Subject: Annual Reorganization of the Commission – Selection of Chair and Vice Chair

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Transportation and Public Safety Commission proceed with its annual reorganization of the Commission and the selection of its Chair and Vice Chair

BACKGROUND:

1. The Transportation and Public Safety Commission is composed of five members – each appointed by a different councilmember.
2. Each year, the members shall elect a Chair and Vice Chair per Municipal Code 1957, § 13.25, Section 90-71 (Attachment “A”).

ANALYSIS:

In accordance with Municipal Code 1957, § 13.25, Section 90.71, the Traffic and Public Safety Commission shall meet annually to choose one of its members as Chair and another of its members as Vice Chair. The terms of office of the Chair and Vice Mayor shall be for one year.

BUDGET IMPACT:

There is no budget impact associated with the annual reorganization of the Transportation and Public Safety Commission.

CONCLUSION:

Staff recommends that the Transportation and Public Safety Commission select a Chair and Vice Chair in accordance with Municipal Code 1957, §13.25, Section 90.71.

ATTACHMENT:

- A. Municipal Code 1957, §13.25, Section 90.71

Sec. 90-71. Established; composition; appointment and compensation of members; officers.

- (a) There is established a transportation and public safety commission of five members to be appointed by a different appointing councilperson, with such appointment to be ratified by the city council. Each member shall have full participation and voting rights. Each member shall also be a registered voter and city resident. Such members so appointed shall be persons who do not hold any office or position with the city. The terms of office of each member shall be one year.
- (b) The members shall organize the transportation and public safety commission and shall elect a chair and vice-chair. In the absence of the chair and vice-chair, any other member shall call the commission to order, whereupon a chair shall be elected from the members present to preside for that meeting.

Subject: December 2025 Notable Police Department Events and Activities

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Transportation and Public Safety (TPS) Commission receive and file this informational report.

BACKGROUND:

Each month at the City of San Fernando Transportation and Public Safety Commission meeting, the Police Department submits and provides the governing board a brief overview of the previous month's community engagement activities, noteworthy incidents, and proactive enforcement.

ANALYSIS:

The San Fernando Police Department (SFPD) has recently heightened and further integrated its community profile in three major areas: Community Engagement, Proactive Enforcement and Quality of Life Enhancements.

For the month of December 2025, the SFPD has the following activities and incidents to report:

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT:

1. Christmas Basket Distribution

On Wednesday, December 17, 2025, the San Fernando Police Department, in partnership with the Police Advisory Council (PAC), conducted a holiday outreach event serving 125 families in need. Police personnel, Police Explorers, PAC members, volunteers, and Santa Claus distributed grocery gift cards, goodie baskets, and toys.

2. Christmas Toy Distribution

On December 25, 2025, SFPD personnel distributed toys and gifts to families in need.

December 2025 Notable Police Department Activities

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NOTEWORTHY EVENTS:

1. On Friday, December 5, 2025, around 5:00 PM, SFPD officers responded to report of a male subject acting erratically in the area of Glenoaks Boulevard and Maclay Avenue. They contacted the subject and arrested him for public intoxication.
2. On Monday, December 8, 2025, at approximately 5:30 AM, SFPD officers responded to a 911 hang-up and unknown disturbance in the 1400 block of Hewitt Street. Following an investigation, officers arrested an adult male for making criminal threats.

5. On Sunday, December 14, 2025, around 3:50 PM, SFPD officers received a Flock ALPR alert regarding a parolee at large traveling in the area of Truman Street and Wolfskill Street. Officers located the vehicle in the 1400 block of Truman Street and arrested the parolee on a no-bail arrest warrant.
6. On Monday, December 15, 2025, around 10:20 PM, an SFPD officer contacted a bicyclist without lights in the area of Heritage Park. Following an investigation, the officer arrested the bicyclist on an outstanding warrant.
7. On Monday, December 15, 2025, at about 4:20 AM, an SFPD officer responded to a report of a female subject searching a vehicle without the owner's consent in the 800 Block of De Haven Street. Following an investigation, the officer arrested the subject for vehicle tampering.
8. On Tuesday, December 16, 2025, at approximately 2:30 PM, SFPD officers received a Flock ALPR alert regarding a vehicle wanted in connection with an embezzlement case. An SFPD detective located the vehicle in the area of Fourth Street and Macneil Street, contacted the driver, and arrested the driver for embezzlement.
9. On Thursday, December 18, 2025, at approximately 2:15 PM, an SFPD officer responded to a shoplifting report in the 12900 Block of Foothill Boulevard (Home Depot). Following an investigation, a male adult was arrested for shoplifting.

December 2025 Notable Police Department Activities

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10. On Friday, December 19, 2025, around 1:00 AM, SFPD officers contacted a male and female inside Pioneer Park after hours. Following an investigation, the female subject was arrested for an outstanding warrant.
11. On Sunday, December 21, 2025, at about 7:55 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of domestic violence in the 1900 Block of Second Street. A male subject was arrested for domestic violence.
12. On Monday, December 22, 2025, at approximately 9:35 AM, an SFPD officer conducting extra patrol in the alley east of North Maclay Avenue between Seventh Street and Eighth Street contacted a male subject sitting behind an electrical box. Following an investigation, the subject was arrested for possession of methamphetamine and drug paraphernalia.
13. On Monday, December 22, 2025, around 11:35 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of an individual with a firearm in Las Palmas Park. Officers detained the individual near San Fernando Road and South Huntington Street. An investigation determined the subject was in possession of a BB gun and a stolen California identification card. The subject was arrested for possession of a stolen identification card.
14. On Monday, December 22, 2025, at about 2:10 PM, an SFPD officer responded to a report of a female detained by LASD for bringing narcotics into the San Fernando Courthouse. The subject was arrested for possession of a controlled substance.
15. On Monday, December 22, 2025, at approximately 11:15 PM, SFPD officers responded to a report of an assault in progress in the 600 Block of Newton Street. Following an investigation, a female subject was arrested for corporal injury to a spouse or cohabitant.
16. On Thursday, December 25, 2025, at approximately 4:00 PM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a fight in progress involving a possible weapon in the area of South Brand Boulevard and Celis Street. Following an investigation, a male subject was arrested for assault with a deadly weapon.
17. On Saturday, December 27, 2025, at about 12:35 PM, SFPD officers conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle without front license plates in the 1700 Block of Truman Street. Following an investigation, the driver was arrested for providing a false identification to a police officer, possession of drug paraphernalia and an outstanding warrant.
18. On Sunday, December 28, 2025, at approximately 1:55 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a male asleep at the wheel in the area of Brand Boulevard and Fourth Street. The male subject was arrested for DUI and driving with a Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) of 0.08% or higher.

December 2025 Notable Police Department Activities

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19. On Tuesday, December 30, 2025, at approximately 6:05 AM, SFPD Community Service Officers observed a black Chevrolet Tahoe illegally parked and conducted a DMV registration check, which revealed the vehicle had been reported stolen. An SFPD officer responded to the scene and arrested a male subject for driving a stolen vehicle.

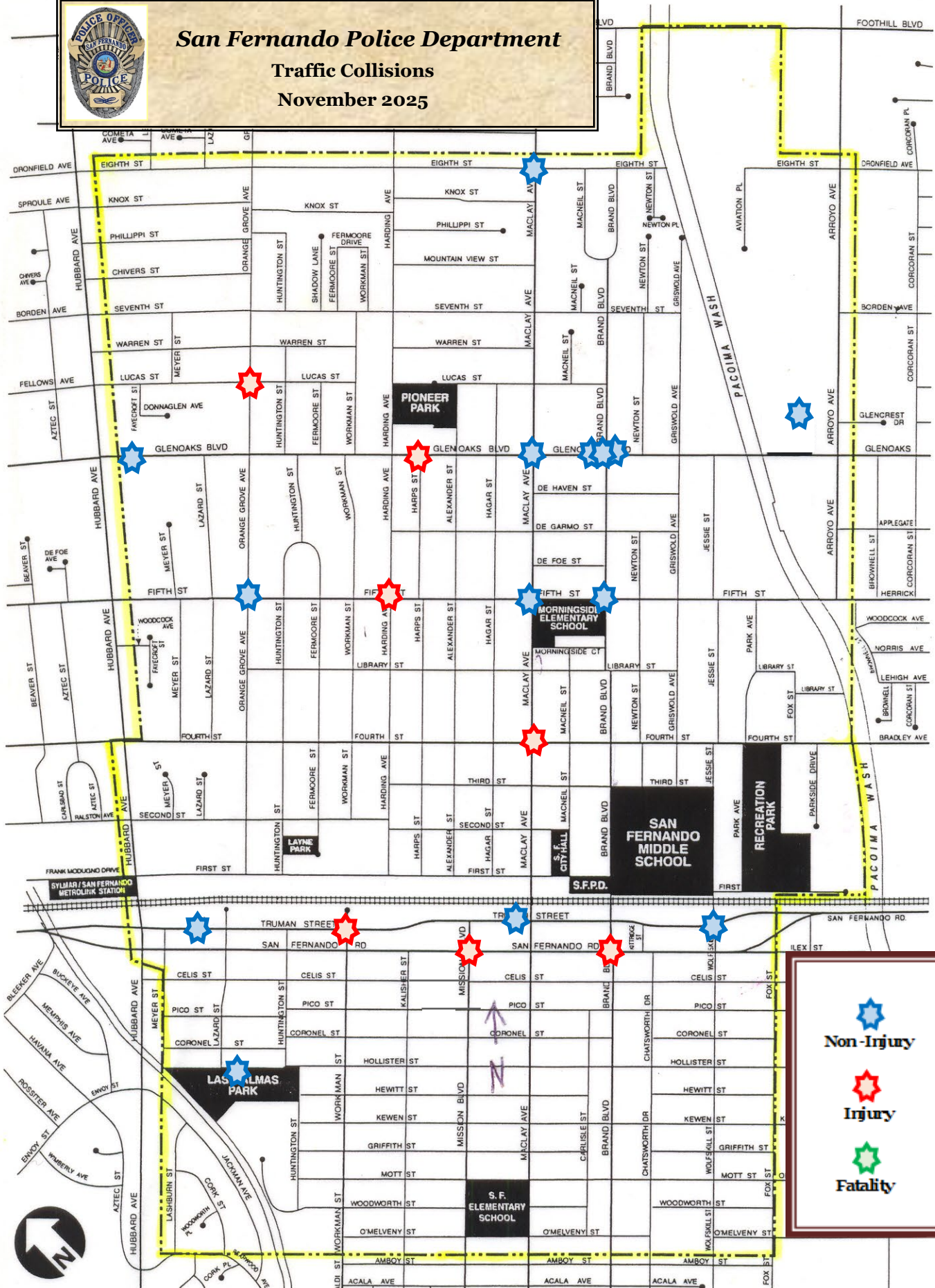

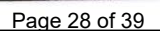

Subject: January 2026 Notable Police Department Events and Activities

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Transportation and Public Safety (TPS) Commission receive and file this informational report.

BACKGROUND:

Each month at the City of San Fernando Transportation and Public Safety Commission meeting, the Police Department submits and provides the governing board a brief overview of the previous month's community engagement activities, noteworthy incidents, and proactive enforcement.

ANALYSIS:

The San Fernando Police Department (SFPD) has recently heightened and further integrated its community profile in three major areas: Community Engagement, Proactive Enforcement and Quality of Life Enhancements.

For the month of January 2026, the SFPD has the following activities and incidents to report:

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT:

1. Memorial Escort

On Friday, January 2, 2026, SFPD officers and Reserve Commander Sal Petrelli provided a police escort for a memorial service in the community.

2. Area Lead Officer Program

During January 2026, the San Fernando Police Department conducted community engagement meetings to introduce the Area Lead Officer (ALO) Program and provide residents and business stakeholders with an opportunity to discuss neighborhood concerns. Meetings were organized by geographic area, including a business-focused session for Area 3, to support targeted discussion and collaboration. Each meeting included an overview of

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the ALO Program, opportunities for open dialogue, and sign-ups for ongoing communication and engagement.

3. Community Forum

On Wednesday, January 28, 2026, SFPD hosted a Community Forum from 6 to 8 PM at Recreation Park. The forum featured a panel of representatives from the San Fernando Police Department, the Los Angeles Police Department, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office, and area non-profits, who provided information and respond to community questions related to immigration, public safety, and homelessness.

NOTEWORTHY EVENTS:

1. On Thursday, January 1, 2026, at about 5:50 AM, an SFPD officer responded to a report of a single-vehicle traffic collision in the 500 block of Fourth Street. The Los Angeles Fire Department personnel responded and pronounced the driver deceased.
2. On Sunday, January 4, 2026, at approximately 12:35 PM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a male and female concealing and attempting to steal merchandise from the Target store, located in the 12900 block of Foothill Boulevard. Following an investigation, the male subject was arrested for being a felon in possession of a firearm and ammunition, possession of an unsafe handgun, possession of methamphetamine for sale, and violation of probation. The female subject was arrested for petty theft with priors, shoplifting, and possession of a controlled substance.
3. On Sunday, January 4, 2026, around 6:00 PM, an SFPD officer responded to a report of a hit-and-run collision. The officer located the driver fleeing from the vehicle near Mott Street and Workman Street while in possession of an open container of alcohol. Following an investigation, the driver was arrested for hit-and-run and DUI. A passenger in the vehicle was arrested for an outstanding warrant.
4. On Monday, January 5, 2026, at about 1:15 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a domestic dispute in the 400 block of Harps Street. Following an investigation, two subjects were arrested – one for an outstanding DUI warrant and criminal threats, and the other for a domestic violence warrant and violation of a restraining order.
5. On Monday, January 5, 2026, at approximately 8:20 PM, SFPD officers responded to a report of a felony hit-and-run collision near Pico Street and South Huntington Street. The suspect vehicle's license plate was left at the scene. Based on information obtained from the license plate, officers located the driver at a residence and arrested the subject for felony hit and run, felony DUI, and obstructing an investigation.

On Tuesday, January 6, 2026, around 1:00 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of suspicious circumstances in the 600 block of San Fernando Road involving two subjects who entered a vehicle without permission. 7. On Tuesday, January 6, 2026, at about 11:40 AM, an SFPD officer responded to a non-injury traffic collision near Truman Street and South Hubbard Avenue. One subject was arrested for an outstanding warrant and driving without a valid license.
8. On Wednesday, January 7, 2026, at approximately 6:35 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of domestic violence in the 300 block of Hagar Street. Officers determined that the involved parties had physically assaulted one another. Both subjects were arrested for domestic violence.

17. On Thursday, January 22, 2026, at approximately 9:00 AM, an SFPD officer conducting extra patrol at Rudy Ortega Park observed a male subject using narcotics. The subject was arrested for possession of methamphetamine and possession of drug paraphernalia.
18. On Thursday, January 22, 2026, around 11:40 PM, an SFPD officer conducted a traffic enforcement stop near Laurel Canyon Boulevard and Rinaldi Street. Following an investigation, two female subjects were arrested – one for false impersonation and outstanding warrants, and the other for possession of methamphetamine and outstanding warrants.
19. On Sunday, January 25, 2026, at about 2:50 AM, SFPD officers responded to a report of shots fired in the 300 block of Park Avenue. A male victim reported confronting suspects who were burglarizing his vehicle and was subsequently shot in the legs. The suspects fled the scene, and the investigation remains ongoing.

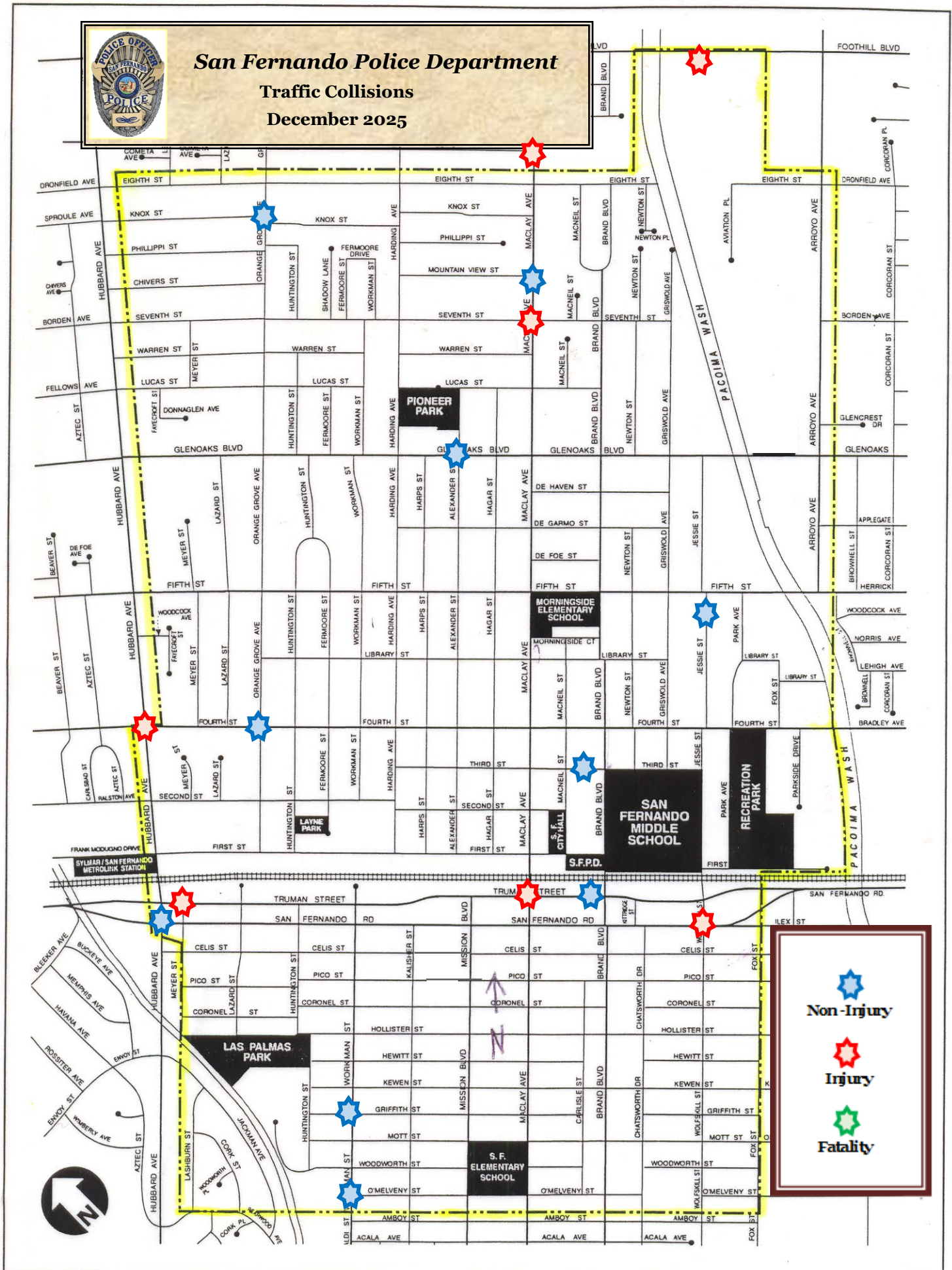
