Subject: March 2023 Notable Police Department Events and Activities

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Transportation and Public Safety (TPS) Commission receive and file this informational report.

BACKGROUND:

Each month at the City of San Fernando Transportation and Public Safety Commission meeting, the Police Department submits and provides the governing board a brief overview of the previous month's community engagement activities, noteworthy incidents, and proactive enforcement.

ANALYSIS:

The San Fernando Police Department has recently heightened and further integrated its community profile in three major areas: Community Engagement, Proactive Enforcement and Quality of Life Enhancements.

For the month of March, the San Fernando Police Department (SFPD) has the following activities and incidents to report:

Community Engagement:

- 1. On Wednesday, March 1, the SFPD held the final session of its Parent Academy hosted at Santa Rosa Catholic School. The topic covered during the final session included teen dating, drug and gang prevention, and mental health.
- 2. On Friday, March 3, San Fernando Police Chief Valdez attended the Chamber of Commerce mixer at Bodevi Wine and Espresso Bar.

- 3. On Saturday, March 4, SFPD Officers escorted teams from the Mission City Baseball throughout the City during a parade procession, which culminated at Las Palmas Park, where Mayor Celeste Rodriguez and Chief Fabian Valdez threw the ceremonial first pitch.
- 4. On Sunday, March 5, SFPD Officers gave a tour of the station to approximately 40 Boy Scouts and their parents.

Notable Events/Proactive Enforcement:

- 1. On Saturday, March 4, at approximately 12:40 PM, SFPD Officers responded to a vandalism-in-progress in the area of Hollister Street and Brand Boulevard. The officers located and detained the subject associated with the vandalism. The subject was later arrested and booked at the SFPD Jail.
- 2. On Sunday, March 5, at about 9 PM, SFPD Officers initiated a traffic stop in the area of Hubbard Street and Frank Modugno Drive. During their investigation, officers discovered the driver had multiple outstanding arrest warrants. The driver was arrested and later booked at the SFPD jail.
- 3. On Tuesday, March 7, at approximately 10:14 AM, SFPD Dispatch received a 911 call about a man floating down the Pacoima Wash at Fourth Street. Several SFPD units responded to the Pacoima Wash at San Fernando Road, Laurel Canyon and at Paxton Park. The man had passed San Fernando Road and stopped under the Laurel Canyon overpass where he stood under the overpass on the flat concrete shelf and yelled for help. SFPD Officers requested assistance from Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD) and descended into the wash, where they advised the man to hold still, while reassuring him the fire department was en route. To prevent the man from losing his footing, officers deployed their life rings and secured the rope to a stationary pole. Approximately 10 minutes later, LAFD arrived on scene with two helicopters and four rescue vehicles. LAFD's Swift Water Rescue Team secured the man, and paramedics treated him for hypothermia.
- 4. On Thursday, March 9, around 10:20 PM, an SFPD Officer conducted a traffic stop near Maclay Avenue and Truman Street. Upon contacting and identifying the driver, the officer learned the driver had an outstanding warrant for his arrest and possessed narcotics and paraphernalia. The subject was arrested.
- 5. On Saturday, March 11, SFPD Detectives conducted a Shoulder Tap Decoy Operation from 12:00 PM to 6 PM. One male adult purchased alcoholic beverages for a minor decoy and received a misdemeanor citation for furnishing alcohol to a minor.

- 6. On Friday, March 17, at about 10:10 AM, SFPD Officers conducted a traffic enforcement stop at 200 Park Avenue. They arrested the driver for three warrants. The driver's vehicle was impounded.
- 7. On Friday, March 17, 2023, at 10:19 AM, SFPD was dispatched to the 900 Block of Maclay Avenue to investigate a violent robbery and attack on an elderly person. The suspect approached the victim from behind and stole a bag from the victim's hands. When the victim resisted the theft of his property, the suspect struck the victim in the face, causing him to fall to the ground. The suspect then kicked the victim in the face at least once. A Good Samaritan stepped in to stop the attack and the suspect left the scene. Video footage of the robbery was posted on social media and aired on local media outlets. A few days later, a community member who recognized the suspect notified the SFPD of the suspect's whereabouts. The suspect was later arrested by SFPD and charged with multiple crimes, including robbery, assault with a deadly weapon, and being in violation of his parole.
- 8. On Saturday, March 18, at 11:50 PM, SFPD officers smelled and observed smoke coming from under the overpass at Fourth Street and Pacoima Wash. SFPD officers checked the area and located a subject who was warming himself with a small fire under the bridge. The officer learned that there were multiple outstanding felony warrants for the subject and later arrested him without incident.
- 9. On Sunday, March 19, at approximately 7:15 AM, SFPD received an alarm activation at 208 Park Ave. The area of activation was in the recreation room of the building adjacent to the community pool. Responding SFPD officers saw a man exiting a rear door with a cardboard box in his hands. The suspect told officers that he was just using the restroom and attempted to leave the park. SFPD detained him and conducted a search of the recreation facility. They discovered that the art room had been ransacked, then checked the suspect and found art supplies matching those in the art room on his person and in the box he had been carrying. The suspect was arrested for burglary. The art supplies were photographed and returned to the recreation art room.
- 10. On March 22, 2023, SFPD participated in active shooter training with the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department at the Metrolink Keller Yard in the City of Los Angeles. The Officers participated in a variety of exercises on a passenger train using live-fire simunitions. This was a unique opportunity for the officers, who were able to practice realistic tactics, thereby better preparing themselves for any future potential active shooter situations.

Quality of Life Enhancements:

1. On March 1, 2023, the SFPD conducted Homeless Outreach Operations. Officers contacted five individuals experiencing homelessness and referred them to Los Angeles Family Housing

for services. Combatting homelessness is a top priority of the SFPD. Outreach Operations are conducted every two weeks.

BUDGET IMPACT:

There is no budget impact associated with receiving this informational report and providing comment to the TPS Commission.

Subject: Informational Presentation and Update on AB 481 Military Equipment Policy

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Transportation and Public Safety (TPS) Commission receive and file this informational report.

BACKGROUND:

- 1. On September 30, 2021, Governor Gavin Newsom signed into law Assembly Bill 481 (AB 481), relating to the use of "military equipment" by law enforcement agencies in California.
- AB 481 seeks to provide transparency, oversight, and opportunity for meaningful public input on decisions regarding whether and how military equipment is funded, acquired, and used by law enforcement agencies.
- 3. AB 481 requires law enforcement agencies to obtain authorization from their governing bodies, via adoption of a military equipment use policy via ordinance, thus approving the military equipment. The governing body as defined under law for the City is the San Fernando City Council.
- 4. Once the military equipment use policy is adopted via ordinance, AB 481 requires law enforcement agencies to submit an annual report to their respective governing bodies within one year of approval, and then annually for as long as the military equipment is available for use.

ANALYSIS:

The San Fernando Police Department (SFPD) is committed to community safety and uses various tools and equipment to safeguard the community. Like many other agencies throughout the nation, SFPD utilizes some of the items defined by AB 481 as military equipment. These items provide officers with the critical tools and the ability to safely resolve dynamic and volatile

situations that may rise to the level of a lethal encounter. Possession of this equipment and meeting the reporting requirements of AB 481 comply with the Department's Use of Force policy.

The term "military equipment," as used in AB 481, does not necessarily indicate equipment that has been used or provided by the military. The SFPD has not acquired surplus military equipment in the past 12 calendar months.

Pursuant to AB 481 reporting requirements, the following is a summary of the military equipment currently in use by the SFPD.

1. Specialized Firearms and Ammunition

This equipment is to be used to address potentially deadly threats with more precision, handle close-quarter situations/confined spaces, and/or deployment at greater distance than a handgun. According to State and Federal law, SFPD's policy is to utilize the equipment only for official law enforcement purposes. Those operating the following equipment receive POST certified training and complete annual training to maintain certification.

a. Colt AR-15 M4 Carbine Rifles (4)

i. Acquisition Cost: \$5,600

ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$1,000.

b. Submachine Guns (8)

i. Acquisition Cost: \$3,000ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$2,000

c. Sniper Rifles (2)

i. Acquisition Cost: \$16,400ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$2,000

d. .308 Winchester 168 Grain Rifle Cartridges (5,000)

i. Acquisition Cost: \$11,000ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$10,000

2. PepperBall Launcher and Projectiles

The purpose of this non-lethal equipment is de-escalation of conflict where lethal force is prohibited or undesirable. Situations where this equipment may be deployed include dealing with combative individuals, riots or civil unrest, potentially vicious or dangerous animals, and training exercises or demonstrations. In accordance with State and Federal law, SFPD's policy is to utilize the equipment only for official law enforcement purposes. Only those trained as operators or instructors or designated by the Chief of Police are authorized to use the PepperBall system.

a. PepperBall Launcher (6)

i. Acquisition Cost: \$7,500
ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$2,000
b. PepperBall Live Projectile (3,000)
i. Acquisition Cost: \$6,824
ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$6,824

3. Tear Gas

The SFPD uses non-lethal chemical agent munitions to limit the escalation of conflict where use of lethal force is prohibited or undesirable. Situations in which this equipment may be used include dealing with combative individuals, riots or civil unrest, potentially vicious or dangerous animals, and training exercises or demonstrations.

In accordance with State and Federal law, SFPD's policy is to utilize the equipment only for official law enforcement purposes. Only those who are POST certified or designated by the Chief of Police are authorized to use this equipment.

a. CS Direct Impact 40mm Munition (50)

i. Acquisition Cost: \$1,550ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$1,550

b. CS Spede-Heat Long Range 40mm Munitions (40)

i. Acquisition Cost: \$885ii. Annual Cost: 0-\$885c. CS Ferret 40mm Munitions (20)

d. CS Muzzle Blast 40mm Munitions (10)

4. Projectile Launcher Platforms and Associated Munitions

The San Fernando Police Department uses non-lethal kinetic energy weapons to limit the escalation of conflict where use of lethal force is prohibited or undesirable. Situations in which this equipment may be used include dealing with combative individuals, riots or

civil unrest, potentially vicious or dangerous animals, and training exercises or demonstrations. According to State and Federal law, SFPD's policy is to utilize the equipment only for official law enforcement purposes. Only those who are POST certified or designated by the Chief of Police are authorized to use this equipment.

a. Tactical 40mm Single Shot Launcher (8)

i. Acquisition Cost: \$10,000ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$2,000

b. Multiple Shot 4mm Tactical 4-Shot Launcher (2)

i. Acquisition Cost: \$4,000ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$2,000

c. Bean Bag Shotgun (8)

i. Acquisition Cost: \$8,000ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$1,000

d. Exact Impact 4mm Sponge Munition (250)

i. Acquisition Cost: \$4,800ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$4,800

e. Bean Bag 4mm Munition (80)

i. Acquisition Cost: \$2,000ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$2,000

f. Stinger 4mm 60-Caliber Munition (50)

i. Acquisition: \$1,500ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$1,500

g. Bean Bag 12 Gauge Munition (800)

i. Acquisition Cost: \$4,000

ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$4,000 h. Rubber Ball Stinger 12 Gauge (60)

i. Acquisition Cost: \$360ii. Annual Cost: \$0-\$360

Although deployed as an option during certain occasions, none of the aforementioned equipment was actually used during the period of May 2022 through March 29, 2023. The Department is providing this disclosure pursuant to the requirements of AB 481.

In addition, the Department has not received any complaints or concerns about the aforementioned equipment. Nor does the Department foresee the acquisition of any additional military equipment at this time.

BUDGET IMPACT:

There is no budget impact associated with receiving this informational report and providing comment to the TPS Commission.
