OFFICE OF TRAFFIC SAFETY AWARDS \$74,000 GRANT TO THE SAN FERNANDO POLICE DEPARTMENT FOR TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM TO INCREASE SAFETY ON ROADS

SAN FERNANDO, CA – The San Fernando Police Department (SFPD) announced today that it has received a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) to support its ongoing enforcement and education programs to help reduce the number of serious injuries and deaths on our roads. The grant program runs through September 2025.

"We are grateful to receive this grant, which will strengthen our traffic enforcement efforts and improve road safety," SFPD Commander CJ Chiasson said. "By increasing enforcement of traffic laws and focusing on high-risk areas, we aim to reduce dangerous driving behaviors, prevent crashes, and make our roads safer for everyone."

The grant will provide additional programs and resources, including:

- DUI checkpoints and patrols focused on stopping suspected impaired drivers.
- High-visibility distracted driving enforcement operations targeting drivers in violation of California's hands-free cell phone law.
- Enforcement operations focused on the most dangerous driver behaviors that put the safety of people biking or walking at risk.
- Enforcement operations focused on top violations that cause crashes: speeding, failure to yield, stop sign and/or red-light running, and improper turning or lane changes.
