streets. Public open spaces of approximately 15,000 sq. ft. will be provided through the site.

A total of 213 parking spaces are required, based on 69 spaces required for commercial uses and replacing the existing 144 public parking spaces. A two-level parking structure is also proposed for this option and it will accommodate a total of 153 parking spaces, which will not fully replace the existing public parking spaces. This option will be short 60 public parking spaces.

Also, this option does not qualify for any incentives/concessions because it does not include affordable housing. Therefore, development of a two-story parking structure would require approval of a variance from the Planning and Preservation Commission.

Financial Analysis.

A financial analysis of the three options was conducted by Azure and was reviewed by Kosmont. A summary table for each option is provided in Attachment "A".

The option with the least financial impact to the City would be Option 1. Option 1 would not need any financial contribution from the City. Also, it would provide an opportunity for the City to receive approximately \$4.7 million from a CalHome grant from the State that could be used to help low- and very low-income households with first-time homebuyers or home rehabilitation loans.

Option 2 would require the City to contribute \$1.2 million that could be funded from the City's Housing Fund. The cash balance in the City's Housing Fund as of the end of 2021 is \$2.16 million, which is currently available to use for low income housing activities. An additional \$1.0 million will be added to the City's Housing Fund when homeowners repay the loans from the City's existing home loan programs. Option 2 would also give the City an opportunity to receive approximately \$2.6 million through a CalHome grant.

Option 3 would have the most financial impact to the City's budget. This option would require the City contribute \$10.6 million in subsidies or bonds.

BUDGET IMPACT:

There is no budget impact for discussing this item. Azure is responsible for all costs related to designing all three options, and is responsible for reimbursing the City for staff and consultant for up to \$25,000 in costs related to the ENA.

CONCLUSION:

Staff recommends that the City Council receive and file the presentation on the progress of the three options, and continue the discussion and direction for all options to the City Council meeting in April 2022, or a later date to provide time for Azure to do further outreach.








SAMPLE TOWNHOME FLOOR PLAN





MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

(Parties: City of San Fernando and Pueblo Y Salud, Inc.)

THIS COOPERATIVE USE AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered by and between Pueblo Y Salud, Inc., a non-profit organization (hereinafter referred to as "PYS") and CITY OF SAN FERNANDO, a California municipal corporation (hereinafter referred to as the "City"). For purposes of this Agreement the capitalized term "Parties" may refer to either PYS or City. The capitalized term "Party" may refer to either PYS or City interchangeably.

RECITALS

This AGREEMENT is made and entered into with respect to the following facts:

WHEREAS, PYS and the City are entering into this Agreement for the purposes of providing community programming, events, and fundraising efforts, respectively; and

WHEREAS, PYS is the lead agency and fiscal agent for the César E. Chávez Commemoration Committee; and

WHEREAS, the César E. Chávez Commemoration Committee has taken an active role in the inception, design, and previous fundraising efforts for construction of the César E. Chávez Memorial; and

WHEREAS, the City owns and operates Recreation Park located at 208 Park Ave. and the César E. Chávez Memorial, located on Truman St. (APN 2522-034-900), in the City of San Fernando (the "Park Facilities"); and

WHEREAS, PYS has submitted to City a proposal to provide public programming and restoration efforts at the César E. Chávez Memorial, attached hereto as Exhibit "A" (the "Proposal"); and

WHEREAS, PYS represents to City that based upon its experience, its ability to exert influence over community members to support the César E. Chávez Memorial and to mobilize community members to serve as coordinators and volunteers, PYS is an appropriate entity to provide such Public Programs at the Park Facilities.

WHEREAS, City has determined that a Memorandum of Understanding for the public programming at Park Facilities and restoration efforts of the César E. Chávez Memorial by PYS will maximize and enhance the community benefit of the facility by enhancing the aesthetics, public safety, and providing residents access to quality programming/events not offered in the City and compliment the efforts of the César E. Chávez Memorial; and

WHEREAS, PYS and City seek a collaborative relationship to provide public programming at Park Facilities and restoration efforts at the César E. Chávez Memorial subject to certain modifications and refinements under this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants and conditions contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Term.</u> The term of this Agreement shall be Three (3) years, commencing September 15, 2014 and ending September 14, 2017.
- 2. <u>Park Ownership</u>. This Agreement shall not be read to inhibit the ability of City to exercise its rights, or to relinquish City from its responsibilities, as regards to ownership of the Park Facilities. PYS agrees it has no rights or obligations related to ownership of, or the contents inside, the Park Facilities.
- 3. <u>City Facilities Access.</u> City shall grant PYS access to the Park Facilities i.e. multi-purpose room, banquet room, classroom, clubrooms, gyms and green space for purposes of conducting Public Programs/events, fundraising efforts, assisting City in maintenance of the Cesar E. Chavez Memorial, conducting memorial cleanups with volunteers, and/or other activities conducive to reflecting the legacy of César E. Chávez and other cultural events within the Park Facilities and preserving the Park Facilities as a clean and safe public environment.

4. Public Programs and PYS-Sponsored Events.

- i. Commencing October 1, 2014, PYS shall provide to the Director of Recreation and Community Services (the "Director"), for his or her approval, a calendar of proposed Public Programs and PYS-Sponsored Events ("proposed programming schedule") for the three (3) month period of October 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014, and provide a new proposed programming schedule for each subsequent three (3) month period within thirty (30) days prior to the start of the proposed programming schedule.
- ii. PYS proposed programming schedule shall be consistent with Park Facilities policies and guidelines as identified in Article I of Chapter 54 of the San Fernando City Code and the Park's public purposes.
- iii. Within fifteen (15) calendar days of receipt of PYS's proposed programming schedule, the Director shall provide PYS with notice of approval of the proposed programming schedule, any City proposed changes to the proposed programming schedule, and/or any Park Facilities scheduling conflicts.
- iv. City shall provide PYS reasonable priority use of the Park Facilities upon receipt and approval of a proposed programming schedule.
- v. The availability of the Park Facilities for use by PYS for Public Programs and PYS-Sponsored Events shall remain subject to prior approved and reserved uses of the Park Facilities.
- vi. City retains first priority of use the Park Facilities for City sponsored or cosponsored events.
- vii. City reserves the right to impose additional requirements for Public Programs and PYS-Sponsored Events, including, without limitation, insurance requirements and requirements as identified in Chapter 54 ("Parks and

- Recreation") of the San Fernando City Code, as deemed necessary to protect the health, safety, and/or welfare of the community.
- viii. PYS shall not use City's name to suggest endorsement or sponsorship of Public Programs or PYS-Sponsored Events without prior approval of the City Manager.
- ix. PYS shall use the Park Facilities in accordance with Federal, State, and local laws and regulations.
- x. PYS and City shall conduct a walk-through of the Park Facilities immediately prior to the stall of the first Public Program or PYS-Sponsored Event approved under this Agreement and once every twelve (12) months thereafter. During the walkthrough, PYS and City shall complete a checklist detailing the condition and contents of the Park Facilities ("walk-through checklist"). At the end of each approved Public Program or PYS-Sponsored Event, PYS shall return the Park Facilities to the condition described in the walk-through checklist. PYS shall take full financial responsibility for any damage to the Park Facilities or loss of contents, as detailed in the walk-through, checklist that occurs as a result of PYS use of the Park Facilities and will be required to pay for same based on the current cost of repair or replacement.
- xi. The Director, in his or her sole discretion, may require a certain number of security officers for a Public Program or PYS-Sponsored Event. PYS shall be responsible for procuring and paying for security officers.

5. Fees.

- i. City shall waive park rental fees, permit fees, and/or deposits for use of the Park Facilities for Public Programs and PYS-Sponsored Events that provide services to the Park Facilities for which specific knowledge of the legacy of César E. Chávez is required.
- PYS shall compensate the City for any city staff they may be required to assist with the implementation and/or clean-up of any Public Programs and PYS-Sponsored Events.
- 6. <u>Memorial Restoration</u>. PYS shall provide the City with expertise on restoration efforts for the César E. Chávez Memorial.
 - i. PYS shall coordinate with the City to identify components of the César E. Chávez Memorial that are in need of repair and/or improvements.
 - ii. PYS shall seek recommendations/guidelines regarding the identified improvement at the César E. Chávez Memorial.
 - iii. City shall provide PYS with specifications for all material identified for replacement and/or installation.

- iv. PYS shall assist the City by researching potential improvement material and costs of material.
- v. The City shall have the final decision for any restorations at the César E. Chávez Memorial.
- 7. <u>Fundraising</u>. PYS shall conduct periodical fundraisers as needed to provide funding for educational programs specific to the legacy of César E. Chávez and/or restoration efforts of the César E. Chávez Memorial.
 - i. PYS shall conduct a fundraiser in year one (1) of this agreement specific to restoring the César E. Chávez Memorial, which include: a.) revitalizing of the mural; b.) replacement of the bronze plaques.
 - 1. PYS shall assume the lead of fundraising efforts and fiduciary agent for all funds collected for restoration of the César E. Chávez Memorial. Fiscal responsibilities shall include processing checks, purchase orders, disbursement of funds, and appropriate subcontracts with consultants and vendors for material and labor costs as directed by City of San Fernando. Fiscal reports on the distribution of funds will be provided as needed by City of San Fernando. PYS will complete all required financial reports within 10-business days of request.
 - 2. At the direction of City of San Fernando, PYS will obtain any necessary approvals to move funds or add line items to the budget as directed by City of San Fernando..
 - 3. PYS will have the right to decline City of San Fernando projects that may not be in alignment with the PYS Vision or Mission, are not part of restoration of the César E. Chávez Memorial, and/or in those instances where PYS is planning to apply to the same funder and therefore may create a conflict of interest.
 - 4. The PYS Director must have the approval of the PYS Board of Directors to assume the role of lead fundraising and fiduciary agent for all funds collected for restoration of the César E. Chávez Memorial.
 - PYS shall apply for grants and/or conduct fundraisers for educational programs specific to the legacy of César E. Chávez and/or maintenance of the César E. Chávez Memorial.
 - iii. The City shall apply for grants for educational programs specific to the legacy of César E. Chávez and/or maintenance of the César E. Chávez Memorial.
- 8. <u>Maintenance/Clean-up</u>. PYS shall coordinate with the Director for Clean-up efforts at the César E. Chávez Memorial.

- 9. <u>Indemnification</u>. Each Party shall be responsible for any personal injury or property damage which occurs as a result of their use of the other's facilities. Without limitation of the foregoing, each Party agrees to protect, indemnify, defend and hold the other Party and its elected officials, officers, employees, attorneys, contractors, volunteers and agents (collectively, the "Indemnitees"), free and harmless from and against (collectively, "Indemnify") any and all claims, causes of action, demands, damages, liens, liabilities, losses, costs and expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs of litigation) (collectively, "Losses") that the Indemnitees may suffer or incur (as determined by final arbitration or court decision or by the agreement of the Parties, except that an indemnifying Party's duty to defend the Indemnitees pursuant to this Section does not require any prior determination by final arbitration or court decision or agreement of the Parties) to the extent that such Losses are a result of (a) the negligence or willful misconduct of the indemnifying Party at the other Party's facilities and/or in the use of equipment by the indemnifying Party, or (b) the failure of the indemnifying Party to comply with the terms of this Agreement, in each case to the fullest extent permitted by law. A Party shall have no duty to Indemnify the Indemnitees (and the Indemnitees shall be liable to the other Party to the extent otherwise liable under applicable law) to the extent that any Losses are caused by the negligence or willful misconduct of the Indemnitees, or by the failure of the Indemnitees to comply with the terms of this Agreement, provided such willful misconduct or negligence is determined by agreement between the Parties or by arbitration or by a court of competent jurisdiction.
- 10. <u>Insurance</u>. PYS shall obtain and maintain, at sole cost and expense, comprehensive liability and property damage coverage, insuring against claims for injuries to persons and property occurring in, upon or about Park Facilities (as a result of the PYS use of such City Facilities hereunder) that has a limit of liability, per occurrence and aggregate, of not less than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) for injuries to person or persons, and not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) for property damage.
 - A. Such coverage shall (a) name the City and City's elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, agents and volunteers as additional insured, (b) contain a provision that the policy will not be cancelled without at least thirty (30) days' prior notice to the City, (c) provide that coverage afforded thereby will be primary and that any coverage carried by the City shall be noncontributing with respect thereto, and (d) contain a waiver of any right of subrogation against the City that arises, or might arise, by reason of any payment under such policy or by reason of any act or omission of the City.
 - B. PYS shall provide the City with a certificate of insurance evidencing such coverage no later than the seven (7) calendar days prior to the first scheduled use of City Facilities under this Agreement.

11. Termination.

A. Section 1 of this Agreement notwithstanding, the City may terminate this Agreement at any time upon five (15) days prior written notice to PYS. PYS may terminate this Agreement at any time upon thirty (30) days' prior written notice to City.

B. Notwithstanding the issuance by either Party of written notice to terminate this Agreement pursuant to Section 9(A), the Parties shall continue to be bound by the terms and conditions of this Agreement up to the effective date of any termination for convenience. Each Party reserves the right to rescind any notice of intent to terminate for convenience prior to the effective date of any such termination.

12. Miscellaneous Provisions.

- A. <u>Non-Liability of Officials</u>. No elected or appointed official, officer, employee, agent or volunteer of Parties shall be personally liable for any amounts due hereunder, and no judgment or execution thereon entered in any action hereon, shall be personally enforced against any such elected or appointed official, officer, employee, agent or volunteer.
- B. <u>Representatives</u>. The City's Representative shall be the City Manager. PYS's Representative shall be the Executive Director. Notice to Party's Representative shall be considered notice to the Party.
- C. <u>Communications.</u> Parties shall regularly review, and address concerns, responsibilities and other issues surrounding, proposed times of use of facilities.
- D. <u>Assignments</u>. No Party shall assign this Agreement or any right or privilege any Party may have under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other Party.
- E. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. This Agreement shall be binding on all the successors and assigns of the Parties.
- F. Governing Law/Venue. The Agreement shall be interpreted and governed according to the laws of the State of California. In the event of litigation between the Parties, venue, without exception, shall be in the Los Angeles County Superior Court of the State of California. If, and only if, applicable law requires that all or part of any such litigation be tried exclusively in federal court, venue, without exception, shall be in the State of California locating in the City of Los Angeles, California.
- G. Records. Parties shall keep a record of use and mutually review this data annually.
- H. Notice. Any notice, request, direction, instruction, demand, consent, waiver, approval or other communication required or permitted to be given hereunder shall not be effective unless it is given in writing and delivered (a) in person, (b) by certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, (c) by facsimile, or (d) by a commercial overnight courier that guarantees next day delivery and provides a receipt, and addressed to the parties at the addresses stated below, or at such other address as either party may hereafter notify the other in writing as aforementioned:

- I. Service of any such notice or other communications so made shall be deemed effective on the day of actual delivery (whether accepted or refused), as evidenced by confirmed answerback if by facsimile (provided that if any notice or other communication to be delivered by facsimile is unable to be transmitted because of a problem affecting the receiving party's facsimile machine, the deadline for receiving such notice or other communication shall be extended through the next business day), as shown by the addressee's return receipt if by certified mail, and as confirmed by the courier service if by courier; provided, however, that if such actual delivery occurs after 5:00 p.m. (local time where received) or on a non-business day, then such notice or demand so made shall be deemed effective on the first business day immediately following the day of actual delivery. No communications via electronic mail shall be effective to give any notice, request, direction, demand, consent, waiver, approval or other communications hereunder.
- J. Attorney's fees. In the event that legal action is necessary to enforce the provisions of this Agreement, the parties agree that the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover attorney's fees from the opposing party in any amount determined by the court or arbitrator to be reasonable.
- K. <u>Construction of Agreement</u>. This Agreement shall not be construed in favor of, or against, either Party but shall be construed as if the Parties prepared this Agreement together through a process of negotiation and with the advice of their respective attorneys.
- L. <u>Ambiguities</u>. The doctrine that any ambiguity contained in a contract shall be construed against the party whose counsel has drafted the contract is expressly waived by each of the Parties hereto with respect to this Agreement.
- M. <u>Captions</u>. Captions and paragraph headings used in this Agreement are for convenience of reference only and shall not be used in construing any part of this Agreement.
- N. No Third Party Benefit. This Agreement is made solely for the benefit of the parties to this Agreement and their respective successors and assigns, and no other person or entity shall have or acquire any right by virtue of this Agreement.

- O. <u>Severability</u>. If any portion of this Agreement is declared invalid, illegal, or otherwise unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect.
- P. Effect of Waiver. No waiver of a breach of any provision of this Agreement by either party shall constitute a waiver of any other breach of the same provision or any other provision of this Agreement. Failure of either Party to enforce at any time, or from time to time, any provision of this Agreement, shall not be construed as a waiver of such provision or breach. The remedies herein reserved shall be cumulative and additional to any other remedies in law or equity.
- Q. Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between Kadima and the City with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior offers and negotiations, oral and written. This Agreement may not be amended or modified in any respect whatsoever except by an instrument in writing duly signed and delivered by Kadima and the City.
- R. <u>Amendment or Modification</u>. No amendment, modification or supplement of this Agreement shall be valid or binding unless executed in writing and signed by both Parties, subject to City approval. The requirement for written amendments, modifications or supplements cannot be waived and any attempted waiver shall be void and invalid.
- S. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which so executed shall be deemed an original irrespective of the date of the execution, and such counterparts shall together constitute one and the same agreement.
- T. <u>Authority</u>. The persons signing below represent and warrant that this Agreement has been duly approved by the governing body of each signatory's respective public agency entity and they have authority to enter into this Agreement on behalf of the public agency entities for which they are signing this Agreement.

OVERVIEW

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The City of San Fernando has recognized Chavez's impact to promote justice and equality for all Americans by becoming the first in the nation to designate his birthday, March 31, as an official holiday. In 2004, the Historic and Visionary City of San Fernando continued to support the legacy of Cesar Chavez through the creation of the largest Cesar Chavez Memorial in the nation. The memorial is the largest of its kind in the Nation and the construction of this memorial was the culmination of efforts by between the CCCC and the City of San Fernando. The Cesar E. Chavez Commemorative Committee (CCCC) of the San Fernando Valley is formally requesting to reestablish a beneficial working relationship with the City of San Fernando by collaborating on a strategic plan that celebrates the legacy of the late Cesar Chavez.

FROM LOT WILL

The project will consist of organizing a 3-year partnership with the City of San Fernando to honor and celebrate the accomplishments of Cesar Chavez by establishing collaborative efforts that include: 1.) Restoring the Cesar Chavez Memorial, 2.) Celebrating the 10 year anniversary of the Cesar Chavez Memorial Dedication, 3.) Reestablish the Cesar Chavez March in the City of San Fernando. In addition, considering the economic situation of the city this proposal is designed to be a cost-neutral project.

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Due to unfortunate acts of vandalism to the monument, a number of the sponsorship plaques have been stolen. - City to provide CCCC permission to fundraise monies to revitalize the memorial by selling bricks to fund annual maintenance costs.
- City to establish a city account specifically for memorial maintenance revenue that is restricted from other use and safely secured.

The CCCC would like to celebrate the 10-year anniversary of the memorial dedication by requesting from the city the following:

Chavez Commemorative Committee The original proposal asked to establish a three year partnership between Pueblo y Salud, Inc. /Cesar Cesar E. Chavez Commemorative Committee (PYS/CCCC) and the City of San Fernando to honor and celebrate the accomplishments of Cesar E. Chavez by establishing a collaborative effort to: 1.) Restore the Cesar E. Chavez Memorial 2.) Celebrate the 10th year anniversary of the Memorial Dedication. 3.) Reestablish the Cesar E. Chavez March for Justice in the City of San Fernando.

After assessing the vandalism damage, needed repairs, lack of maintenance and total cost, there have been discussions amongst the Park Director, Ismael Aguila and several members of the CCCC, it was concluded that the work could be carried out at minimal cost to the city but we would have to leave out deliverable num. 3.) The Cesar E. Chavez March for Justice for this coming year (2015) and request that the city reconsider it for the following year (2016). The reasoning being that the City of San Fernando would be in a better financial position to pay for a part of the cost for the March at that time. As to the two remaining deliverables originally proposed, PyS/CCCC would still like to move forward as requested in the following order of priority 1.) Rehabilitate the Cesar E. Chavez Memorial by October 20, 2014 and 2.) Celebrate the 10-year anniversary of the memorial on October 22, 2014. The Projected cost for the repairs is:

D. Labor cost	\$ 3,000
C. Replacement, 14 Stolen Plaques	\$ 1,400
B. Mural Re-coat	\$ 2,000
A Mural Restoration	\$ 9,000

We believe that PyS/CCCC can raise most of the money to cover the cost of the repairs by selling engraved bricks, as was done when the memorial was built. Therefore, we request authorization to place the bricks, which will be sold, at the memorial and the City, to also, authorize access to the memorial and a small portion of San Fernando Recreation Center (area closest to the memorial) to have the tenth year celebration of the memorial dedication on October 22, 2014. We also ask that the City contribute to the effort with in kind contribution and cost if we fall short in our fund raising effort.
